

A Meditation on Today's Feast:

Jesus's Mother was not like ours, whom we accepted as something historically fixed, which we could not change; He was born of a Mother whom He chose before He was born. It is the only instance in history where both the Son willed the Mother and the Mother willed the Son. She was called by God as Aaron was, and Our Lord was born not just of her flesh but also by her consent.

Before taking unto Himself a human nature, He consulted with the Woman, to ask her if she would give Him a man. The first man, Adam, was made from the slime of the earth. The first woman was made from a man in an ecstasy. The new Adam, Christ, comes from the new Eve, Mary, in an ecstasy of prayer and love of God in the fullness of freedom.

God never does anything without exceeding preparation. The two great masterpieces of God are creation of man and Re-creation or Redemption of man. Creation was made for unfallen men; His Mystical Body, for fallen men. Before making man, God made a garden of delights—as God alone knows how to make a garden beautiful. In that paradise of Creation there were celebrated the first nuptials of man and woman. But man willed not to have blessings, except according to his lower nature. Not only did he lose his happiness; he even wounded his own mind and will. Then God planned the remaking or redeeming of man. But before doing so, he would make another Garden. This new one would be not of earth but of flesh; it would be a garden over whose portals the name of sin would never be written—a Garden in which there would grow no weeds of rebellion to choke the growth of the flowers of grace—a Garden from which there would flow four rivers of redemption to the four corners of the earth—a Garden so pure that the Heavenly Father would not blush at sending His Own Son into it— and this "flesh-girt Paradise to be gardened by the Adam new" was Our Blessed Mother. As Eden was the Paradise of Creation, Mary is the paradise of the Incarnation, and in her as a Garden were celebrated the first nuptials of God and man. The closer one gets to fire, the greater the heat; the closer one is to God, the greater the purity. But since no one was ever closer to God than the woman whose human portals He threw open to walk this earth, then no one could have been ore pure than she.

Saint of the Week-St. Elizabeth Ann Seton

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was the first saint born in what would become the United States. She was born in 1774 in New York City and grew up in the Episcopal Church. She married William Seton whom she loved deeply and they had 5 children. They would soon be visited by traged. Elizabeth's father-in-law passed, her family went bankrupt, and her husband passed away over the course of couple of years. Elizabeth found herself a widow in Italy and was introduced to Catholicism by her hosts. She soon converted. After many other sorrows, Elizabeth started a school in Emmitsburg, MD and started a new religious congregation in American called the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph. This modest beginning marked the start of the Catholic parochial school system in the United States. She spent the rest of her life building and developing the congregation she founded. She died in 1821 at the age of 46. "Mother Seton," as she came to be called, started two orphanages and two schools during her time. She was canonized by Pope St. Paul VI in 1975, who said, "Elizabeth Ann Seton was wholly American! Rejoice for your alorious daughter. Be proud of her. And know how to preserve her fruitful heritage."
