



From our Pastoral Associate:

In our second reading today, St. Paul exhorts us that our bodies are members of Christ. This doesn't mean members of a club or the members of a group, but of a body (the way we speak of our limbs), more specifically, the Body of Christ. St. Paul regularly spoke of the Body of Christ, and there is no wonder that he did- it was part of his own conversion. While on the road to Damascus to arrest and persecute Christians, Paul saw a bright light which struck him blind and knocked him from his animal. A voice said to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" When Paul inquired as to who was speaking, Jesus said, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting." The point was very clear—that attacks on Christians are attacks of Christ himself, because they are members of his body.



Christ's body— the Church. This is not a mere metaphor and St. Paul does not mean it to be. We are part of Christ's mystical body in the same way that your eye or your finger is part of your body. In this way, we should not misuse our bodies— committing grave sins and immorality. To do so is to subject Christ to this very behavior. St. Paul is adamant about this: "Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you have been purchased at a price. Therefore, glorify God with your body." It is not enough that we are redeemed at baptism. We must shun immorality, as it is a sin not just against ourselves, and against others, but against Christ himself. When we mistreat others, particularly in the Church, or do dishonorable things with our own bodies, we commit a vulgarity against the Lord. We should shun these things and seek repentance and healing from Our Lord.

So we should ask ourselves— what ways have I failed in honoring the body that Christ gave me and redeemed? In what ways have I neglected to take care of my body and soul? Have I been to confession for these things? When was the last time I went to confession? How can I more appropriately treat myself and others in my day to day life? What are some ways that I can begin seeing Christ in others and in myself? And finally, ask Christ for the help and strength you need to follow through on the resolutions that follow.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Sebastian

St. Sebastian lived in the mid third century during the Diocletian persecution of Christians. He joined the Roman Army in an attempt to covertly help Christian's on their way to martyrdom. During this time, he converted several people to being Christians. His faith was soon discovered and the Emperor Diocletian, angered by his supposed betrayal, ordered him tied to a stake in a field to be the target of his chosen archers. The archers shot him as full of arrows as an urchin is full of spikes and left him for dead. When a Christian came to get his body to bury him, she was surprised to learn that he had somehow not died. She took him to her home and slowly nursed him back to health. Not deterred, Sebastian went to a staircase where the emperor was going to pass and upbraided Diocletian for his cruelty to Christians. Diocletian was astonished by this sudden appearance of one supposed to be dead, but he recovered and ordered his soldiers to beat him to death with cudgels and throw his body in the sewer. St. Sebastian then appeared to a holy lady and she recovered his body. His remains are now housed in Rome, in the Basilica of St. Sebastian. Some of his relics are also in France and Germany. He became famous in later times when people associated his intercession with recovering from the bubonic plague.

Catholic Movie Night

Our first Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be on Sunday, Feb 18th at 6pm. Our next movie will be There Be Dragons (2011), a fictional retelling of the life of St. Josemaría Escrivá, the founder of Opus Dei: Arising out of the horror of the Spanish Civil War, a candidate for canonization, Josemaría Escrivá, is investigated by a journalist who discovers that his own estranged father had a deep, dark and devastating connection to the saint's life. As he uncovers the truth, he learns more about his origins and learns much about forgiveness and the power of faith. Don't miss such an excellent movie!

For Your Reflection:

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. All things were made through him, and without him nothing was made. In these words John the theologian teaches that nothing exists or remains in being except in and through the Word.

Think of a musician tuning his lyre. By his skill he adjusts high notes to low and intermediate notes to the rest, and produces a series of harmonies. So too the wisdom of God holds the world like a lyre and joins things in the air to those on earth, and things in heaven to those in the air, and brings each part into harmony with the whole. By his decree and will he regulates them all to produce the beauty and harmony of a single, well-ordered universe. While remaining unchanged with his Father, he moves all creation by his unchanging nature, according to the Father's will. To everything he gives existence and life in accordance with its nature, and so creates a wonderful and truly divine harmony.

To illustrate this profound mystery, let us take the example of a choir of many singers. A choir is composed of a variety of men, women and children, of both old and young. Under the direction of one conductor, each sings in the way that is natural for him: men with men's voices, boys with boys' voices, old people with old voices, young people with young voices. Yet all of them produce a single harmony. Or consider the example of our soul. It moves our senses according to their several functions so that in the presence of a single object they all act simultaneously: the eye sees, the ear hears, the hand touches, the nose smells, the tongue tastes, and often the other parts of the body act as well as, for example, the feet may walk.

Although this is only a poor comparison, it gives some idea of how the whole universe is governed. The Word of God has but to give a gesture of command and everything falls into place; each creature performs its own proper function, and all together constitute one single harmonious order.
