In this Sunday's Gospel, we hear the testimony of John the Baptist regarding the baptism of Jesus. This is a unique look at Jesus' baptism through the eyes of the Baptizer. Upon seeing Jesus walking by, John tells those around him (and us) that this is the person he was coming to herald and the one for whom he came to baptize. John then reveals that God gave him a sign to watch out for: "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain, this is he who baptizes with the Holy Spirit. (Jn 1:33). And so John bears witness to the fact that he did see the Spirit descend as a dove and remain on Jesus, declaring Jesus to be the Son of God.



This passage has some interesting parallels with the anointing of King David in 1 Samuel 16. King Saul had been unfaithful to God's command and so he was rejected from the kingship. God ordered the prophet Samuel to go and anoint a new king who would be revealed to him among the sons of Jesse. Samuel does so and when he sees the first of Jesse's sons he believes that he has found him. "But the Lord said to Samuel, 'Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him. For the Lord sees not as man sees; man looks on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart.'" Having thus been corrected, Samuel watches each of Jesse's six other sons go by, declaring that none had been chosen by God, before David arrives. "And the Lord said, 'Arise, anoint him for this is he.' Then Samuel took the horn of oil, and anointed him in the midst of his brothers; and the Spirit of the Lord came mightily upon David from that day forward."

We can see many similarities here. Both men, of the tribe of Judah, are revealed by prophets. Like Samuel, John was given an indication of who was chosen to be the Lamb of God and had to wait for the right person to come along. Like David, Jesus was not recognizable as God's chosen simply by his appearance, but rather for his spiritual qualities that God alone could see. We also see a similarity with the confirmation of God's election by the descent of the Holy Spirit. For David, the Spirit of the Lord comes upon David to guide and lead him. For Jesus, the Spirit descends and remains on him at his baptism. We see the Spirit continuing to work throughout Jesus' ministry and Jesus makes clear that one of the reasons that he came is to reveal and send the Holy Spirit to us (Jn 16:4b-15).

The intention of the Apostle John is clear– Jesus is the new David, the Son of God through whom the Holy Spirit performs mighty works both in deed and speech. We should always listen to Our Lord and follow him, as John the Baptist's disciples eventually do: "The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus." (Jn 1:37) In response to John's testimony, we also should do the same.


Catholic Home Missions Appeal

Saint of the Week- St. Anthony of the Desert Saint Anthony of the Desert is revered as one of the most famous Christian monks in both the Western and Eastern Churches. Born in in 251 in Lower Egypt to wealthy parents, At the age of 20, Anthony's parents died and he was left to care for his younger unmarried sister. Soon after, he decided to respond to Jesus' invitation in Mt 19:21: "If you want to be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasures in heaven." Anthony quickly sold all his lands, gave the proceeds to the poor, and entrusted his sister to the care of a group of consecrated virgins. He went out to a desert to live alone as an ascetic, eating only bread, and drinking saltwater, sometimes fasting from 2-4 days at a time. Eventually his asceticism attracted followers and a group formed that asked him to be their spiritual leader. Because of Anthony's leadership and organization of this group, he is called the "Father of Monasticism." St. Anthony influenced many other saints, including playing an important role in the conversions of St. Augustine and St. John Chrysostom. His influence can be felt in the writings of St. Benedict, who brought monasticism to the Western Church. St. Anthony died in 356 at the age of 105. He was buried in a grave near his cell.

For Your Reflection

How did the Dark Power [Satan] go wrong? Here, no doubt, we ask a question to which human beings cannot give an answer with any certainty. A reasonable (and traditional) guess, based on our own experiences of going wrong, can, however, be offered. The moment you have a self at all, there is a possibility of putting yourself first- wanting to be the centerwanting to be God, in fact. That was the sin of Satan: and that was the sin he taught the human race. Some people think the fall of man had something to do with sex, but that is a mistake. (The story in the Book of Genesis rather suggests that some corruption in our sexual nature followed the fall and was its result, not its cause.) What Satan put into the heads of our remote ancestors was the idea that they could 'be like gods'could set up on their own as if they had created themselves- be their own masters- invent some sort of happiness for themselves outside God, apart from God. And out of that hopeless attempt has come nearly all that we call human history-money, poverty, ambition, war, prostitution, classes, empires, slavery- the long terrible story of man trying to find something other than God which will make him happy.

The reason why it can never succeed is this. God made us: invented us as a man invents an engine. A car is made to run on petrol, and it would not run properly on anything else. Now God designed the human machine to run on Himself. He Himself is the fuel our spirits were designed to burn, or the food our spirits were designed to feed on. There is no other. That is why it is just no good asking God to make us happy in our own way without bothering about religion. God cannot give us happiness and peace apart from Himself, because it is not there.
