From our Pastoral Associate:

In our Gospel today, we are told the story of the calling of Simon Peter, Andrew, James, and John. All the men fishermen and are Jesus invites them to down lay their profession to become "fishers of men." They leave everything to follow Jesus. These men would go on to become the first priests and bishops.

These men would end up giving everything to Jesus, counting as



nothing the loss of goods, comfort, and even their lives in service to Our Lord and to the expansion of the Church. Their efforts were astounding– thousands converted throughout the Roman Empire, eventually leading to the legalization of Christianity under Constantine. Now, there's not a place in the Western World (and much of the Eastern World) that does not have a Christian church in each town.

We should foster in our families and in our daily lives an openness to the calling of God, now matter what our vocation or where we are in life. The Apostles dropped everything they were doing, leaving their nets, their livelihood, their families and all their possession behind. We should respond with the same generosity of spirit in whatever God may be calling us to. Are we called to leave everything we own and do the same? Maybe. Some people are called to this, but most aren't. Even so, we should still be willing to give to God our time, talents, and treasure, whether that be volunteering at food pantries and soup kitchens, joining one of our parish ministries, preaching the Gospel, or tithing to our parish and elsewhere.

Finally, in the Church today, we are dealing a difficult vocation shortage of men who are called to be priests, deacons, and religious. Without priests, we would not be able to receive the seven sacraments, or be forced to travel far to receive them at long intervals. As we read and consider this passage today, let's remember to pray for an increase of vocations to the priesthood, religious life, and even the married life, as good families are the fertile soil for vocations in the Church. We should encourage young people as they are in their discernment period to consider each of these vocations in the Church and to put their focus on where God is leading them. And let us be sure not to forget to thank those that have already answered the call.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- St. Francis de Sales

St. Francis de Sales was born in 1567 in France to noble parents. His father desired that he become a soldier but he suspected that he was called to be a priest. Francis obeyed his father however, and began studies. However, he became convinced that he was called to be a priest and was ordained in 1593. Francis had always desired to be a missionary to Switzerland, which had largely converted to Calvinism in the previous half century and bring the people back to the Catholic Faith. Having no one that would take him in, he trudged through the icy countryside, having doors slammed in his face, rocks thrown at him, and often sleeping in barn lofts or trees to avoid wolves. His feet often bled in the icy conditions. He regularly preached sermons to empty churches. Francis didn't give up however. He soon became friends with the children, playing games with them and earning their affection. The parents, seeing this friendship, decided to hear him out. Francis also recognized that the social pressure against conversion was also significant, so he wrote pamphlets which he would slip under the doors of homes in order to allow people to consider the arguments for Catholicism privately. His efforts were met remarkable success. He died of a stroke in 1662, having just given a nun his last word of advice "Humility."

Catholic Movie Night

Our next movie will be There Be Dragons (2011), a fictional retelling of the life of St. Josemaría Escrivá, the founder of Opus Dei: Arising out of the horror of the Spanish Civil War, a candidate for canonization, Josemaría Escrivá, is investigated by a journalist who discovers that his own estranged father had a deep, dark and devastating connection to the saint's life. As he uncovers the truth, he learns more about his origins and learns much about forgiveness and the power of faith. Don't miss such an excellent movie!

For Your Reflection:

Christ is always present to his Church, especially in the actions of the liturgy. He is present in the sacrifice of the Mass, in the person of the minister (it is the same Christ who formerly offered himself on the cross that now offers by the ministry of priests) and most of all under the Eucharistic species. He is present in the sacraments by his power, in such a way that when someone baptizes, Christ himself baptizes. He is present in his word, for it is he himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the Church. Finally, he is present when the Church prays and sings, for he himself promised: Where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there in their midst. Indeed, in this great work which gives perfect glory to God and brings holiness to men, Christ is always joining in partnership with himself his beloved Bride, the Church, which calls upon its Lord and through him gives worship to the eternal Father.

It is therefore right to see the liturgy as an exercise of the priestly office of Jesus Christ, in which through signs addressed to the senses man's sanctification is signified and, in a way proper to each of these signs, made effective, and in which public worship is celebrated in its fullness by the mystical body of Jesus Christ, that is, by the head and by his members.

Accordingly, every liturgical celebration, as an activity of Christ the priest and of his body, which is the Church, is a sacred action of a preeminent kind. No other action of the Church equals its title to power or its degree of effectiveness.

In the liturgy on earth we are given a foretaste and share in the liturgy of heaven, celebrated in the holy city of Jerusalem, the goal of our pilgrimage, where Christ is seated at the right hand of God, as minister of the sanctuary and of the true tabernacle. With the whole company of heaven we sing a hymn of praise to the Lord; as we reverence the memory of the saints, we hope to have some part with them, and to share in their fellowship; we wait for the Savior, our Lord Jesus Christ, until he, who is our life, appears, and we appear with him in glory.
