

Ministry Spotlight: The Legion of Mary

It is a little known fact that a parish priest will have to answer before Our Lord not only for the Catholics in his parish's boundaries, but also for every man, woman, and child within those boundaries, whether or not they are Catholic or even Christian. This is a tremendous responsibility, and the laity are not exempt from that mission. As parishioners of Our Lady of Sorrows, we have a duty to aid Fr. Leonard in his mission of reaching souls, whether it is caring for the physical needs or their spiritual needs. This is doubly important as Fr. Leonard is the pastor of not just one, but two parishes as well as having a hospital within the boundaries as well. We have restarted the Legion of Mary to help provide for the spiritual needs of these



souls. Through its devotion to Mary, the Legion is focused on bringing souls to Jesus Christ by performing the spiritual works of mercy and other works of evangelization such as comforting the grieving, consoling the doubtful, instructing the ignorant, and so much more.

The Legion of Mary is a Marian apostolate that was founded in 1921 in Dublin, Ireland. It has had tremendous success in the century since its founding, now having local groups in every diocese in the world. It has become the largest lay apostolate in the world, comprising over 11 million members. As of right now, there are 3 members being considered for canonization- the Servant of God Frank Duff (the founder), Venerable Edel Quinn (a Legion envoy to Africa), and the Servant of God Alphonsus Lambe (a Legion envoy to South America). The Legion sees itself as the army of Mary, arrayed against that of Satan in the battle for souls. The war of Mary with Satan has been going on since the beginning, when God promised enmity between the serpent and the Woman in Genesis 3. There is no one who desires that someone be brought to Jesus more than the Blessed Virgin herself. By uniting him or herself with Mary, the legionary seeks to become a living copy of her- so that when Jesus is served in the souls we meet, he is served by Mary.

The Legion meets weekly to pray the rosary together before a statue of Our Lady, to study the Legion's handbook (which is packed full of spiritual insights on the Blessed Virgin and the Catholic life), to give reports on each member's legionary works through the week, to give advice and encouragement, and to determine what needs to be done for the coming week.

It is our hope that we will be able to soon start considering door to door ministry, ministry to the sick and homebound, adult spiritual formation in our parish, and many other works in the effort to make out parish grow. In order to do this, however, we need more members.


Ushers Needed

Saint of the Week-Sts. Timothy and Titus

Sts. Timothy and Titus were converts and later friends of St. Paul the Apostle. Timothy was born of a Jewish mother who became a Christian and a Greek father. He worked side by side with Paul for 15 years and was present with Paul at the founding of the church at Corinth. Timothy was often sent on difficult and dangerous missions by Paul, often signing letters to churches with Paul. He became one of Paul's most trusted and beloved friends and was present for Paul during his house arrest in Rome. Titus likewise was a fellow friend of Paul's and hand delivered at least one letter to the Corinthians from Paul and helped to smooth over the difficulties present at this church. With Titus' help, Paul prevailed at the Council of Jerusalem in Acts 16, which passed the judgment that new believers would not be required to follow Jewish dietary and purity laws. Titus was seen as a peacemaker, administrator, and good friend. In the letter written to him by Paul, Titus is described as an administrator in Crete, charged with organizing it, correcting any abuses, and selecting bishops and priests. St. Paul was arguably the greatest evangelizer that the Church has ever known, but he would not have accomplished it had it not been for the support of Sts. Timothy and Titus.

There are two different types of membership— active and auxiliaries. The Active members perform the basic legionary work and attend the weekly meetings. Auxiliary members are tasked with praying a rosary for the Legion every day. Both memberships are essential and the Legion handbook compares them to soldiers on the front lines (active members) and munitions factory workers (auxiliary members). Without the munitions, an army cannot fight. Without the soldiers, the munitions workers would be without a purpose. So it is with the members an active member will soon fail without the prayers of others.

The lowest council of the Legion is known as a praesidium (the Legion borrows its terminology from the Roman Legion, one of the most elite fighting forces in history). Each praesidium adopts a title of Our Lady as a way of expressing that it is not the Legionaries, but Mary that are really in this fight. Our praesidium is a combination of parishioners of Our Lady of Sorrows and St. Monica, our sister parish. We decided to adopt the name of Our Lady of Kibeho for our praesidium as it spoke to the history and character of Our Lady of Sorrows and St. Monica parishes. Our Lady of Kibeho appeared in Rwanda in the 1980's and described herself as Our Lady of Sorrows. She taught the visionaries (one of whom was a member of the Legion of Mary) many things, among which included the request for everyone to pray the Seven Sorrows Chaplet every day, the need to repent, and a warning of the coming Rwandan Genocide, which, sadly, indeed came to pass. Our Lady of Kibeho is the first Marian apparition in Africa approved by the Catholic Church.
