

Letter from Fr. Leonard Regarding the Annual Catholic Appeal

From our Pastoral Associate:

In our first reading today, Moses tells the people that "A prophet like me will the Lord, your God, raise up for you from among your own kin; to him you shall listen." This was because when the Israelites were at Mt. Sinai, God came down to the mountain to talk with the people and give the Ten Commandments. God descended on the mountain in fire and it was covered in a great smoke and the whole mountain shook. There was a great trumpet blast and God answered Moses' questions in booming thunder. The Israelites, understandably terrified, asked Moses to be their representative before God. In our reading today, Moses is nearing the end of his life and so he predicts that God will raise up another prophet like him. This prophet would be none other than Jesus, whom God commands us at the Baptism in the Jordan and on the Mountain during the Transfiguration to "listen to him."



Jesus is the new Moses who, as we hear in the Gospel today, teaches with authority in a way that they had only known from Moses. Jesus is also the God that thundered upon the mountain and caused such fear and trepidation among the Israelites. Whereas Moses sinned in striking the stone that gave water more than he ought and forfeited his ability to enter the Promised Land, in this new Moses, God and Moses are one and the same, uniting in him the perfect prophet capable of accomplishing God's will perfectly and lead his people into the true promised land of redemption and eternal life. Whereas only God gave the manna to the people in the desert, our new Moses gives us the manna of his body and blood for us to eat in the Eucharist. We also should take the time to "listen to him."

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Blaise

St. Blaise lived around the end of the third century and the beginning of the fourth in Armenia. He began his life studying philosophy in his youth and became a physician, healing bodily ailments. He performed this task with miraculous ability, good-will, and piety. When the bishop of Sabastea died, the people as one chose Blaise as their new bishop. His holiness was manifested by many miracles and people came to him from near and far to be healed by him. In 316, the Governor of Cappadocia and Lesser Armenia began a persecution of him by order of the Emperor Licinius. Blaise was arrested and, on the way to jail a mother brought her only son, choking on a fish bone, and laid him at his feet. Her son was healed immediately. The governor was unable to make Blaise recant his faith and ordered him to be beaten with sticks, have his flesh ripped with iron combs, and eventually beheaded. Because of the healing that St. Blaise performed on the child who was choking, St. Blaise is considered an intercessor for ailments of the throat. St. Blaise quickly became one of the most popular saints of the Middle Ages. Every year near his feast day on February 3rd, it is customary for priests to bless the throats of people with two candles, been blessed at Candlemas the previous day, tied together in the shape of a cross.

Catholic Movie Night

Our first Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be on Sunday, Feb 18th at 6pm. Our next movie will be There Be Dragons (2011), a fictional retelling of the life of St. Josemaría Escrivá, the founder of Opus Dei: Arising out of the horror of the Spanish Civil War, a candidate for canonization, Josemaría Escrivá, is investigated by a journalist who discovers that his own estranged father had a deep, dark and devastating connection to the saint's life. As he uncovers the truth, he learns more about his origins and learns much about forgiveness and the power of faith. Don't miss such an excellent movie!

For Your Reflection:

It may be possible for each to think too much of his own potential glory hereafter; it is hardly possible for him to think too often or too deeply about that of his neighbor. The load, or weight, or burden of my neighbor's glory should be laid on my back, a load so heavy that only humility can carry it, and the backs of the proud will be broken.

It is a serious thing to live in a society of possible gods and goddesses, to remember that the dullest and most uninteresting person you can talk to may one day be a creature which, if you saw it now, you would be strongly tempted to worship, or else a horror and a corruption such as you now meet, if at all, only in nightmare. All day long we are, in some degree, helping each other to one or other of these destination. It is in the light of these overwhelming possibilities, it is with the awe and the circumspection proper to them, that we should conduct all our dealings with one another, all friendships, all loves, all play, all politics. There are no ordinary people. You have never talked to a mere mortal. Nations, cultures, arts, civilizations—these are mortal, and their life is to ours as the life of a gnat. But it is immortals whom we joke with, work with, marry, snub, and exploit—immortal horrors or everlasting splendors.

This does not mean that we are to be perpetually solemn. We must play. But our merriment must be of the kind (and it is, in fact, the merriest kind) which exists between people who have, from the outset, taken each other seriously—no flippancy, no superiority, no presumption. And our charity must be a real and costly love, with deep feeling for the sins in spite of which we love the sinner—no mere tolerance, or indulgence which parodies love as flippancy parodies merriment.

Next to the Blessed Sacrament itself, your neighbor is the holiest object presented to your senses. If he is your Christian neighbor, he is holy in almost the same way, for in him also Christ vere *latitat*—the glorifier and the glorified, Glory Himself, is truly hidden.
