

From our Pastor:

The Epiphany of the Lord: A Revelation of Hope and Salvation

As we celebrate the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, we are reminded of the momentous occasion when Jesus Christ was revealed to the nations. The Magi, guided by the light of the star, journeyed from distant lands to pay homage to the newborn King. Their pilgrimage symbolizes the universal call to salvation, showing that Christ came not only for the people of Israel but for all humanity. The word "Epiphany" means "manifestation" or "revelation," and in today's Gospel, we see God's love manifested in Jesus, the Light of the



World. The journey of the Magi is rich in symbolism. Their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh reflect the recognition of Jesus' kingship, divinity, and sacrificial mission. Gold acknowledges Him as King, frankincense points to His divinity, and myrrh foretells His suffering and death for our salvation.

The Magi also represent the diversity of people who are drawn to Christ. They remind us that God's grace is extended to every corner of the earth. In the light of Christ, divisions are overcome, and unity is possible. Their journey challenges us to seek Christ actively, to let His light guide us in a world often clouded by darkness.

As we reflect on the Epiphany, we are invited to consider how we can be bearers of Christ's light to one another. This can be as simple as reaching out to someone who is lonely, offering a listening ear and kind words. It could mean helping a neighbor in need, providing meals, or assisting with chores. We can mentor or guide someone seeking direction in their life, sharing our experiences and wisdom with humility. In our families, being light might involve creating a loving and peaceful home, where forgiveness is practiced, and kindness is modeled. At work, it could mean offering encouragement to a colleague, standing up for justice, or contributing to an inclusive environment. Volunteering in our parish community, such as visiting the sick, tutoring children, or participating in charity drives, also shines Christ's love into the world. The story of the Magi teaches us the importance of adoration and humility. They knelt before Jesus in awe and reverence, offering their treasures and their hearts. In our busy lives, we too must find moments to kneel in prayer, offering Jesus the treasure of our time and attention.

This Epiphany, may we be inspired by the Magi's faith, courage, and devotion. Let us follow the light of Christ and share His love with the world, becoming instruments of His peace and joy. Together, we can reflect God's glory, bringing hope and comfort to those around us.

"Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you" (Isaiah 60:1).

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Raymond of Penyafort

St. Raymond of Penyarfort was born around 1175 in what is now Spain to noble parents. He lived a long and productive life. By the time he was 20, he was teaching philosophy. In his early 30s he earned a doctorate in both canon and civil law. At 41 he became a Dominican. Pope Gregory IX called him to Rome to work for him and to be his confessor. One of the things the pope asked him to do was to gather together all the decrees of popes and councils that had been made in 80 years since a similar collection by Gratian. Raymond compiled five books called the Decretals. They were looked upon as one of the best organized collections of Church law until the 1917 codification of canon law. Earlier, Raymond had written for confessors a book of cases. It was called Summa de Casibus Poenitentiae. More than simply a list of sins and penances, it discussed pertinent doctrines and laws of the Church that pertained to the problem or case brought to the confessor. At the age of 60, Raymond was appointed archbishop of Tarragona, the capital of Aragon. He didn't like the honor at all and ended up getting sick and resigning in two years. He didn't get to enjoy his peace long, however, because when he was 63 he was elected by his fellow Dominicans to be the head of the whole Order, the successor of Saint Dominic. Raymond worked hard, visited on foot all the Dominicans, reorganized their constitutions and managed to put through a provision that a master general be allowed to resign. When the new constitutions were accepted, Raymond, then 65, resigned. He still had 35 years to oppose heresy and work for the conversion of the Moors in Spain. He convinced Saint Thomas Aguinas to write his work Against the Gentiles. In his 100th year, the Lord let Raymond retire. He died January 6, 1275 and was canonized in 1601. He is buried in the Cathedral of Santa Eulalia in Barcelona, Spain and is known as the patron of canon lawyers.

For Your Reflection:

The loving providence of God determined that in the last days he would aid the world, set on its course to destruction. He decreed that all nations should be saved in Christ A promise had been made to the holy patriarch Abraham in regard to these nations. He was to have a countless progeny, born not from his body but from the seed of faith. His descendants are therefore compared with the array of the stars. The father of all nations was to hope not in an earthly progeny but in a progeny from above. Let the full number of the nations now take their place in the family of the patriarchs. Let the children of the promise now receive the blessing in the seed of Abraham, the blessing renounced by the children of his flesh. In the persons of the Magi let all people adore the Creator of the universe; let God be known, not in Judea only, but in the whole world, so that his name may be great in all Israel. Dear friends, now that we have received instruction in this revelation of God's grace, let us celebrate with spiritual joy the day of our first harvesting, of the first calling of the Gentiles. Let us give thanks to the merciful God, who has made us worthy, in the words of the Apostle, to share the position of the saints in light; who has rescued us from the power of darkness, and brought us into the kingdom of his beloved Son. As Isaiah prophesied: the people of the Gentiles, who sat in darkness, have seen a great light, and for those who dwelt in the region of the shadow of death a light has dawned. He spoke of them to the Lord: The Gentiles, who do not know you, will invoke you, and the peoples, who knew you not, will take refuge in you. This is the day that Abraham saw, and rejoiced to see, when he knew that the sons born of his faith would be blessed in his seed, that is, in Christ. Believing that he would be the father of the nations, he looked into the future, giving glory to God, in full awareness that God is able to do what he has promised. This came to be fulfilled, as we know, from the time when the star beckoned the three wise men out of their distant country and led them to recognize and adore the King of heaven and earth. The obedience of the star calls us to imitate its humble service: to be servants, as best we can, of the grace that invites all men to find Christ. Dear friends, you must have the same zeal to be of help to one another; then, in the kingdom of God, to which faith and good works are the way, you will shine as children of the light: through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with God the Father and the Holy Spirit for ever and ever. 
