

From our Pastoral Associate:

As we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany today and the coming of the Magi with gifts to Jesus, I want to take a moment to reflect on the people of Jerusalem when the Magi come asking to see the Messiah. King Herod, who was not descended from King David, was not the proper King of Israel as intended. God had Understandably (though this in no way excuses his actions), troubled by the message of the Magi. Matthew includes the line that "all of Jerusalem was troubled with him." He calls together the scholars of Jerusalem to ascertain



where the Messiah was to be born. They tell him plainly that it is in Bethlehem that he will be born according to the words of Micah and the author of the Second Book of Samuel.

What is interesting (and rather distressing) is that the people of Jerusalem do not receive the tidings of the birth of their Messiah with joy. There is no Mass exodus of the city to see the Messiah in Bethlehem. There is no celebration. There is no sense of expectant hope or joy. Rather, they sit in fear of a tyrannical pretender. There's an almost indifference by the scholars as they relay where the Messiah was to be born. There does not seem to be any attempt to hide Jesus' whereabouts in order to protect him. And they surely know just how ruthless Herod could be.

Do we hear the news of the Gospel with a mere shrug of the shoulders? Or do we receive it with tremendous joy? When Jesus comes to us in Mass are we attentive, or do we merely yawn and allow ourselves to be distracted by thoughts of our next meal? Do we seek to honestly know Jesus through the daily reading of the scriptures and in prayer, or do we let life's pleasures and troubles consume our whole day? Ask yourself this— how often do I think about Jesus through the day? How often do I pray? How much time during the day do I spend educating myself on the Faith. Are there? Is there a way that I can be better about this?

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Hilary of Poitiers

St. Hilary was born to affluent pagan parents at Poitiers, France around 310. He received a very good pagan education, which included a high level of Greek. At some point he studied the Bible and abandoned his Neo-platonism for Christianity. He was baptized into the Church with his wife and young daughter. St. Hilary was so well respected by the Christians at Poitiers that they unanimously elected him as their bishop in 350. At that time Arianism, the heresy that taught that Jesus Christ is not God but the highest of all created beings, was ravaging the Church. St. Hilary was a dominant voice in the discussion and became well known for his orthodoxy. Hilary wrote to the Emperor Constantius II, rebuking him for the persecution of orthodox Christians. For this he was sent into exile for four years in Phrygia (modern day Turkey). From Phrygia, Hilary continued to manage his diocese and wrote several theological works on the Trinity. He made himself so irksome to the emperor there that he was sent back to his own diocese. At Poitiers, Hilary continued to fight for the orthodox understanding of the Trinity, writing several more works. He also encouraged St. Martin of Tours to found a monastery in his diocese. He died in 367 and is known as a Doctor of the Church.

Catholic Movie Night

Our first Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be on Sunday, Feb 18th at 6pm. Our next movie will be There Be Dragons (2011), a fictional retelling of the life of St. Josemaría Escrivá, the founder of Opus Dei: Arising out of the horror of the Spanish Civil War, a candidate for canonization, Josemaría Escrivá, is investigated by a journalist who discovers that his own estranged father had a deep, dark and devastating connection to the saint's life. As he uncovers the truth, he learns more about his origins and learns much about forgiveness and the power of faith. Don't miss such an excellent movie!

For Your Reflection:

The loving providence of God determined that in the last days he would aid the world, set on its course to destruction. He decreed that all nations should be saved in Christ. A promise had been made to the holy patriarch Abraham in regard to these nations. He was to have a countless progeny, born not from his body but from the seed of faith. The father of all nations was to hope not in an earthly progeny but in a progeny from above. Let the full number of the nations now take their place in the family of the patriarchs. Let the children of the promise now receive the blessing in the seed of Abraham, the blessing renounced by the children of his flesh. In the persons of the Magi let all people adore the Creator of the universe; let God be known, not in Judea only, but in the whole world, so that his name may be great in all Israel. Dear friends, now that we have received instruction in this revelation of God's grace, let us celebrate with spiritual joy the day of our first harvesting, of the first calling of the Gentiles. Let us give thanks to the merciful God, who has made us worthy, in the words of the Apostle, to share the position of the saints in light; who has rescued us from the power of darkness, and brought us into the kingdom of his beloved Son. As Isaiah prophesied: the people of the Gentiles, who sat in darkness, have seen a great light, and for those who dwelt in the region of the shadow of death a light has dawned. This is the day that Abraham saw, and rejoiced to see, when he knew that the sons born of his faith would be blessed in his seed, that is, in Christ. Believing that he would be the father of the nations, he looked into the future, giving glory to God, in full awareness that God is able to do what he has promised. This came to be fulfilled, as we know, from the time when the star beckoned the three wise men out of their distant country and led them to recognize and adore the King of heaven and earth. The obedience of the star calls us to imitate its humble service: to be servants, as best we can, of the grace that invites all men to find Christ. Dear friends, you must have the same zeal to be of help to one another; then, in the kingdom of God, to which faith and good works are the way, you will shine as children of the light: through our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with God the Father and the Holy Spirit for ever and ever. Amen.
