#### A Meditation on Today's Gospel from Pope Benedict XVI:

The star had evidently receded from view in Jerusalem. After their encounter with the words of Scripture, it shone for the wise men once more. Creation, interpreted by the Scriptures, speaks to humanity again. In describing the wise men's reaction, Matthew reaches for superlatives: "When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy" (2:10). It is the joy of one whose heart has received a ray of God's light and who can now see that his hope has been realized—the joy of one who has found what he sought, and has himself been found.

"Going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshipped him" (Mt 2:11). The wise men do a proskýnesis before the royal child, that is to say they throw themselves onto the ground before him. This is the homage that is offered to a divine king. The gifts brought by the wise men may be explained in similar terms. They are not practical

gifts, of a kind that the holy family might have had a use for at this moment. They express the same thing as the proskýnesis: they acknowledge the royal dignity of him to whom they are offered. God and incense are also mentioned in Is 60:6 as gifts of homage that the Gentiles will place before the God of Israel.

In the Church's tradition—with certain variations— the three gifts have been thought to represent three aspects of the mystery of Christ: the gold points to Jesus' kingship, the incense to his divine sonship, the myrrh to the mystery of his Passion.

The myrrh actually appears in Saint John's Gospel after the death of Jesus: John tells us that Nicodemus had prepared myrrh, among other ointments, for the anointing of Jesus' body (cf. Jn 19:39). Through the myrrh, then, the mystery of the Cross is once again associated with Jesus' kingship and mysteriously proclaimed in the worship offered by the wise men. Anointing is an attempt to resist death, which only becomes definitive with decomposition. By the time the women came to the tomb to anoint the body on Easter morning— a task that could not be carried out on the evening of the crucifixion because of the approaching feast day— Jesus had already risen. He no longer needed myrrh as a protection against death, because God's life itself had overcome death.

#### Saint of the Week-St. Hilary of Poitiers

St. Hilary was born to affluent pagan parents at Poitiers, France around 310. He received a very good pagan education, which included a high level of Greek. At some point he studied the Bible and abandoned his Neo-platonism for Christianity. He was baptized into the Church with his wife and young daughter. St. Hilary was so well respected by the Christians at Poitiers that they unanimously elected him as their bishop in 350. At that time Arianism, the heresy that taught that Jesus Christ is not God but the highest of all created beings, was ravaging the Church. St. Hilary was a dominant voice in the discussion and became well known for his orthodoxy. Hilary wrote to the Emperor Constantius II, rebuking him for the persecution of orthodox Christians. For this he was sent into exile for four years in Phrygia (modern day Turkey). From Phrygia, Hilary continued to manage his diocese and wrote several theological works on the Trinity. He made himself so irksome to the emperor there that he was sent back to his own diocese. At Poitiers, Hilary continued to fight for the orthodox understanding of the Trinity, writing several more works. He also encouraged St. Martin of Tours to found a monastery in his diocese. He died in 367 and is known as a Doctor of the Church.

#### IN MEMORIAM

Pope Benedict XVI Papacy: April 19, 2005— February 28, 2013

Joseph Alois Ratzinger was born in Marktl am Inn, Bavaria, on April 16, 1927—Holy Saturday— and was baptized that same day, the first to be received into the Church in the new Easter waters. He entered the minor seminary at the age of 12 but his studies were interrupted by the outbreak of WWII and with most of his class was drafted into the army at the age of 16. Joseph did not believe in the merits of the war and deplored the Nazi ideology. He soon deserted, returning to his family when the war had concluded. He quickly resumed his education in philosophy and theology and was ordained a priest side by side with his brother Georg in 1951. He spent the next 20 years of his life as a professor of dogma and theology at several German universities and earned the reputation of a gifted lecturer and learned scholar. He was present at the Second Vatican Council for all four sessions as a peritus, or theological advisor,

He was ordained an archbishop in May 1977 and was elevated to the College of Cardinals just a month later. He became one of the most influential men in the Roman curia under Pope John Paul II. The best known office he held was the Prefect of the Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith and helped settle many important theological disputes. When Pope John Paul II died in 2005, he presided over the funeral and his homily detailing the needs of the Church so impressed the College of Cardinals that he was elected the 265th Successor of St. Peter, taking the name Pope Benedict XVI after St. Benedict, the patron of Europe.

As pope, he sought to reverse the moral decline sweeping across the western world by giving a staunch defense of Christian values. At the same time he sought to improve relations with those of other religions such as the Lutheran World Federation, Judaism, Islam, the Anglican Communion, and the Orthodox Churches by engaging them in discourse. He spoke out against human rights abuses and political conflicts. He sought ever to defend traditional Catholic doctrine and values.

On February 11, 2013, he shocked the world with an announcement that he would resign as supreme pontiff on February 28th and that a conclave should be convened to elect a new pope. He returned to Rome and remained after Jorge Bergoglio succeeded him as the Bishop of Rome. He remained in his retirement at Mater Ecclesiae Monastery in the Vatican Gardens until his death. During this time, he was known as Pope Emeritus and retained his papal name. He spent the next nearly ten years writing, studying, and praying for the Church. Pope Benedict XVI died on December 31, 2022. His final words were "Signore ti amo," Italian for "Lord, I love you." He was laid to rest on January 5th.
