

From our Pastoral Associate:

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus tells us of a great wedding feast that a king threw for his son. Many are invited to the feast, but they all end up not comingsome just ignore the invitation, some come up with excuses, and some beat the servants who bring the message. Enraged, the king sends troops to destroy them and then reissues another invitation to anyone will come. Even so, he finds a man not wearing a wedding garment and casts him out.

The imagery of a wedding banquet should readily remind us of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, in which we celebrate the wedding of Christ to his Church in the Eucharist. Jesus invites many to the wedding banquet but few come, either from ignoring their need, distractions, or even open hostility to those that invite them. The warning about not



wearing "a wedding garment" (which we can take to mean having a clean soul that is prepared for the Mass) is shocking and troubling. Even those that make it to the wedding may still be sent to hell (what is clearly being referred to in "the darkness outside, where there will be wailing and gnashing of teeth").

We should ask ourselves these questions: Do I ignore Christ's invitation to come to Mass, choosing to sometimes not attend Sunday Mass if something else is going on? Do I take the invitation to go to Mass even on weekdays seriously? Do I prepare myself adequately for Mass? Do I show up to the Church with enough time to pray and properly dispose myself to what is happening in the Liturgy? Do I stay for a little time after Mass thanking Jesus for what I have just received? Do I go to confession regularly, especially if I have sinned in a grave matter? Am I seeking to amend my faults and make progress in virtue?

We should be regularly examining our consciences on these matters. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that "The Eucharist is the source and summit of the Christian life." (1324) If that is the case, we need the Eucharist for our Christian life just as much as we need air and food for our bodies. There is nothing more important in our lives that we could ever do than to go to Mass. So let's be sure that we're doing it well, and giving Jesus the attention he deserves.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-Margaret Mary Alacogue St. Margaret Mary was born into a large well-to-do family in Burgundy France in 1647. From her childhood, Margaret was deeply devoted to the Blessed Sacrament. As a child she suffered from rheumatic fever which confined her to bed for four years. She was miraculously healed after she promised the Blessed Virgin that she would consecrate herself in religious life. In the convent, she was given many trials to test her vocation. A fellow novice described her as "humble, simple and frank, but above all kind and patient." During her time in the convent, she had several private revelations of Jesus, which would foster the Sacred Heart Devotion in the Church. He asked her to spread this devotion. Among the chief features of the devotion was Holy Communion on the First Friday of every month, Eucharistic Adoration on Thursdays in honor of Christ's agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, and a Feast of the Sacred Heart. Although she ran into obstacles, she was able to convince her superior but she faced severe opposition from several priests and many members of her community. Despite it all, she persisted and the devotion spread, particularly after her death in 1690. The Sacred Heart Devotion is now arguably the most prominent devotion to Jesus in the Western Catholic Church.

Mission Sunday Collection

On October 21-22 we will have a second collection for the Mission Sunday Collection. In 1926 Pope Pius XI instituted Mission Sunday for the whole Church and the first collection was received in 1927. This day is celebrated throughout the world as the feast of catholicity and universal solidarity so Christians the world over will recognize their common responsibility with regard to the evangelization of the world. We ask that you be as generous as you are able in support of the Church's missions throughout the world.

For Your Reflection:

In our offering of the holy sacrifice we fulfill the command of our Savior, as recorded by the apostle Paul: The Lord Jesus, on the night in which he was betrayed, took bread, and after he had given thanks, broke it and said: This is my body, which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me. The same way, after the supper, he took the cup saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you shall proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes.

This sacrifice is offered, then, to proclaim the Lord's death; it is offered in remembrance of him who laid down his life for our sake. As he says: Greater love than this no one has, that one lay down his life for his friends. Because Christ died for us out of love, we ask, when we make remembrance of his death at the time of sacrifice, that we too may be granted love through the coming of the Holy Spirit. We pray that by the love which Christ had for us when he braved the cross, we may receive the grace of the Spirit and be crucified to the world, and the world to us. The death Christ died, he died to sin, once for all, but the life he lives, he lives to God. Let us imitate our Lord's death, and also live a new life. Strengthened with the gift of his love, let us die to sin and live for God. For God's love has been poured out in our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us. Indeed our sharing in the Lord's body and blood when we eat his bread and drink his cup teaches us that we should die to the world, and that we should keep our life hidden with Christ in God, crucifying our flesh with its vices and evil desires.

That is why all the faithful who love God and their neighbor truly drink the cup of the Lord's love even though they may not drink the cup of his bodily suffering. And becoming inebriated from it, they put to death whatever in their nature is rooted in earth. They clothe themselves with the Lord Jesus Christ and do not indulge fleshly desires. They do not fix their gaze on visible things, but contemplate things which the eye cannot see. Thus they drink the Lord's cup by preserving the holy bond of love; without it, even if a man should deliver *his* body to be *burned*, he gains nothing. But the gift of love enables us to become in reality what we celebrate as mystery in the sacrifice.

Prayer of the Week

The Sub Tuum

Sub tuum praesidium confugimus, Sancta Dei Genetrix. Nostras deprecationes ne despicias in necessitatibus, sed a periculis cunctis libera nos semper, Virgo gloriosa et benedicta.

We fly to thy protection, O Holy Mother of God; Do not despise our petitions in our necessities, but ever deliver from all dangers, O Glorious and Blessed Virgin.

This prayer originated around 250 AD and is considered the earliest recorded prayer to the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is likely even older than that. Beloved by both the Catholic and Orthodox Churches, this prayer is know as the Sub Tuum Praesidium in Latin.
