



IN MARY'S TEARS AND SORROWS WE FIND GRACE

From our Pastoral Associate:

In our second reading today, the author of the letter to the Hebrews tells us that Jesus is our great High Priest who can sympathize with our weakness. In the Old Testament, the High Priest was the one that offered worship to God, particularly by sacrifice. He stood as the representative of the nation of Israel before God, being the only one that could minister in the Holy of Holies, the most sacred area of the Temple where the Ark of the Covenant was kept. This was only done by the High Priest and only once a year when he would ask mercy on Yom Kippur for the sins of his nation. This was such an important task and required such ritual purity that the people sewed bells to the hem of the High Priest's garments and had a rope tied around his waste so that if he should die in the presence of God, they would hear the cessation of the bells



and be able to pull him out of the Holy of Holies without entering and offending God themselves.

The letter to the Hebrews describes Jesus as our High Priest, who has entered the heavenly sanctuary before his Father once and for all. He no longer has to leave as other priests were required to do on account of his sins, but remains as both the sinless priest and the sinless offering that makes expiation for our sins. Moreover, as our High Priest he is able to sympathize with our weakness because he took on flesh and become one of us. The author of the letter encourages us to confidently approach the throne of grace to receive mercy and timely help. Jesus has made this possible through his death, which we read in the prophecy of Isaiah is an offering for our sin, bearing our guilt.

When we feel weak or need help from God, we should remember that we have an advocate for us in heaven, our Mediator who is Jesus. He knows what we need and so we should confidently turn to him and trust that he will give us the grace we need to overcome temptations, obstacles, and the burden of our sins. He loves us with a tenderness and mercy beyond words. And we likewise should love him with a faith and devotion worthy of it.



Saints of the Week-St. John Paul II

Born in Wadowice, Poland, Karol Jozef Wojtyla had lost his mother, father, and older brother before his 21st birthday. Karol's promising academic career at Krakow's Jagiellonian University was cut short by the outbreak of World War II. While working in a quarry and a chemical factory, he enrolled in an "underground" seminary in Kraków. Ordained in 1946, he was immediately sent to Rome where he earned a doctorate in theology. Back in Poland, a short assignment as assistant pastor in a rural parish preceded his very fruitful chaplaincy for university students. Soon Fr. Wojtyla earned a doctorate in philosophy and began teaching that subject at Poland's University of Lublin. Communist officials allowed Wojtyla to be appointed auxiliary bishop of Kraków in 1958, considering him a relatively harmless intellectual. They could not have been more wrong! Bishop Wojtyla attended all four sessions of Vatican II. Appointed as archbishop of Kraków in 1964, he was named a cardinal three years later. Elected pope in October 1978, he took the name of his short-lived, immediate predecessor. Pope John Paul II was the first non-Italian pope in 455 years. In time, he made pastoral visits to 124 countries, including several with small Christian populations. His 1979 visit to Poland encouraged the growth of the Solidarity movement there and the collapse of communism in central and eastern Europe 10 years later. One of the most well-remembered photos of John Paul II's pontificate was his one-on-one conversation in 1983, with Mehmet Ali Agca, who had attempted to assassinate him two years earlier. In his 27 years of papal ministry, John Paul II wrote 14 encyclicals and five books, canonized 482 saints and beatified 1,338 people, more than all other popes combined. In the last years of his life, he suffered from Parkinson's disease and was forced to cut back on some of his activities. He died in 2005. He was beatified in 2011 and canonized in 2014.

Why Do We Do That?

Why do we say "And with your Spirit" when the priest says "The Lord be with you?"

At Mass, we are greeted several times with the greeting "The Lord be with you!" He says this to We respond "And with your spirit." This greeting occurs between bishop or priest or in certain instances, deacons, and the people. It is never used in the Roman liturgy between a non-ordained person and the congregation.

By expressing the words "The Lord be with you," the priest is expressing his desire that the powerful activity of God's spirit be given to the people of God, especially to enable them to do the work of transforming the world that God has entrusted to them. We as the laity are called to go out and bring the world to Christ through our work, our prayer, our relationships, and our families.

We as the laity in turn respond back to the bishop, priest, or deacon with "and with your spirit." This is not a mere "Back at ya" response, but an acknowledgment that in the sacrament of Holy Orders that clergy receive, their soul is configured in a special way to Christ. Christ, our High Priest is specially present in the ordained ministers in their capacity to offer the sacraments. It is not merely Bishop Johnston or Fr. Leonard or Deacon Mike that offers us the sacraments, but it is Christ working powerfully through them by the gift of their ordination in his priesthood. St. John Chrysostom, during a homily, explained,

"If the Holy Spirit were not in our Bishop [referring to Bishop Flavian of Antioch] when he gave the peace to all shortly before ascending to his holy sanctuary, you would not have replied to him all together, And with your spirit. This is why you reply with this expression ... reminding yourselves by this reply that he who is here does nothing of his own power, nor are the offered gifts the work of human nature, but is it the grace of the Spirit present and hovering over all things which prepared that mystic sacrifice."

Our response to the clergy acknowledges this supreme gift in the hope that Christ will once again work through them in the work of salvation present in the sacraments we receive.
