



From our Pastoral Associate:

In our readings today, there is a heavy emphasis on humility, probably the only virtue that practically every person who has ever lived struggles with on a day to day basis. It is not hard to see why- it is commonly believed that pride, most especially, was the sin that caused Adam and Eve to fall. They stretched out their hands to the fruit of the tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, rather than the Tree of Life, because they desired to be more like God in his knowledge than in his immortality. We hear echoes of this in our psalm today that sings



"Oh Lord, my heart is not proud, nor haughty my eyes. I have not gone after things too great, nor marvels beyond me." The psalm teaches us the attitude we should take in the face of pride-humility.

Humility is not simply thinking lowly things about ourselves. Humility is first and foremost the ability to see the truth about ourselves- particularly in relation to God. Pride is therefore the opposite of humility- believing something false about ourselvesparticularly in relation to God. How often do we see ourselves as greater than someone else in the room, possibly in regards of our intelligence, our moral fortitude, our strength, our talents, our possessions, maybe even our looks? And let's be honest, sometimes it may be true. But do we ever attribute those things to the blessing of God instead of ourselves? Or do we think that we have these things simply because of who we are in and of ourselves? This would be the sin of pride. Seeing ourselves for who we are in truth means that we need to recognize that all of these things are gifts of God and do not stem from my own self. Without God, I am nothing. I wouldn't even have existence. As such, we should turn to God in gratitude for the things we have been given, simultaneously acknowledging the gifts he has given others that he has not given to ourselves. We should also acknowledge our faults and vices that we struggle with as we look at ourselves as they are perhaps the only thing we can truly claim to be ours. When looking on the fault of others, we should not judge, but look in pity, as ones also suffering and say, "but for the grace of God go I." Ultimately we need to rely on God for all the things that we need and to thank him for the things he has given us. We should pray earnestly for others as we see their needs, always with an eye toward God in hope of his saving help. Let us remember the final line from our psalm today: "O Israel, hope in the Lord, both now and forever."

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- Pope St. Leo the Great

St. Leo the Great was pope from 440 until his death in 461. Before being elected pope, he was a well known Archdeacon in Rome and highly esteemed for being a capable theologian. Following the death of Pope St. Sixtus III, Leo was elected unanimously as his successor. He was a vigorous defender against various heresies of the time. He was a capable preacher and arguably his most famous sermon at Christmas is read every year in the Liturgy of the Hours. His most notable contribution came at the council of Chalcedon in 451 when Leo wrote a Tome to the council regarding the proper orthodox teaching on the two natures of Christ, human and divine. When it was read, the council fathers cried out "This is the faith of the fathers, this is the faith of the Apostles... Peter has spoken thus through Leo." Leo is also renowned for meeting with Atilla the Hun outside the gates of Rome and convincing him not to sack the city. A few years later, he dissuaded King Genseric from murder and arson as he sacked the city, saving the major churches of Rome and thus the many people who were sheltering there. Leo died in 461 and was buried in St. Peter's Basilica. He is a Doctor of the Church and is one of only three popes in history to have the title "the Great" follow his name.

Catholic Movie Night

The Legion of Mary plans to host a Catholic movie night every other month.

Our first movie will be **The Scarlet and the Black**: When the Nazis took control of Italy during WWII, they occupied Rome. A priest in the Vatican, Monsignor Hugh O'Flaherty (Gregory Peck) is in charge of the escape network of those that are wanted by the Nazis. O'Flaherty is soon identified as the leader and the real cat and mouse game between the Irish priest and Colonel Herbert Kappler (Christopher Plummer), head of the Gestapo, begins. For Your Reflection:

Men must not be content simply to support the efforts of others in the work for peace; they must also scrutinize their own attitudes. Statesmen, responsible as they are for the common good of their own nation and at the same time for the well-being of the whole world, are very much dependent on the opinions and convictions of the general public. Their efforts to secure peace are of no avail as long as men are divided or set against each other by feelings of hostility, contempt and distrust, by racial hatred or by inflexible ideologies. There is then a very great and urgent need to reeducate men and to provide fresh inspiration in the field of public opinion. We must all undergo a change of heart. We must not be misled by a false sense of hope. Unless antagonism and hatred are abandoned, unless binding and honest agreements are concluded, safeguarding universal peace in the future, mankind, already in grave peril, may well face in spite of its marvelous advance in knowledge that day of disaster when it knows no other peace than the awful peace of death.

In saying this, however, the Church of Christ, living as it does in the midst of these anxious times, continues unwaveringly in hope. Time and again, it seeks to proclaim to our age the message of the Apostle: Now is the hour of God's favor, the hour for change of heart; now is the day of salvation.

To build peace, the causes of human discord which feed the fires of war must first be eliminated, and among these especially the violations of justice. Many of these arise from a spirit of domination and from a contempt for others, and, among more fundamental causes, from human envy, distrust, pride and other forms of selfishness. Since man cannot bear so many violations of due order, the result is that, even where war does not rage, the world is constantly plagued by human conflict and acts of violence. The same evils are also found in relations between nations. It is therefore absolutely necessary that international institutions should cooperate more effectively in order to overcome or prevent these evils, and to check unbridled acts of violence. There must also be constant encouragement for the creation of organizations designed to promote peace.
