ANNUAL CATHOLIC APPEAL

Dear Friends and Beloved Parishioners of Our Lady of Sorrows, I hope this message finds you well and filled with the joy of the holiday season. Today, I would like to draw your attention to the significance of the Annual Catholic Appeal, a crucial initiative that profoundly impacts our parish and the wider diocese. As an independent parish, we are intricately connected to the workings of our diocese, and the Annual Catholic Appeal plays a pivotal role in supporting over 30 ministries overseen by the Diocesan Chancery Offices. These ministries extend their assistance not only to our parish but also to Catholics across the

entire diocese. In essence, the ACA serves as the lifeblood that fortifies our parish and empowers every parish within the diocese to carry out the ministry's work as one united family of disciples of Our Lord.

Our collective goal for the Annual Catholic Appeal this year is \$2 million, with each parish being allocated a specific portion. For **Our Lady of Sorrows, our share is \$12,850, constituting a mere 0.0064% of the overall goal.** Unfortunately, at this point, our parish has contributed only \$2,200, representing 17% of our annual goal. In contrast, one-third of the parishes in the diocese have already met their annual goals, and over 85% have surpassed the halfway mark. This signals a concerning situation for us, and it's crucial that we address it collectively.

Looking ahead, I earnestly urge each one of you to consider supporting our diocese during this season of giving. You can contribute by sending your Annual Catholic Appeal envelopes directly to the diocese. If you don't have envelopes, a simple yet impactful way to contribute is by writing a check payable to:

It's important to note that unlike previous years, where parishes falling short of their goals were forgiven by the Bishop, this year is different. 

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- St. Lucy

St. Lucy was born to rich and noble parents in 283. Her father was a Roman and her mother may have been a Greek. Her father died when she was 5. St. Lucy consecrated her virginity to God, but her mother, who was suffering from a bleeding disorder, was not aware of it and arranged for her to be married to young man of a wealthy pagan family. Lucy accompanied her mother to the shrine of St. Agatha, who had been martyred 52 years before, and prayed for a miracle for her mother. St. Agatha visited Lucy in a dream and told her that her mother would be cured and Lucy would share the same glory as her. With her mother cured, Lucy convinced her to distribute a great part of her riches to the poor. The news that Lucy was distributing her wealth came to her betrothed, who denounced her as a Christian to Paschasius, their governor. She was brought before him and ordered to sacrifice to the emperor's image. When she refused, he sentenced her to be defiled in a brothel. When the soldiers came to take her away, they could not move her, even when they hitched her to a team of oxen. Bundles of wood were then heaped around her but would not burn. She finally met her end when a sword was thrust into her throat.

Catholic Movie Night

Our first Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be on Sunday, Dec 10th at 6pm. Our first movie will be The Scarlet and the Black: When the Nazis took control of Italy during WWII, they occupied Rome. A priest in the Vatican, Monsignor Hugh O'Flaherty (Gregory Peck) is in charge of the escape network of those that are wanted by the Nazis. Msgr. O'Flaherty is soon identified by the SS as the leader of the escape organization and the real cat and mouse game between the Irish priest and Colonel Herbert Kappler (Christopher Plummer), head of the Gestapo, begins. Based on a true story.

For Your Reflection:

The voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight the paths of our God. The prophecy makes clear that it is to be fulfilled, not in Jerusalem but in the wilderness: it is there that the glory of the Lord is to appear, and God's salvation is to be made known to all mankind.

It was in the wilderness that God's saving presence was proclaimed by John the Baptist, and there that God's salvation was seen. The words of this prophecy were fulfilled when Christ and his glory were made manifest to all: after his baptism the heavens opened, and the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove rested on him, and the Father's voice was heard, bearing witness to the Son: *This is my beloved Son, listen to him.*

The prophecy meant that God was to come to a deserted place, inaccessible from the beginning. None of the pagans had any knowledge of God, since his holy servants and prophets were kept from approaching them. The voice commands that a way be prepared for the Word of God: the rough and trackless ground is to be made level, so that our God may find a highway when he comes. Prepare the way of the Lord: the way is the preaching of the Gospel, the new message of consolation, ready to bring to all mankind the knowledge of God's saving power. Climb on a high mountain, bearer of good news to Zion. Lift up your voice in strength, bearer of good news to Jerusalem. These words harmonize very well with the meaning of what has gone before. They refer opportunely to the evangelists and proclaim the coming of God to men, after speaking of the voice crying in the wilderness. Mention of the evangelists suitably follows the prophecy on John the Baptist.

What does Zion mean if not the city previously called Jerusalem? This is the Zion, the Jerusalem, that received God's salvation. It stands aloft on the mountain of God, that is, it is raised high on the only-begotten Word of God. It is commanded to climb the high mountain and announce the word of salvation. Who is the bearer of the good news but the company of the evangelists? What does it mean to bear the good news but to preach to all nations, but first of all to the cities of Judah, the coming of Christ on earth?
