From our Pastoral Associate:

In our Gospel reading today, John the Baptist announces that "there is one among you whom you do not recognize, the one who is coming after me, whose sandal strap I am not worthy to untie." Up to this point, John's preaching had been vexing to the authorities. They were unsure what to make of him. So they sent priests and Levites to question him. John tells them that he is not the Christ, he is not Elijah, he is not the prophet that Moses foretold would arise that would be like himself. Instead, John tells them that he is the fulfillment of the prophecy of Isaiah in which is stated "I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, make straight the paths of the Lord." John's humility is on full display in this story. He openly denies the greatest possibilities of who he is- the Christ, Elijah, the New Moses. His answers to the questioners get steadily shorter, fulfilling a later moment of humility in which John would declare, "He (Christ)



must increase. I must decrease." It is essential that he not let his ego get in the way of the coming of the great Messiah. Instead he prepares the crowds for his great appearance. In every way, John understands his mission, his vocation, and his identity. He does not allow himself to inflate his identity or to allow himself to run away with possibilities, wasting the people's time, which is short.

We too should be like John the Baptist, eager and anxious for the coming of Jesus and ready to meet him the moment he appears. We should be ready to get out of his way and not allow ourselves to be the center of attention. John provides a masterful example of how to do this.

Finally, we should heed his advice, make straight the way of the Lord. Have we prepared our homes for the coming of the Messiah? Have we prepared our hearts? John tells us to prepare the way. In all of our preparations for Christmas, we should not lose track of the fact that this is the celebration of Jesus' birth and we look forward

in anticipation when Jesus will once again walk onto the stage for the final act. We, like John the Baptist, should be ready, as he was, to proclaim to the world, "Behold the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!"

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Zechariah

St. Zechariah was the father of St. John the Baptist, the Forerunner of the Lord. He was Jewish priest who served at the time of King Herod. He and his wife were childless in their old age. During his time to serve in the Temple, Zechariah was chosen by the casting of lots to minister at the Altar of Incense, which stood before the veil of the Temple that shrouded the Holy of Holies. During this supreme moment, he was visited by the Angel Gabriel, who announced to him that his wife would bear him a son in his old age that would be the prophet that would prepare the way for the Messiah. Zechariah, however, asked for a sign for proof of thisdemonstrating a lack of faith. For this, the sign given to him is that he would be unable to speak until the baby was born. Elizabeth conceived and, during her pregnancy, was cared for by the Blessed Virgin Mary. Zechariah learned of the coming of the Messiah and, as later events proved, was joyed by the news. When John the Baptist was born, Zechariah wrote his name on a tablet. Suddenly, he was allowed to speak and his song of praise to God, the Benedictus, is sung daily by the Church during morning prayer. It is unclear when he died, but it is possible he died protecting John during the Massacre of the Innocents by Herod.

Catholic Movie Night

Our first Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, **will be on Sunday, Feb 18th at 6pm.** Our next movie will be **There Be Dragons** (2011), a fictional retelling of the life of St. Josemaría Escrivá, the founder of Opus Dei: Arising out of the horror of the Spanish Civil War, a candidate for canonization, Josemaría Escrivá, is investigated by a journalist who discovers that his own estranged father had a deep, dark and devastating connection to the saint's life. As he uncovers the truth, he learns more about his origins and learns much about forgiveness and the power of faith. Don't miss such an excellent movie!

For Your Reflection:

To speak of our Lord, the son of the Blessed Virgin Mary, as true and perfect man is of no value to us if we do not believe that he is descended from the line of ancestors set out in the Gospel.

Matthew's gospel begins by setting out the genealogy of Jesus Christ, son of David, son of Abraham, and then traces his human descent by bringing his ancestral line down to his mother's husband, Joseph. On the other hand, Luke traces his parentage backward step by step to the actual father of mankind, to show that both the first and the last Adam share the same nature.

No doubt the Son of God in his omnipotence could have taught and sanctified men by appearing to them in a semblance of human form as he did to the patriarchs and prophets, when for instance he engaged in a wrestling contest or entered into conversation with them, or when he accepted their hospitality and even ate the food they set before him. But these appearances were only types, signs that mysteriously foretold the coming of one who would take a true human nature from the stock of the patriarchs who had gone before him. No mere figure, then, fulfilled the mystery of our reconciliation with God, ordained from all eternity. The divine nature and the nature of a servant were to be united in one person so that the Creator of time might be born in time, and he through whom all things were made might be brought forth in their midst. For unless the new man, by being made in the likeness of sinful humanity, had taken on himself the nature of our first parents, unless he had stooped to be one in substance with his mother while sharing the Father's substance and, being alone free from sin, united our nature to his, the whole human race would still be held captive under the dominion of Satan. The Conqueror's victory would have profited us nothing if the battle had been fought outside our human condition. But through this wonderful blending the mystery of new birth shone upon us, so that through the same Spirit by whom Christ was conceived and brought forth we too might be born again in a spiritual birth; and in consequence the evangelist declares the faithful to have been born not of blood, nor of the desire of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God.
