### From our Pastoral Associate:

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, which always comes on the Sunday immediately after Christmas. On this feast day, we reflect on this most unique family, a model for all the rest of our families on earth.

But why is this family the model for all others? The Holy Family was something entirely new— and never to be repeated. And there seem to be real difficulties in the family— Joseph is not Jesus' biological father and the couple, according to Mary's own answer to the angel, appear to have taken a vow of celibacy. So how are they a model for us and for the every day family?

The answer lies, of course, in the child. Whereas most couples are united by their vows and by their relationship with one another that creates unity and brings forth a child, in the Holy Family, it is Jesus himself that creates the unity of their



relationship. Both Matthew and Luke show this close unity between Mary and Joseph. Both go to Bethlehem and suffer together because there was no room for them in the inn. Together, they present Jesus in the Temple. Together, they save Jesus from the murderous hatred of King Herod. They go to Egypt and return together. They search diligently for him in the Temple. They educate him, feed him, care for his needs, defend him. They help him to grow in awareness of his Divine vocation to be the Messiah. This would have undoubtedly challenged and deepened their faith, not only in him, but in one another as well. Their warm human love for one another would have grown and deepened precisely in this common concern, service, and love for Jesus. So while the Holy Family is unique, there is much that our families can learn from and strive to imitate in our daily lives. Are we seeking to serve and seek Jesus in our family lives? How are we doing it? Wheat things can be added to our family routing to make

Do you know the names of the people in front of you, or next to you, or behind you at Mass? If not, why? Take some time to introduce yourself. Become familiar with your fellow parishioners. Attend the many ministries that our parish provides, and grow together in the mutual love of Jesus Christ, always using the Holy Family as our guide.



# **Ministries & Reflections**



### Saint of the Week-St. John Neumann

St. John Neumann was a Catholic immigrant to the United States. He was born in 1811 in the Kingdom of Bohemia, in what is now the Czech Republic. He came to the United States in 1836, having already completed his seminary education but not yet having been ordained because his diocese had too many priests. He arrived with one tattered suit of clothes and a dollar in his pocket. Within a month of his arrival he was ordained by the Bishop of New York, who was badly in need of German priests. After several years of ministry in parishes, Neumann sought something more and joined the Redemptorists, moving to Philadelphia. He was the first Redemptorist to be invested with the habit in the New World. He eventually became their Provincial Superior. In 1852, the Holy See appointed him Bishop of Philadelphia. He inherited a rapidly expanding diocese with a new parish being completed each month. One of the first things he did was erect a Catholic school system, with 200 schools being established during his time as bishop. His diocese was poor and Neumann was well known for his frugality, giving gifts given to him to newly ordained priests. He died while running errands in the street of Philadelphia. He was canonized by Pope St. Paul VI in 1977, the first man with American citizenship to be canonized a saint.

### Catholic Movie Night

Our first Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be on Sunday, Feb 18th at 6pm. Our next movie will be There Be Dragons (2011), a fictional retelling of the life of St. Josemaría Escrivá, the founder of Opus Dei: Arising out of the horror of the Spanish Civil War, a candidate for canonization, Josemaría Escrivá, is investigated by a journalist who discovers that his own estranged father had a deep, dark and devastating connection to the saint's life. As he uncovers the truth, he learns more about his origins and learns much about forgiveness and the power of faith. Don't miss such an excellent movie!

### For Your Reflection:

Nazareth is a school where we may begin to discover what Christ's life was like and to understand his Gospel. Here we can observe and ponder the simple appeal of the way God's Son came to be known, profound yet full of hidden meaning. And gradually we may even learn to imitate him. Here we can learn to realize who Christ really is. And here we can sense and take account of the conditions and circumstances that surrounded and affected his life on earth: the places, the tenor of the times, the culture, the language, religious customs, in brief everything which Jesus used to make himself known to the world. Here everything speaks to us, everything has meaning. Here we can learn the importance of spiritual discipline for all who wish to follow Christ and to live by the teachings of his Gospel. How wonderful to be close to Mary, learning again the lesson of the true meaning of life, learning again God's truths. But I cannot leave without recalling, some thoughts I take with me from Nazareth. First, we learn from its silence. If only we could once again appreciate its great value. We need this wonderful state of mind, beset as we are by the cacophony conflicting claims so characteristic of these turbulent times. The silence of Nazareth should teach us how to meditate in peace and quiet, to reflect on the deeply spiritual, and to be open to the voice of God's inner wisdom and the counsel of his true teachers. Nazareth can teach us the value of study and preparation, of meditation, of a well-ordered personal spiritual life, and of silent prayer that is known only to God. Second, may Nazareth serve as a model of what the family should be. May it show us the family's holy and enduring character and its basic function in society: a community of love and sharing, beautiful for the problems it poses and the rewards it brings; in sum, the perfect setting for rearing children—and for this there is no substitute. Finally, in Nazareth, the home of a craftsman's son, we learn about work and the discipline it entails. I would especially like to recognize its valuedemanding yet redeeming—and to give it proper respect. Work has its own dignity. On the other hand, it is not an end in itself. Its value and free character, derive not only from its place in the economic system, as they say, but rather from the purpose it serves.
