

#### From our Pastoral Associate

Our Gospel reading today focuses on Jesus healing the leper. I've always be struck by the beauty of this moment. This man, who has been an outcast for many years and has seen precious little compassion for just as long. Leprosy did not have a cure at that time and people were



harshly quarantined to keep it from spreading. One who had leprosy had to walk along, constantly shouting out "unclean, unclean" so that people would know not to approach them. Physical contact, hugs, embraces, and all that we typically rely on to show affection were denied them, as that is how the disease is spread. It's very hard to imagine the suffering, not only from the illness, but also the isolation.

This man, having learned of Jesus' remarkable power to heal nearly any illness or ailment, decides to seek him out for healing. Finding Jesus, he approaches him in confident faith and states, "Lord, if you will, you can make me clean." Jesus does not recoil. He does not scold him for not keeping back. Rather, he touches him—probably the first friendly touch he's had in years- and says, "I do will it. Be made clean." It is not hard to hear these words spoken to us as well. We, in our sin, have made ourselves odious and a thing of disgust and unlovely. We have separated ourselves from God either partially or, in the case of mortal sin, completely. But if we have faith in Jesus, we can approach him in the sacrament of confession and hear him say "Be made clean" through the words of absolution that the priest recites.

When was the last time you went to confession? Lent is drawing near and it is a good time to turn from our sin and to seek God's mercy, which is boundless. I encourage you, particularly during this Lent, to avail yourself of this beautiful and healing sacrament. If we are truly contrite and know how desperately we need God, we will have the same relief that the leper felt when Jesus suddenly restored to him human comfort, society with those around him, healing of the pain of his body, and most importantly, a new life in Jesus. Jesus wants to be clean. So let us seek the cleansing.

# Saint of the Week- The Seven Founders of the Servite Order

In 1233, seven Florentine laymen—two married, two widowed, three single—all well-known merchants and members of a Marian confraternity, abandoned homes, jobs, and wealth for a life of poverty, prayer, and penance at Monte Senario, where they built a chapel and hermitage. They all witnessed a vision of the Blessed Virgin in the leadup to their flight from the world. Within a few years, they formed the Order of Friar Servants of Mary, or Servites, a mendicant order that received formal papal approval in 1304. They received another vision of Mary in which she instructed them in their mission, clothed them in the habit and gave them their rule of life. At the center of their mission was spreading and encouraging devotion to the Seven Sorrows of Mary, particularly in the Seven Sorrows Chaplet. Their order soon received papal approval and quickly spread throughout Europe. Today it has foundations even in the Americas. The seven founders, jointly canonized in 1888, are: Sts. Bonfilius, Bonajuncta, Amadeus, Hugh, Manettus, Sostene, and Alexis. Alexis, who out of modesty refused ordination, served the order in various ways as a lay brother; he outlived the other founders and reportedly died at age 110.

# Catholic Movie Night

Our next movie will be There Be Dragons (2011), a fictional retelling of the life of St. Josemaría Escrivá, the founder of Opus Dei: Arising out of the horror of the Spanish Civil War, a candidate for canonization, Josemaría Escrivá, is investigated by a journalist who discovers that his own estranged father had a deep, dark and devastating connection to the saint's life. As he uncovers the truth, he learns more about his origins and learns much about forgiveness and the power of faith. Don't miss such an excellent movie!

#### For Your Reflection:

Lord, who can comprehend even one of your words? We lose more of it than we grasp, like those who drink from a living spring. For God's word offers different facets according to the capacity of the listener, and the Lord has portrayed his message in many colors, so that whoever gazes upon it can see in it what suits him. Within it he has buried manifold treasures, so that each of us might grow rich in seeking them out.

The word of God is a tree of life that offers us blessed fruit from each of its branches. It is like that rock which was struck open in the wilderness, from which all were offered spiritual drink. As the Apostle says: They are spiritual food and they drank spiritual drink.

And so whenever anyone discovers some part of the treasure, he should not think that he has exhausted God's word. Instead he should feel that this is all that he was able to find of the wealth contained in it. Nor should he say that the word is weak and sterile or look down on it simply because this portion was all that he happened to find. But precisely because he could not capture it all he should give thanks for its riches.

Be glad then that you are overwhelmed, and do not be saddened because he has overcome you. A thirsty man is happy when he is drinking, and he is not depressed because he cannot exhaust the spring. So let this spring quench your thirst, and not your thirst the spring. For if you can satisfy your thirst without exhausting the spring, then when you thirst again you can drink from it once more; but if when your thirst is sated the spring is also dried up, then your victory would turn to your own harm.

Be thankful then for what you have received, and do not be saddened at all that such an abundance still remains. What you have received and attained is your present share, while what is left will be your heritage. For what you could not take at one time because of your weakness, you will be able to grasp at another if you only persevere. So do not foolishly try to drain in one draught what cannot be consumed all at once, and do not cease out of faintheartedness from what you will be able to absorb as time goes on.
