



#### IN MARY'S TEARS AND SORROWS WE FIND GRACE

#### From our Pastoral Associate:

Our first reading cautions us against trusting in human beings. It's to be understood here that we shouldn't place human beings in the place of God-trusting them as we trust him. Rather, we should put our trust in the Lord, the source of our joy, our existence, our very being. This is why our first reading and the psalm speak of the righteous man as "like a tree planted near running water; that yields its fruit in due season and whose leaves never fade." On the flip side, the man who trusts in other men "is like a barren bush in the desert that enjoys no change of season, but stands in a lava waste, a salt and empty earth." Our entire existence is a gift from



God. Our satisfaction comes from him, our deepest longings are fulfilled in him. Without him we shrivel up and die, becoming nothing, and certainly do not thrive. With this in mind, our Gospel reading is chosen from Jesus' Sermon on the Plain in Luke, where Jesus expresses the Beatitudes. Jesus speaks of poverty, hunger, weeping, being hated and insulted. Jesus flips these many things that we take as ill as blessingsnot because they are good in an of themselves but because if they are from following God and being rooted in him, you will be truly blessed, despite your difficult circumstances. Holiness runs into trouble in this world because this world is in rebellion to God. Consequently Jesus states that those who are rich, filled, laugh and are spoken well of in this world are on their way of woe. This does not mean that Jesus does not want us to be happy in this life. He does. He made creation for our enjoyment. He died on the Cross so that we could be free of the grip of this world. But as long as it remains in rebellion against God, it will never truly be home for us. It's essential that we trust his word and live by his commandments. Only then will be like the one described in Jeremiah: "a tree planted beside the waters that stretches its roots to the stream: it fears not the heat when it comes; its leaves stay green; in the year of drought it shows no distress, but still bears fruit."

# Saint of the Week- The Seven Founders of the Servite Order

In 1233, seven Florentine laymen—two married, two widowed, three single—all well-known merchants and members of a Marian confraternity, abandoned homes, jobs, and wealth for a life of poverty, prayer, and penance at Monte Senario, where they built a chapel and hermitage. They all witnessed a vision of the Blessed Virgin in the leadup to their flight from the world. Within a few years, they formed the Order of Friar Servants of Mary, or Servites, a mendicant order that received formal papal approval in 1304. They received another vision of Mary in which she instructed them in their mission, clothed them in the habit and gave them their rule of life. At the center of their mission was spreading and encouraging devotion to the Seven Sorrows of Mary, particularly in the Seven Sorrows Chaplet. Their order soon received papal approval and quickly spread throughout Europe. Today it has foundations even in the Americas. The seven founders, jointly canonized in 1888, are: Sts. Bonfilius, Bonajuncta, Amadeus, Hugh, Manettus, Sostene, and Alexis. Alexis, who out of modesty refused ordination, served the order in various ways as a lay brother; he outlived the other founders and reportedly died at age 110.

Hail, true Body, born of the Virgin Mary, truly suffered, sacrificed on the cross for mankind, from whose pierced side flowed water and blood: Be for us a foretaste of the Heavenly banquet in the trial of death!

O sweet Jesus, O holy Jesus, O Jesus, son of Mary, have mercy on me. Amen.

#### For Your Reflection:

Lord, who can comprehend even one of your words? We lose more of it than we grasp, like those who drink from a living spring. For God's word offers different facets according to the capacity of the listener, and the Lord has portrayed his message in many colors, so that whoever gazes upon it can see in it what suits him. Within it he has buried manifold treasures, so that each of us might grow rich in seeking them out

The word of God is a tree of life that offers us blessed fruit from each of its branches. It is like that rock which was struck open in the wilderness, from which all were offered spiritual drink. As the Apostle says: They are spiritual food and they drank spiritual drink.

And so whenever anyone discovers some part of the treasure, he should not think that he has exhausted God's word. Instead he should feel that this is all that he was able to find of the wealth contained in it. Nor should he say that the word is weak and sterile or look down on it simply because this portion was all that he happened to find. But precisely because he could not capture it all he should give thanks for its riches

Be glad then that you are overwhelmed, and do not be saddened because he has overcome you. A thirsty man is happy when he is drinking, and he is not depressed because he cannot exhaust the spring. So let this spring quench your thirst, and not your thirst the spring. For if you can satisfy your thirst without exhausting the spring, then when you thirst again you can drink from it once more; but if when your thirst is sated the spring is also dried up, then your victory would turn to your own harm.

Be thankful then for what you have received, and do not be saddened at all that such an abundance still remains. What you have received and attained is your present share, while what is left will be your heritage. For what you could not take at one time because of your weakness, you will be able to grasp at another if you only persevere. So do not foolishly try to drain in one draught what cannot be consumed all at once, and do not cease out of faintheartedness from what you will be able to absorb as time goes on.


