

From Our Pastor

This weekend, we reflect on the Gospel narrative of Jesus spending 40 days in the desert, during which He faced temptations by the devil. This story mirrors our own experiences with temptation. One might wonder, why do we face temptations? The answer lies in the fact that God created us not as automatons or marionettes, but endowed us with the remarkable gift of free will. This gift presents us with a crucial choice: will we choose God, or will we turn towards something else? It is through our free will that we possess the ability to love, as love itself is a decision - a choice between God and alternatives to

It's important to understand that God neither tempts us nor encourages temptation. However, He can use temptation as a tool for our personal growth in virtue. For example, developing patience

requires encountering situations that challenge our patience, providing us with opportunities to practice and strengthen this virtue. Echoing the wisdom of one of the desert fathers, "the soul only develops through struggles." This is not to suggest that we should actively seek out temptation. Quite the contrary, we are advised to actively avoid temptation and steer clear of situations that may lead us into sin. Nevertheless, when faced with temptation, a valuable question for our Lenten meditation might be, "What virtue is God inviting me to cultivate through this particular challenge?"

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Peter Damian

St. Peter Damian was a Benedictine monk who lived from 1007 to 1073 in Italy. He was a brilliant student during seminary, becoming well known as a brilliant teacher at Parma and Ravenna at the age of 25. In 1035, he sought out a monastic life, entering the remote hermitage of Fonte Avellana. He introduced a more severe monastic reform and they soon took hold in many monasteries, including Monte Cassino, which was founded by St. Benedict. His zeal for reform spread outward in the Church, which had endured two centuries of political and social upheaval, doctrinal ignorance, and petty vanity among the clergy. He helped to outlaw simony among the clergy. He wrote many treatises on controversies of his day including the validity of ordination of clergy appointed by simony. He was soon named as a cardinal and though at first he resisted, allowed himself to be ordained as the Cardinal Bishop of Ostia in 1057. He spent much of the rest of his career acting as a legate on behalf of the pope and settled many disputes on anything from who was the correct pope (there were several anti-popes during his time) and disagreements between monasteries and local bishops. He died in 1072 or 1073. Pope Benedict XVI described him as one of the most significant figures of the 11th century.

Catholic Movie Night

Our first Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be this Sunday, Feb 18th at 6pm. Our next movie will be There Be Dragons (2011), a fictional retelling of the life of St. Josemaría Escrivá, the founder of Opus Dei: Arising out of the horror of the Spanish Civil War, a candidate for canonization, Josemaría Escrivá, is investigated by a journalist who discovers that his own estranged father had a deep, dark and devastating connection to the saint's life. As he uncovers the truth, he learns more about his origins and learns much about forgiveness and the power of faith. Don't miss such an excellent movie!

For Your Reflection:

Let us fix our attention on the blood of Christ and recognize how precious it is to God his Father, since it was shed for our salvation and brought the grace of repentance to all the world. If we review the various ages of history, we will see that in every generation the Lord has offered the opportunity of repentance to any who were willing to turn to him. The Master of the whole universe himself spoke of repentance with an oath: As I live, says the Lord, I do not wish the death of the sinner but his repentance. He added this evidence of his goodness: House of Israel, repent of your wickedness. Tell the sons of my people: If their sins should reach from earth to heaven, if they are brighter than scarlet and blacker than sackcloth, you need only turn to me with your whole heart and say, "Father," and I will listen to you as a holy people. In other words, God wanted all his beloved ones to have the opportunity to repent and he confirmed this desire by his own almighty will. That is why we should obey his sovereign and glorious will and prayerfully entreat his mercy and kindness. Brothers, we should be humble in mind, putting aside all arrogance, pride and foolish anger. Rather, we should act in accordance with the Scriptures, as the Holy Spirit says: The wise man must not glory in his wisdom nor the strong man in his strength nor the rich man in his riches. Rather, let him who glories glory in the Lord by seeking him and doing what is right and just. Recall especially what the Lord Jesus said when he taught gentleness and forbearance. Be merciful, he said, so that you may have mercy shown to you. Forgive, so that you may be forgiven. As you treat others, so you will be treated. As you give, so you will receive. As you judge, so you will be judged. As you are kind to others, so you will be treated kindly. The measure of your giving will be the measure of your receiving. Let these commandments and precepts strengthen us to live in humble obedience to his sacred words. Sharing then in the heritage of so many vast and glorious achievements, let us hasten toward the goal of peace, set before us from the beginning. Let us keep our eyes firmly fixed on the Father and Creator of the whole universe, and hold fast to his splendid and transcendent gifts of peace and all his blessings. -From a letter to the Corinthians by Saint Clement, pope

Prayer of the Week


The Jesus Prayer
