

From The Pastoral Associate

Most of us know Lent as a time to "give something up." It's common for Catholics to ask each other- what are you giving up for Lent? We usually respond that we're going to give up Netflix, or snacking, or maybe even sleeping on the hard floor. While these practices are great, we should also know what the season is truly about.

The season of Lent has traditionally been 40 day period leading up to the most important liturgical celebration of the Triduum in the leadup to Easter. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that "by the solemn forty days of Lent the Church unites herself each year to the mystery of Jesus in the desert." (540) When Jesus was baptized, the Spirit immediately drove him into the desert. This was a time of preparation, penance, and temptation for Jesus. In this season, we should seek to unite ourselves to him in his trial in the desert.

During Lent, Catholics are encouraged to do the following things:

Pray- We should seek to deepen our prayer life with God. Spending time reading the Bible or sitting in front of the Blessed Sacrament, praying the liturgy of the hours or the rosary, saying morning and night prayers, or even the simple but intentional turning of the mind to Jesus throughout the day is a good way to deepen your prayer life. Consider joining our parish Bible Study or attending the Holy Hour for Marriage (See pg 4) or our holy hour before the noon Mass on Thursdays.

Go on a Retreat- Lent is a great time to get away from the normal day to day to attend a spiritual retreat. Can't find a place to go? Just turn off your internet, cell phone, and tv for a day and spend it by consciously praying and reading the Bible or other spiritual works.

Go to confession— Lent is the perfect time to take stock of the sins that you have committed and have them lifted from you through confession. Confessions in our parish are at 3:30 on Saturdays and 11:30 on Wednesdays and Thursdays or by appointment.

Fast- Fasting from those things that we may have become attached to is a great spiritual practice. Be sure to always connect it with prayer. Fasting is not about going on a diet but is about removing attachment to worldly things that should be given only to God.

Give alms- Giving to the poor is a duty that every Christian is bound by but it is all the more important during Lent. Give to the parish, to Catholic Charities, to food banks, and other means of assisting those who have real physical and spiritual needs. We have kicked off social ministries in our parish and help is needed at the St. Monica Food Pantry and other charities (Please see the article on page 3).

Give of yourself- The catechism states that charitable and missionary works can also be a part of a penitential practice. Consider finding ways of spreading the Gospel. In our parish, The Legion of Mary and Knights of Columbus are excellent groups focused on doing just this (see pg 4 to learn more).

Finally, don't let the progress you have made get lost after Easter. These spiritual practices are meant to be build upon and to be a regular part of the Christian life. By doing them, we draw nearer to Christ and place ourselves more closely to his Sacred Heart. I hope that all of you have a blessed and fruitful Lent!



Saint of the Week-St. Polycarp of Smyrna

St. Polycarp was a disciple of the Apostle John and lived from 69-155. He was converted by the preaching of the Apostles and was ordained a bishop by John the Apostle. He was well known for his preaching and the example he provided. Some of Polycarp's writings still exist to this day, some of the earliest in existence. In his old age, Polycarp was arrested and brought before the local proconsul who interrogated him. Polycarp responded back wittily, leaving the proconsul irritated. At one point he was told to say "Away with the atheists!" (Atheists were those who did not believe in the Roman gods) Polycarp, gesturing to the mob, looked up to heaven and cried "Away with the atheists!" He told Polycarp to curse Christ and he would be freed. Polycarp responded, "Eighty-six years I have served Him. He had never done me wrong. How then can I blaspheme my King who has saved me?" Polycarp was sentenced to burn at the stake. When the soldier came to nail his hands, Polycarp stopped him telling him that he would stand in place by God's grace. As he stood in the flames, it was reported that the smell of baking bread and the aroma of incense spread throughout the area. Polycarp did not die and a soldier was soon sent to dispatch him with a dagger.

Social Outreach Ministry

For Your Reflection: Bearing with the Faults of Others

Until God ordains otherwise, a man ought to bear patiently whatever he cannot correct in himself and in others. Consider it better thus -- perhaps to try your patience and to test you, for without such patience and trial your merits are of little account. Nevertheless, under such difficulties you should pray that God will consent to help you bear them calmly.

If, after being admonished once or twice, a person does not amend, do not argue with him but commit the whole matter to God that His will and honor may be furthered in all His servants, for God knows well how to turn evil to good. Try to bear patiently with the defects and infirmities of others, whatever they may be, because you also have many a fault which others must endure.

If you cannot make yourself what you would wish to be, how can you bend others to your will? We want them to be perfect, yet we do not correct our own faults. We wish them to be severely corrected, yet we will not correct ourselves. Their great liberty displeases us, yet we would not be denied what we ask. We would have them bound by laws, yet we will allow ourselves to be restrained in nothing. Hence, it is clear how seldom we think of others as we do of ourselves.

If all were perfect, what should we have to suffer from others for God's sake? But God has so ordained, that we may learn to bear with one another's burdens, for there is no man without fault, no man without burden, no man sufficient to himself nor wise enough. Hence we must support one another, console one another, mutually help, counsel, and advise, for the measure of every man's virtue is best revealed in time of adversity -- adversity that does not weaken a man but rather shows what he is.
