
Living the Golden Rule: A Call to Radical Love and Mercy

In this Sunday's Gospel (Luke 6:27-38), Jesus presents one of the most challenging yet transformative teachings of our faith: "Do to others as you would have them do to you." This simple yet profound command, often referred to as the Golden Rule, is not just a call to kindness—it is an invitation to radical love, the kind of love that reflects the very heart of God. At first glance, the Golden Rule seems like common sense. We all appreciate kindness, fairness, and respect, and we naturally expect these from others. However, Jesus pushes us beyond conventional wisdom.

Instead, He calls us to love our enemies, do good to



who curse us, and pray for those who mistreat us. This is not the way of the world; it is the way of Christ. It is a love that expects nothing in return, a love that mirrors the mercy of our Heavenly Father.

This teaching can be difficult to accept because it challenges our instincts. When someone wrongs us, our first reaction is often to seek justice, fairness, or even revenge. But Jesus calls us to something higher: to respond with love, forgiveness, and generosity. This is not weakness—it is strength. It is the strength of a heart transformed by God's grace, a heart that chooses mercy over judgment, compassion over resentment, and peace over conflict.

Jesus gives us a powerful image of what happens when we live this way: "Give, and gifts will be given to you; a good measure, packed together, shaken down, and overflowing, will be poured into your lap." God's blessings come in abundance when we practice generosity and love. When we measure out kindness, patience, and forgiveness, God returns it to us in ways beyond our imagination.

But how can we put this into practice in our daily lives? It starts with small acts of love. We can choose to be patient with a difficult coworker. We can listen with compassion



Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Peter Damian

Peter was the youngest child born into a poor but noble family in Ravenna, Italy. His parents died when he was young, so he went to live with one of his older brothers who mistreated him and forced him to labor as a swineherd. Eventually, another brother, a priest from Ravenna, took him in and provided him with an excellent education. Peter was so grateful to his priest brother that he added his brother's name to his own, making him Peter Damian. Upon the completion of his education, Peter Damian began to teach with much success. However, he soon found that the university setting was not for him, so he withdrew to a monastery in Fonte-Avellana for a forty-day retreat. Upon completing his retreat, he discerned a call to monastic life and received the habit. As a monk, Peter Damian lived a secluded life of prayer and extreme penance. In 1043, at the age of thirtyfive, Brother Peter Damian was named the prior of his monastery. He led the brothers with zeal and fidelity to their rule. He also began founding new hermitages in the surrounding villages. In 1045 a new Pope invited Peter Damian to help reform the church. He wrote many letters in an attempt to bring about reforms of the clergy, fought against simony (the selling of Church offices and spiritual favors), addressed sexual abuses, challenged the bishops, reformed monasteries, and gave a spectacular personal witness of holiness. In 1057, Brother Damian was made the Cardinal-Bishop of Ostia by the pope, despite his attempts to turn down the position. As a new cardinal, he quickly challenged his brother cardinals and tried to weed out corruption. He would eventually return to his hermitage and resume his life of prayer, but Pope after pope called on him for help, even while other Church leaders opposed him. In 1072, at the age of sixty-five Cardinal Peter Damian fell ill. After a week of illness in a monastery near his hometown, the cardinal died. He was named a Doctor of the Church in 1828.

to a family member who frustrates us. We can forgive the friend who hurt us, even if they never apologize. We can extend kindness to a stranger without expecting anything in return.

The Golden Rule is not just a moral guideline—it is the foundation of Christian living. Imagine if every encounter we had was guided by this principle. How different would our families be if we treated one another with the same patience and kindness we desire for ourselves? How transformed would our workplaces become if we approached every interaction with respect and fairness? How much more peaceful would our world be if we sought to forgive as we ourselves long to be forgiven?

Loving in this way does not mean ignoring injustice or tolerating wrongdoing. It means responding to evil with goodness, to hatred with love, and to conflict with peace. It means trusting that God's way is always better than the ways of the world.

This week, let us take the Golden Rule to heart. Let us practice patience with those who frustrate us, extend generosity without expecting repayment, and offer forgiveness to those who have wronged us. By doing so, we become true children of the Most High, reflecting His boundless love in a world that so desperately needs it.
