

From our Pastoral Associate

This Sunday we reflect on Jesus' Transfiguration on the Mount. This event happens in the leadup to his crucifixion, as he approaches Jerusalem. Jesus is transfigured before Peter, James, and John, showing his full glory in his divinity. Both Moses and Elijah, representing the Law and the Prophets respectively and who have had their own unique experiences of God on mountaintops, appear to him to discuss the coming events in Jerusalem. There are two purposes to Jesus' transfiguration - the first is for the



Apostles- that when Jesus undergoes his passion, they will not despair. The second is also interesting. Luke recounts that Moses and Elijah spoke to Jesus of "his exodus, which he was to accomplish at Jerusalem." We know that later on, Jesus will struggle with the burden of his approaching death in the Garden of Gethsemane. He, in his human nature, was repulsed by his coming death. But it seems that he struggled with it even before as is evidenced at the Transfiguration. We know in the Garden of Gethsemane that an angel appeared to him, strengthening him in his agony. We also know that angels came to him in the temptation in the desert to minister to him. It seems that Moses and Elijah appeared to him for the same purpose- of providing strength, consolation, and fortitude as he accomplished God's will. Though the salvation of the entire world is something that could only be accomplished by him, Jesus does not seek to "go it alone." He has the help of the angels and saints and those around him that love him. Even at the cross, he has his mother and disciples present.

As we move through Lent with our fasts and resolutions, we should seek out the help of our fellow Christians, the saints, and our guardian angel. We are not meant to accomplish God's will alone. We need the strength and encouragement of others as we fast and pray and go through the struggles of our daily lives. Seek out the help of our parish community. We were never meant to go it alone.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- Bl. Concepcion de Armida

Concepcion Cabrera de Armida was born in 1862 in San Luis Potosi, Mexico, the daughter of well-to-do parents, the seventh of twelve children. She was affectionately known as Conchita. Since childhood, Conchita was attracted to God, especially in the Eucharist, and distinguished herself for her purity, humility, and spirit of sacrifice. On November 8, 1884, she married Francisco Armida Garcia. Together they had nine children. When she was 39, her husband died, leaving her to care for the children, the youngest being 2. In 1889, she attended her first Spiritual Exercises and discovered her mission of saving souls. She founded the Apostolate of the Cross in 1895 and other apostolates and ministries followed. Though not having any known visions of Jesus and Mary, she is considered a mystic due to her deep prayer life, recorded in her writings, which took up over 60,000 pages- rivaling that of St. Thomas Aquinas. She reported God telling her, "Ask me for a long suffering life and to write a lot... That's your mission on earth". When the Mexican Revolution raged and took the lives of many Catholics, Conchita remained at peace in prayer, showing remarkable tranquility in her writings despite the horror around her. She was beatified in 2019 by Pope Francis, the first Mexican laywoman to receive the honor.

Catholic Movie Night

Our next Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be Sunday, March 17th at 6pm in the Parish Hall. Our next movie will be The Passion of the Christ (2004), a highly realistic portrayal of the last twelve hours of Jesus' life on earth– detailing the Agony in the Garden to the burial in the tomb. Directed by Mel Gibson, this film is based on the mystical revelations of Anne Catherine Emmerich. Please note that the movie is rated R for severe violence and parental discretion is advised. Our next movies will be: Fatima on May 5th and A Man For All Seasons on June 22nd.

For Your Reflection:

Lord, I have cried to you, hear me. This is a prayer we can all say. This is not my prayer, but that of the whole Christ. Rather, it is said in the name of his body. When Christ was on earth he prayed in his human nature, and prayed to the Father in the name of his body, and when he prayed drops of blood flowed from his whole body. So it is written in the Gospel: Jesus prayed with earnest prayer, and sweated blood. What is this blood streaming from his whole body but the martyrdom of the whole Church? Lord, I have cried to you, hear me; listen to the sound of my prayer, when I call upon you. Did you imagine that crying was over when you said: I have cried to you? You have cried out, but do not as yet feel free from care. If anguish is at an end, crying is at an end; but if the Church, the body of Christ, must suffer anguish until the end of time, it must not say only: I have cried to you, hear me; it must also say: Listen to the sound of my prayer, when I call upon you. Let my prayer rise like incense in your sight; let the raising of my hands be an evening sacrifice.

This is generally understood of Christ, the head, as every Christian acknowledges. When day was fading into evening, the Lord laid down his life on the cross, to take it up again; he did not lose his life against his will. Here, too, we are symbolized. What part of him hung on the cross if not the part he had received from us? How could God the Father ever cast off and abandon his only Son, who is indeed one God with him? Yet Christ, nailing our weakness to the cross (where, as the Apostle says: Our old nature was nailed to the cross with him), cried out with the very voice of humanity: My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

The evening sacrifice is then the passion of the Lord, the cross of the Lord, the oblation of the victim that brings salvation, the holocaust acceptable to God. In his resurrection he made this evening sacrifice a morning sacrifice. Prayer offered in holiness from a faithful heart rises like incense from a holy altar. Nothing is more fragrant than the fragrance of the Lord. May all who believe share in this fragrance.

Therefore, our old nature, in the words of the Apostle, was nailed to the cross with him, in order, as he says, to destroy our sinful body, so that we may be slaves to sin no longer. -From a Commentary on the Psalms by St. Augustine
