

Ministry Spotlight: Social Outreach

In Early August 258 A.D., the Roman emperor Valerian issued an edict that all bishops, priests, and deacons were to be put to death. Less than a week later, Pope Sixtus II was arrested while celebrating Mass cemetery of St. Callixtus. was immediately executed. The deacon assisting the Mass, St. Lawrence, was given



ultimatum to bring forth the treasures of the Church within three days or he would suffer the same fate. On the third day, St. Lawrence brought forward all the poor, lame, orphans, and widows, declaring that they were the true treasure of the Church. For this, St. Lawrence was burned alive over a gridiron. The mark of a true Christian life is attentiveness to those in need around us. Jesus himself told us to care for those who are hungry and thirsty, and those who are in need, to visit the prisoner, and to clothe the naked. Jesus insisted that those who do these things do them for him, as if he is the one receiving this charity. The Church has always taken this command seriously. In our first reading today, God instructs us to "Share your bread with the hungry, shelter the oppressed and the homeless; clothe the naked when you see them and do not turn your back on your own." In fact, in the early days of the Church, it was one of the most defining features of being a Christian. St. Justin Martyr, when describing how Christians worship, talks about a collection being taken for the poor: "And they who are well to do, and willing, give what each thinks fit; and what is collected is deposited with the presider, who succours the orphans and widows and those who, through sickness or any other cause, are in want, and those who are in bonds and the strangers sojourning among us, and in a word takes care of all who are in need." (1 Apology 67)

This has been a defining mark of the Church down through the centuries and has led to the creation of hospitals, orphanages, soup kitchens, shelters, schools, and so much more. The Catholic Church remains the largest charitable organization in the world.

Our parish is relaunching its Social Outreach to the poor and suffering in our community following the pandemic. We will have monthly collections in the back of the Church for laundry items, toiletries and hygiene products (including diapers), and non-perishable food. These items will be taken to the food pantry at our sister parish, St. Monica Catholic Church. Our first collection of these items will be next weekend.

The Social Outreach Ministry will at times assist the food pantry at Monica's and we are looking for volunteers to help with one or more hours from 11-2 on Mondays. There will also be opportunities for volunteers to sort donations at Harvesters. Please stay tuned for more announcements for all of these initiatives. Saint of the Week-St. Scholastica

St. Scholastica was born in 480 and was the twin sister of St. Benedict, the founder of western monasticism. She was consecrated to God from an early age and, together with some other consecrated virgins, founded a monastery for women. It is likely that she settled at the base of Monte Cassino, below the monastery founded by her brother. The two had a tradition that once a year they would meet together to spend the day worshipping God, having dinner, and discussing spiritual matters. On one of these occasions, knowing that she was likely to die soon, she asked her brother to stay after dinner. Not wanting to violate his own rule, Benedict insisted he go back to his own cell. Scholastica closed her hands in prayer, and after a moment, a wild storm started outside of the guest house in which they were staying. Benedict asked, "What have you done?", to which she replied, "I asked you and you would not listen; so I asked my God and he did listen. So now go off, if you can; leave me and return to your monastery." Benedict was unable to return to his monastery, and they spent the night in discussion. Three days later, Benedict had a vision of Scholastica's soul going to heaven in the form of a dove. She was laid to rest at the Abbey of Monte Cassino.

For Your Reflection

Christians are not distinguished from other men by country, language, nor by the customs which they observe. They do not inhabit cities of their own, use a particular way of speaking, nor lead a life marked out by any curiosity. The course of conduct they follow has not been devised by the speculation and deliberation of inquisitive men. The do not, like some, proclaim themselves the advocates of merely human doctrines.

Instead, they inhabit both Greek and barbarian cities, however things have fallen to each of them. And it is while following the customs of the natives in clothing, food, and the rest of ordinary life that they display to us their wonderful and admittedly striking way of life. They live in their own countries, but they do so as those who are just passing through. As citizens they participate in everything with others, yet they endure everything as if they were foreigners. Every foreign land is like their homeland to them, and every land of their birth is like a land of strangers. They marry, like everyone else, and they have children, but they do not expose their offspring. They share a common table, but not a common bed. They exist in the flesh, but they do not live by the flesh. They pass their days on earth, but they are citizens of heaven. They obey the prescribed laws, all the while surpassing the laws by their lives. They love all men and are persecuted by all. They are unknown and condemned. They are put to death and restored to life. They are poor, yet make many rich. They lack everything, yet they overflow in everything.

They are dishonored, and yet in their very dishonor they are glorified; they are spoken ill of and yet are justified; they are reviled but bless; they are insulted and repay the insult with honor; they do good, yet are punished as evildoers; when punished, they rejoice as if raised from the dead. They are assailed by the Jews as barbarians; they are persecuted by the Greeks; yet those who hate them are unable to give any reason for their hatred.
