From our Pastoral Associate

In our Gospel today, Jesus heals a man born blind. Jesus mixes clay and spittle (a practice common with physicians of his day) rubs it on his eyes, and sends him to go wash it off. The use of physical material for the healing also anticipates the sacraments. The man comes back seeing. The people are astonished to see this man, whom they had known simply as blind beggar suddenly a looking at them, able to see and move about on his own. The crowd begins to argue with one another whether it is him or not.



Jesus has had such a profound effect on him that he is as if he is a new man. The man stops the argument by stating, "I am the man." As the disagreement about Jesus continues, it's clear that it's not just his physical sight that has been changed. We see his faith unfolding as they question. First he states that Jesus is simply a man. When asked again, he states that he is a prophet. Upon further questioning the man hints that he is now Jesus' disciple. Then he declares that Jesus is from God. Finally, when Jesus approaches him again (allowing the man to see him for the first time), the man falls at his feet, worships him, and calls him Lord. His spiritual sight, over the course of this reading, comes into clear and present focus. His example is placed in direct juxtaposition of the pharisees— those who, largely, rejected Jesus and opposed him. As Jesus states— they are actually the blind ones. Though they were not blind at birth, these men refuse to see the spiritual reality crashing upon them. They choose to hold with their own understanding, rather than to enter into the new kingdom that Jesus is preparing.

I am reminded of C.S. Lewis' famous argument that said that Jesus could never simply be called a great moral teacher- he did not leave that option available to us. No one else could do the things that he did, and even less had anyone ever spoken of himself the way he had. He must be either called a liar (of which it would be difficult to call him such), a lunatic (which he clearly was not treated as such), or Lord. Everything Jesus did or said left a choice of two options- to reject him, or to respond to him in faith.

So how do we respond to him? Do we accept him as Our Lord and God in faith, or do we reject him? And if we do accept him, do we live our lives as if we truly do or do we live as if it didn't matter? Let us never cease to improve and life the Gospel in our own lives.



Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- Frank Duff

The Servant of God Frank Duff was born in Dublin, Ireland in 1889. He joined the St. Vincent de Paul society at the age of 24 and became acquainted with the real poverty of Dublin. In 1916, he wrote his first pamphlet Can We Be Saints? in which he expressed the idea that all are called to be saints are given the means necessary through Christian faith. In 1921, Duff helped call a meeting of himself, a priest, and 15 other women to create an organization that would perform voluntary work in bringing souls to Christ. The Legion of Mary was formed and Duff modeled the organization on the Roman legion, using many of the same terms. One of the first acts that the Legion would perform would be to convert and close down a prostitution district in the city. In 1932, Duff used the International Eucharistic Congress to convince bishops to bring the Legion to their own dioceses. From this point, the Legion of Mary rapidly spread throughout the world. He sent envoys, or missionaries, to many parts of the world including Africa, Asia, and South America. The Legion became so well known for its work that Duff was invited to be a lay observer at the Second Vatican Council and when he was introduced, received a standing ovation. Today the Legion of Mary is the largest lay apostolate in the world. Frank Duff died in 1980.

Catholic Movie Night

Our next Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be Sunday, March 17th at 6pm in the Parish Hall. Our next movie will be The Passion of the Christ (2004), a highly realistic portrayal of the last twelve hours of Jesus' life on earth- detailing the Agony in the Garden to the burial in the tomb. Directed by Mel Gibson, this film is based on the mystical revelations of Anne Catherine Emmerich. Please note that the movie is rated R for severe violence and parental discretion is advised. Our next movies will be: Fatima on May 5th and A Man For All Seasons on June 22nd.

For Your Reflection:

True reverence for the Lord's passion means fixing the eyes of our heart on Jesus crucified and recognizing in him our own humanity. The earth- our earthly nature- should tremble at the suffering of its Redeemer. The rocks- the hearts of unbelievers- should burst asunder. No one, however weak, is denied a share in the victory of the cross. No one is beyond the help of the prayer of Christ. His prayer brought benefit to the multitude that raged against him. How much more does it bring to those who turn to him in repentance? The sacred blood of Christ has quenched the flaming sword that barred access to the tree of life. The age-old night of sin has given place to the true light. The Christian people are invited to share the riches of paradise. All who have been reborn have the way open before them to return to their native land, from which they had been exiled. The business of this life should not preoccupy us with its anxiety and pride, so that we no longer strive with all the love of our heart to be like our Redeemer, and to follow his example. Everything that he did or suffered was for our salvation: he wanted his body to share the goodness of its head. First of all, in taking our human nature while remaining God, so that the Word became man, he left no member of the human race, the unbeliever excepted, without a share in his mercy. Who does not share a common nature with Christ if he has welcomed Christ, who took our nature, and is reborn in the Spirit through whom Christ was conceived? Again, who cannot recognize in Christ his own infirmities? Who would not recognize that Christ's eating and sleeping, his sadness and his shedding of tears of love are marks of the nature of a slave? It was this nature of a slave that had to be healed of its ancient wounds and cleansed of the defilement of sin. For that reason the only-begotten Son of God became also the son of man. He was to have both the reality of a human nature and the fullness of the godhead. The body that lay lifeless in the tomb is ours. The body that rose again on the third day is ours. The body that ascended above all the heights of heaven to the right hand of the Father's glory is ours. If then we walk in the way of his commandments, and are not ashamed to acknowledge the price he paid for our salvation in a lowly body, we too are to rise to share his glory. -From a sermon by Pope St. Leo the Great
