#### From The Pastoral Associate

In today's Gospel, we read of how Jesus chooses to reach the Samaritan people with the most unlikely person imaginable- a woman who had been ostracized from her community for her many perceived sins, not the least having had five different husbands and now living with a sixth man. His choice of a woman was also peculiar. Rabbis in that time did not interact with women in public at all, not even their own wives. But he was clearly looking for her-going to a well at the hottest time of the day when no one was supposed to be there. Jesus was thirsting for her faith and enters into a dialogue with her-culminating in him telling her that



he is the Messiah. She runs off, no longer self-conscious of her identity, only conscious of her joy at having met the Messiah. The results are astounding. Soon, the Samaritans flock to come meet Jesus and he spends two days there, profitably preaching the coming Kingdom of God-leading them to proclaim that Jesus is "indeed the Savior of the World." This would have been impossible with the woman.

What can Jesus do with us? How can he use you and I to reach others? In our country and community today, the light of God's truth is fading. Fewer and fewer are being impacted by the Gospel. And we can see the results- mass isolation, addiction, polarization, despair, and confusion. But Jesus' thirst for the faith of others has not abated. He longs for each and every person to come to him and find rest for their souls. He wishes to heal and bring everyone to the light of his truth, as well as give the joy of being known and loved by him. Are we willing to help him in that mission? What are some ways that we can reach out to others for him? In our parish, there are many ways We have several faith groups that are actively doing this work in our parish social ministry, the Knights of Columbus, and the Legion of Mary. Perhaps you could invite someone to attend with you one of these meetings, or to come with you to our weekly holy hour at 11am, to Mass, a parish Bible study session, the Stations of the Cross, the weekly Lenten study, or bring them a CD or book from the Lighthouse stands near the entrances of the Church. It doesn't require much effort to make the invitation and yet it can make a massive difference in the life of the person that you are reaching. We don't need to fear that we aren't holy enough or respected enough by the person to make the invitation. After all, Jesus called the woman at the well, someone who was shunned and rejected by her entire community. Yet despite her social status, her testimony changed the lives of those around her forever. Do not underestimate the impact that a simple invitation can bring. You might just be introducing them, and many others, to Jesus Christ.

# **Ministries & Reflections**



#### Saint of the Week-St. Patrick of Ireland

St. Patrick was born at the end of Roman Rule in the British empire in what is now England in the 5th century. At the age of 16, Patrick was captured by Irish pirates and spent 6 years as a slave. During this time, he converted to Christianity. At the end of this time he heard a voice telling him he would go home and he fled, finding a ship to take him home. He later had a vision of an Irish bishop appearing to him with a letter from the Irish asking him to walk among them. Patrick went to Europe and was ordained by St. Germanus of Auxerre as a priest and then returned to Ireland as a missionary. He eventually became a bishop. He baptized thousands and ordained priests to care for the new communities. He began many convents of women. His was as simple but deep faith. He died at Saul, where he built his first Irish church. He is credited with converting the nation of Ireland, and for that is called the Patron Saint of Ireland along with St. Brigid of Kildare and St. Columba. He is believed to be buried in Down Cathedral in Downpatrick.

#### For Your Reflection:

There are three things, my brethren, by which faith stands firm, devotion remains constant, and virtue endures. They are prayer, fasting, and mercy. Prayer knocks at the door, fasting obtains, mercy receives. Prayer, mercy, and fasting: these three are one, and they give life to each other. Fasting is the soul of prayer, mercy is the lifeblood of fasting. Let no one try to separate them; they cannot be separated. If you have only one of them or not all together, you have nothing. So if you pray, fast; if you fast, show mercy; if you want your petition to be heard, hear the petitions of others. If you do not close your ear to others you open God's ear to yourself. When you fast, see the fasting of others. If you hope for mercy, show mercy. If you look for kindness, show kindness. If you want to receive, give. If you ask for yourself what you deny to others, your asking is a mockery. Let this be the pattern for all men when they practice mercy: show mercy to others in the same way, with the same generosity, with the same promptness, as you want others to show mercy to you. Therefore, let prayer, mercy and fasting be one single plea to God on our behalf, one speech in our defense, a threefold united prayer in our favor. Let us use fasting to make up for what we have lost by despising others. Let us offer our souls in sacrifice by means of fasting. There is nothing more pleasing that we can offer to God, as the psalmist said in prophecy: A sacrifice to God is a broken spirit; God does not despise a bruised and humbled heart. Offer your soul to God, make him an oblation of your fasting, so that your soul may be a pure offering, a holy sacrifice, a living victim, remaining your own and at the same time made over to God. Whoever fails to give this to God will not be excused, for if you are to give him yourself you are never without the means of giving. To make these acceptable, mercy must be added. Fasting bears no fruit unless it is watered by mercy. However much you may cultivate your heart, clear the soil of your nature, root out vices, sow virtues, if you do not release the springs of mercy, your fasting will bear no fruit. Give to the poor, and you give to yourself. You will not be allowed to keep what you have refused to give to others.
