From our Pastoral Associate:

Having spent the last two years now exploring my family's genealogy and history, I've found it quite mind-boggling to explore just how many descendants can come from just one couple. A number of my ancestors were ethnic Germans that settled in Russia in the mid 1700's. One of those couples, who were my 6th great grandparents, I have made a special study



due to a large number of church records that recently became available. As I've traced their children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, and more, I've been astonished to watch the number of their descendants grow exponentially. I am currently halfway through the 5th generation (their great great grandchildren) and I've already detailed close to 750 descendants, and that doesn't include the families I simply can't find or moved to villages without records. By the time I reach the current generations, I will have most likely detailed thousands of people living in the United States, Brazil, Argentina, Canada, Russia, and Germany. Their descendants would include a Hollywood star that danced in a movie with Elvis and a priest who was martyred at the orders of Joseph Stalin. Did my ancestors know just how far reaching and numerous their descendants would one day be? It's possible, given how many grandchildren they had.

But in our reading today, God tells Abram (soon to be renamed Abraham), "Look up at the sky and count the stars, if you can. Just so shall your descendants be." Abram at this point is childless and he and his wife are old. He has named his own servant to be his heir, an embarrassment in the ancient world. And yet at God's promise Abram is described as putting his faith in God and it is reckoned to him as righteousness. It is seemingly impossible that he could have an descendants at all, let alone so many that it would rival the number of stars in the sky, and yet Abram believes. Abraham's descendants do in fact become as numerous as God promises and become a nationthat of Israel. One of these descendants will be the Bright Morning Star- Jesus Christ. But even more than his physical descendants, Abraham has his spiritual descendantsthose that believe in his God due to Abraham's own faith, which made the rest of salvation history possible. This includes both Jews and Christians. Indeed, Abraham's (continued on page 3)

Saint of the Week- St. Patrick

Patrick may have been born in Dunbarton, Scotland, Cumberland, England, or in northern Wales. At 16, he and a large number of his father's slaves and vassals were captured by Irish raiders and sold as slaves in Ireland. Forced to work as a shepherd, he suffered greatly from hunger and cold. After six years Patrick escaped and later returned to Britain at the age of 22. His captivity had meant spiritual conversion. He may have studied at Lerins, off the French coast; he spent years at Auxerre, France, and was consecrated bishop at the age of 43. His great desire was to proclaim the good news to the Irish. In a dream vision it seemed "all the children of Ireland from their mothers' wombs were stretching out their hands" to him. He understood the vision to be a call to do mission work in pagan Ireland. He went to the west and north-where the faith had never been preached-obtained the protection of local kings, and made numerous converts. He ordained many priests, divided the country into dioceses, held Church councils, founded several monasteries and continually urged his people to greater holiness in Christ. He suffered much opposition from pagan druids and was criticized in both England and Ireland for the way he conducted his mission. In a relatively short time, the island had experienced deeply the Christian spirit, and was prepared to send out missionaries whose efforts were greatly responsible for Christianizing Europe.

descendants are as numerous as the stars.

The Church places the example of Abraham before us in Lent because it is the sort of faith and trust in God to which we should aspire. Abraham had no reason to believe what God was saying. He was old. Even worse, his wife was well past her childbearing years. And yet, despite the clear evidence to the contrary, Abraham believes that God can and will do it. In return for this faith, God promises him a land– which will become known as the Promised Land– which will be the home of these many descendants.

We too, when we are in the midst of the worst difficulties, should never despair of God's help and concern for our problems and struggles. Even when things are impossible, Abraham shows us that it is important to trust and to keep our hearts open to God's workings and grace. God can make the impossible quite possible.

I encourage you during this Lent to identify those parts of your life that seem the least likely to happen. Bring them to him with full faith and confidence and put your trust in his providential care. Do not despair. Do not lose hope. And most of all, pray that he will guide you in his wisdom and mercy.
