

From our Pastoral Associate

In our Gospel today, we hear the story of the raising of Lazarus. One aspect of the story is the immediate danger Jesus is in as the episode progresses. In the previous chapters, Jesus healed a man that was born blind. When the pharisees bristle at Jesus' declaration that they are blind, Jesus declares that he is the Good Ultimately, he Shepherd. concludes by stating that, "I and the Father are one." (Jn



10:30) The Judeans, correctly understanding this to mean that he is claiming to be God, take up stones to kill him for what they perceive as blasphemy, but Jesus escaped. Jesus leaves the area and goes across the Jordan. This is where Mary and Martha's message about Lazarus finds him. When Jesus declares after some days that he is going to go visit his friends, the Apostles are alarmed, knowing this will take him back to close proximity with those that were just trying to kill him. Even Martha and Mary know that Jesus is in serious danger. Those that were witnesses of the healing of the blind man and had tried to stone Jesus are among the group of mourners. So Martha goes to meet him outside of the village. Then she sends in secret to Mary to tell her that Jesus has arrived. Unfortunately, the mourners follow Mary, bringing the entire group to Jesus. The miracle that Jesus performs of the healing of Lazarus will be the final straw for the pharisees and high priest. Afraid for the safety and preservation of the nation of Israel, they determine that Jesus must die. From that point on, they begin looking for an opportunity to put him to death.

Jesus, of course, knew of the danger but proceeded to go anyway. His love for Mary, Martha, and, above all, Lazarus, as well as the necessity of following the Father's will, leads him on this dangerous and fateful journey that will ultimately result in his death. This should remind us that what Jesus endured on the Cross was for love of us. He freely chose to accept it and to give his life for our sins. He chose this road out of love for all those that would benefit from it. And the cost was clear and apparent to him.

At the sight of the mourners, who suffer from the ravages of sin, particularly its worst effect— death—Jesus weeps. This is what he ultimately came for— to free us from unending death. As we approach Holy Week, I encourage you to take time and reflect on the great and profound gift that Jesus has given us through his Passion, Death, and Resurrection.



Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Joseph

St. Joseph was an Israelite man born during the first century BC. A humble carpenter, he was a descendent of David and by the account of St. Matthew, a righteous man. He was betrothed to the Blessed Virgin Mary but before they had come together she was found to be with child by the Holy Spirit. St. Joseph intended to divorce her quietly, but after a visit from an angel in a dream, he took her into his home but did not have spousal relations with her. He was her protector throughout the pregnancy and helped to find her a place in Bethlehem to deliver her child when no one would house them. He became the foster father of Jesus and, when prompted by another angel, fled Israel to Egypt to escape the wrath of Herod. He eventually returned with his family and settled at Nazareth. Little else is known of his life, except that he provided for his family and taught Jesus his trade. It is widely accepted that he died before Jesus' public ministry, and for this he is known as the patron of a happy death—having died in the arms of Jesus and Mary. He is also the named as the protector of the Church, as his role of caring for the safety of the body of Christ was a special mission entrusted to him by God. St. Joseph has two feast days-that of March 19th and on Mary 1st, which remembers him in particular as a worker.

Catholic Movie Night

Our next Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be Sunday, March 17th at 6pm in the Parish Hall. Our next movie will be The Passion of the Christ (2004), a highly realistic portrayal of the last twelve hours of Jesus' life on earth—detailing the Agony in the Garden to the burial in the tomb. Directed by Mel Gibson, this film is based on the mystical revelations of Anne Catherine Emmerich. Please note that the movie is rated R for severe violence and parental discretion is advised. Our next movies will be: Fatima on May 5th and A Man For All Seasons on June 22nd.

For Your Reflection:

God's will is to save us, and nothing pleases him more than our coming back to him with true repentance. The heralds of truth and the ministers of divine grace have told us this from the beginning, repeating it in every age. Indeed, God's desire for our salvation is the primary and preeminent sign of his infinite goodness. It was precisely in order to show that there is nothing closer to God's heart that the divine Word of God the Father, with untold condescension, lived among us in the flesh, and did, suffered, and said all that was necessary to reconcile us to God the Father, when we were at enmity with him, and to restore us to the life of blessedness from which we had been exiled. He healed our physical infirmities by miracles; he freed us from our sins, many and grievous as they were, by suffering and dying, taking them upon himself as if he were answerable for them, sinless though he was. He also taught us in many different ways that we should wish to imitate him by our own kindness and genuine love for one another. So it was that Christ proclaimed that he had come to call sinners to repentance, not the righteous, and that it was not the healthy who required a doctor, but the sick. He declared that he had come to look for the sheep that was lost, and that it was to the lost sheep of the house of Israel that he had been sent. Speaking more obscurely in the parable of the silver coin, he tells us that the purpose of his coming was to reclaim the royal image, which had been coated with the filth of sin. You can be sure there is joy in heaven, he said, over one sinner who repents. So also he cried out: Come to me, all you that toil and are heavy of heart. Accept my yoke, he said, by which he meant his commands, or rather, the whole way of life that he taught us in the Gospel. He then speaks of a burden, but that is only because repentance seems difficult. In fact, however, my yoke is easy, he assures us, and my burden is light.

Then again he instructs us in divine justice and goodness, telling us to be like our heavenly Father, holy, perfect and merciful. Forgive, he says, and you will be forgiven. Behave toward other people as you would wish them to behave toward you.
