A Reflection on this Sunday's Gospel

Jesus turns to the bystanders: "For judgment have I come into this world, that they who do not see may see, and they who see may become blind." (Jn 9:1-39) "Blind" are those who realize that with all their earthly insight and knowledge they stand in the dark before the divine, utterly incapable of comprehending the Essential. He who admits this truth to himself and to his God encounters "the light of the world," who unfolds in him powers of heavenly vision. In its clarity he recognizes God's messenger, the new order, the budding new creation. And the more he sees, the more 'seeing' he grows, comprehending the things of God's kingdom more and more deeply and fully. Thus the inner eye feeds on what it sees, and the greater its strength, the

greater the abundance that is revealed to it. The 'seeing,' on the other hand, are those who in God's presence still cling to their earthly point of view, their earthly knowledge, earthly conception of justice, naively attempting to measure even the divine by their own standards. When the Son of God himself stands before them, they see only a rebel and proceed against all who believe in him with the heavy indignation of the righteous. And when



the long awaited Christ performs his miracles before their eyes, they either refuse to see them or brand them works of Satan! Because they do not wish to see, demonstrations of God's power and love only seem to make them incapable of seeing. They become increasingly short-sighted and ultimately blind.

The healing of the blind man gives us a key to the mystery of Jesus' rejection in Jerusalem, and we ourselves are advised to be "in fear and trembling" lest the light in us go out. We too stand 'in court'; for us too the decision must be made as to whether we belong to the 'seeing' whose inner eye is afflicted, or to the 'blind' whose 'eyes' have been opened. And our sentence falls over and over again– each time we hear a word of the Lord or encounter his truth, or feel called upon by his demands, for God weaves a ray of light, which effects either our vision or our blindness, into his every disposition of our lives. Woe to us if we are content with our intrinsic blindness! -Romano Guardini, The Lord

Saint of the Week-St. Joseph

St. Joseph was chosen by God to be the husband and protector of Mary and the foster father of Jesus. Descended in direct line from King David, Joseph was of the more humble trade of carpenter. When he was betrothed to Mary but before they were come together, he learned that she was with child by the Holy Spirit. He sought to divorce her quietly but was dissuaded by an angel. On a trip to Bethlehem for the census, Jesus was born and Joseph soon moved his family to Egypt to protect the child from King Herod. He eventually moved his family back to Nazareth and settled down. When Jesus was 12, he disappeared for a time. With Mary, Joseph spent 3 days seeking for Jesus in Jerusalem and rejoiced upon finding him. He taught Jesus everything he knew of his craft, but more especially of his faith. While none of his words are recorded in scripture, he is described by St. Matthew as a righteous man. He died sometime before the public ministry of Jesus. Joseph is honored as the great Patron and Protector of the Church, this being the extension of the role that he fulfilled in his life while on earth. He is also known as the patron of carpenters, workers, fathers, husbands, and of happy deaths- himself having the great privilege of dying in the arms of Jesus and Mary.

For Your Reflection:

The faithful should look into themselves and carefully examine their minds and the impulses of their hearts. If they find some of the fruits of love stored in their hearts then they must not doubt God's presence within them, but to make themselves more and more able to receive so great a guest they should do more and more works of durable mercy and kindness. After all, if God is love, charity should know no limit, for God himself cannot be confined within limits.

What is the appropriate time for performing works of charity? My beloved children, any time is the right time, but these days of Lent provide a special encouragement. Those who want to be present at the Lord's Passover in holiness of mind and body should seek above all to win this grace. Charity contains all other virtues and covers a multitude of sins.

As we prepare to celebrate that greatest of all mysteries, by which the blood of Jesus Christ destroyed our sins, let us first of all make ready the sacrificial offerings - that is, our works of mercy. What God in his goodness has already given to us, let us give to those who have sinned against us.

And to the poor also, and to those who are afflicted in various ways, let us show a more open-handed generosity so that God may be thanked through many voices and the needy may be fed as a result of our fasting. No act of devotion on the part of the faithful gives God more pleasure than the support that is lavished on his poor. Where God finds charity with its loving concern, there he recognises the reflection of his own fatherly care. Do not be put off giving by a lack of resources. A generous spirit is itself great wealth, and there can be no shortage of material for generosity where it is Christ who feeds and Christ who is fed. His hand is present in all this activity: his hand, which multiplies the bread by breaking it and increases it by giving it away.

When you give alms, do not be anxious but full of happiness. The greatest treasure will go to the one who has kept the least for himself.
