

### From the Pastoral Associate:

In our Gospel today, we read what is the shortest, and yet most profound verse of the bible. It is composed of three words: "And Jesus wept." These words are so profound because Jesus, God the Son himself, weeps at the sight of profound human sadness and suffering, experiencing it in himself to his very core. This was despite the fact that he knew he would raise Lazarus from the dead and turn their weeping into rejoicing. Jesus sees the all-encompassing grief



of his friends and is deeply overcome with emotion. Perhaps he was looking ahead to his crucifixion, where once again his friends and those he loved most dearly would be once again in the deepest agony of grief. This would be a foretaste of what was to come. But like in the future, this was not the end of the story. Lazarus rises from the dead at Jesus' command and likewise Jesus will also rise.

As we continue this journey through Lent, Jesus walks alongside us. He knows our hurt. He knows the painful condition that our sins have left us in- prone to grief, pain, and sometimes despair. He understands and, what's more, he feels it keenly. Jesus asks us, like he asks Marth and Mary, to place our trust in him as the Resurrection and the Life, the one that brings hope and joy out of sadness and despair. At the end of time, we all will rise and God will once more dwell in the midst of us as he did with the Israelites in the Desert and even more profoundly as Jesus dwelt among us. We will experience what the book of Revelation says so beautifully: "he will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning nor crying nor pain any more, for the former things have passed away." (Rev 12:4) As we approach Holy Week and the great mystery of our faith won for us on the Cross and in the Empty Tomb, let us seek to put our trust in our Lord, the Resurrection and the Life.

# **Ministries & Reflections**



### Saint of the Week–St. Nicodemus

St. Nicodemus was a pharisee at the time of Jesus. Mentioned only a few times in scripture, he appears at key points of Jesus' ministry. Nicodemus was described as "a teacher of Israel," which indicated that he was of a high rank among the pharisees, well-versed in the Law of Moses. Nicodemus had seen Jesus' miracles and believed he was sent from God, but was fearful of those around him, so he visited Jesus by night, where Jesus taught him about the sacrament of Baptism and spoke of the salvation he desired for all who believed in him. Nicodemus continues to remain in the background until near the end of Jesus' ministry. Some guards were sent to arrest Jesus but came back baffled by his teachings. The pharisees, in great wrath, rebuke the guards. At this point, Nicodemus rose up and courageously argued that Jesus, under the law, deserved a fair trial and hearing of his teachings before judgment. We next see Nicodemus appear after Jesus' death when he brings 100 pounds of mixed spices and aloes with which to anoint the body of Jesus in preparation for burial. As Jesus' ministry progressed, so did Nicodemus' faith in him. If you struggle with a faint heart and remaining open to the truth of the Gospel, Nicodemus is a great saint to turn to.

# For Your Reflection:

The truth is that only in the mystery of the incarnate Word does the mystery of man take on light. For Adam, the first man, was a figure of Him Who was to come,(20) namely Christ the Lord. Christ, the final Adam, by the revelation of the mystery of the Father and His love, fully reveals man to man himself and makes his supreme calling clear. It is not surprising, then, that in Him all the aforementioned truths find their root and attain their crown. He Who is "the image of the invisible God" (Col. 1:15), is Himself the perfect man. To the sons of Adam He restores the divine likeness which had been disfigured from the first sin onward. Since human nature as He assumed it was not annulled, by that very fact it has been raised up to a divine dignity in our respect too. For by His incarnation the Son of God has united Himself in some fashion with every man. He worked with human hands, He thought with a human mind, acted by human choice and loved with a human heart. Born of the Virgin Mary, He has truly been made one of us, like us in all things except sin. As an innocent lamb He merited for us life by the free shedding of His own blood. In Him God reconciled us to Himself and among ourselves; from bondage to the devil and sin He delivered us, so that each one of us can say with the Apostle: The Son of God "loved me and gave Himself up for me" (Gal. 2:20). By suffering for us He not only provided us with an example for our imitation, He blazed a trail, and if we follow it, life and death are made holy and take on a new meaning. Pressing upon the Christian to be sure, are the need and the duty to battle against evil through manifold

tribulations and even to suffer death. But, linked with the paschal mystery and patterned on the dying Christ, he will hasten forward to resurrection in the strength which comes from hope.

Such is the mystery of man, and it is a great one, as seen by believers in the light of Christian revelation. Through Christ and in Christ, the riddles of sorrow and death grow meaningful. Apart from His Gospel, they overwhelm us. Christ has risen, destroying death by His death; He has lavished life upon us(33) so that, as sons in the Son, we can cry out in the Spirit; Abba, Father.
