From our Pastor

In the midst of Lent, the Church brings our attention to a poignant narrative that resonates with each of us: the encounter of the Samaritan Woman with Jesus at the well. This story serves as a mirror reflecting our own search for meaning and fulfillment in life. Just like the Samaritan Woman, we all find ourselves at various wells throughout our lives,



seeking to quench an insatiable thirst. These wells are the places, habits, things or people we turn to, hoping to find satisfaction. For some, it might be the pursuit of career success, where endless hours of work promise fulfillment but often lead to burnout and a sense of emptiness. For others, it might be in the fleeting pleasures of material possessions, the instant gratification of social media likes, or even in the numbing escape provided by substances or alcohol. Each of these wells represents our attempt to fill a void that seems perpetually unfulfilled.

The narrative of the Samaritan Woman teaches us a profound lesson about human nature and divine grace. Despite drawing water from Jacob's well daily, the woman remained thirsty until Jesus offered her "living water." This encounter illustrates our own futile attempts to find lasting happiness in things that are, by their very nature, transient and unsatisfying. It's a vivid reminder that what we often seek in the wells of this world is, in truth, a deeper yearning for spiritual nourishment and connection with God. G.K. Chesterton's insightful observation, "Every man who knocks on the door of a brothel is looking for God," underscores this profound truth. Our deepest desires are not wrong; they are simply misdirected. Every pursuit of pleasure, every attempt to fill the emptiness within, is essentially a search for the Divine. We are creatures made for communion with God, and our hearts are restless until they find rest in Him, as St. Augustine eloquently put it.

Each of us can identify moments when we've stood at our wells, drawing water that never satisfies. Each of these actions reveals a thirst for something greater, a thirst that can only be quenched by the living water Christ offers.

As we journey deeper into Lent, let us ponder the invitation Jesus extends to the Samaritan Woman and to each of us: "Give me a drink." In doing so, He asks for our trust, inviting us to abandon the wells that leave us wanting and to draw instead from His wellspring of eternal life.

This season of lent, may we reflect on the areas of our lives where we seek fulfillment outside of God. Let us remember that true joy and peace are found not in the wells of this world but in the living water offered by Jesus. Through Him, our deepest thirsts are satisfied, and our souls find their rest.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. John of God

John of God was a former Portuguese soldier who tired of his profession. He had an idea to go to Africa to seek martyrdom among the Muslims but he was spiritually counseled not to do so and spent time wandering Spain. On St. Sebastian's day of 1537, he experienced a profound conversion after hearing a sermon by St. John of Avila. He subsequently beat himself so violently in the streets on account of his sins that he was put into an insane asylum. John of Avila arrived and counseled him that he should be more actively involved in helping others than in enduring hardships. John gained peace of heart and subsequently began to help the poor. He regularly begged for supplies for the poor. The bishop, in order to stop him from constantly giving away his cloak to the poor, clothed him in a religious habit and gave him the name John of God. He slowly gathered to himself followers and he founded the Order of Hospitallers, which was approved by the Holy See in 1572. The order cares for the sick in countries around the world. The order has the distinct privilege of being officially entrusted with the care of the Pope. John died on his 55th birthday in 1550, having died of pneumonia after plunging into a river to save a young man from drowning. He was canonized in 1690 by Pope Alexander VIII.

Catholic Movie Night

Our next Catholic Movie Night, hosted by the Legion of Mary, will be Sunday, March 17th at 6pm in the Parish Hall. Our next movie will be The Passion of the Christ (2004), a highly realistic portrayal of the last twelve hours of Jesus' life on earth—detailing the Agony in the Garden to the burial in the tomb. Directed by Mel Gibson, this film is based on the mystical revelations of Anne Catherine Emmerich. Please note that the movie is rated R for severe violence and parental discretion is advised. For Your Reflection:

In the book of Deuteronomy Moses says to the people: The Lord your God made a covenant on Horeb; he made this covenant, not with your fathers but with you. Why did God not make this covenant with their fathers? Because the law is not aimed at the righteous. Their fathers were righteous: they had the power of the Decalogue implanted in their hearts and in their souls. That is, they loved the God who made them and did nothing unjust against their neighbor. For this reason they did not need to be admonished by written rebukes: they had the righteousness of the law in their hearts. When this righteousness and love for God had passed into oblivion and had been extinguished in Egypt, God had necessarily to reveal himself through his own voice, out of his great love for men. He led the people out of Egypt in power, so that man might once again become God's disciple and follower. He made them afraid as they listened, to warn them not to hold their Creator in contempt. He fed them with manna, that they might receive spiritual food. In the book of Deuteronomy Moses says: He fed you with manna, which your fathers did not know, that you might understand that man will not live by bread alone but by every word of God coming from the mouth of God. He commanded them to love himself and trained them to practice righteousness toward their neighbor, so that man might not be unrighteous or unworthy of God. Through the Ten Commandments he prepared man for friendship with himself and for harmony with his neighbor. This was to man's advantage, though God needed nothing from man. This raised man to glory, for it gave him what he did not have, friendship with God. But it brought no advantage to God, for God did not need man's love. Man did not possess the glory of God, nor could he attain it by any other means than through obedience to God. This is why Moses said to the people: Choose life, that you may live and your descendants too; love the Lord your God, hear his voice and hold fast to him, for this is life for you and length of days. This was the life that the Lord was preparing man to receive when he spoke in person and gave the words of the Ten Commandments for all alike to hear. These words remain with us as well; they were extended and amplified through his coming in the flesh, but not annulled. -From the treatise Against Heresies by Saint Irenaeus
