

From our Pastor

Dear friends and parishioners of Our Lady of Sorrows,
Alleluia! He has risen. Alleluia! He has conquered death. Alleluia! He has brought salvation to the world. Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia! Every now and then, we see on the TV or in the newspapers a notice about a missing person, with the person's photograph and some details. Whether the person was eventually found or not, we cannot be certain because very



often there are no follow-up reports on the case in the media. What is certain is that when a loved one is missing, the anxiety is painful; hearts are broken and the search is relentless. This may express the pain and grief that Mary Magdalene was experiencing on Easter Sunday morning as she looked for the One she loved in the tomb. And not finding Jesus in the tomb, Mary Magdalene searched relentlessly and persistently for Him. Mary Magdalene's love for Jesus was enormous. Nothing could come between her and the love of Jesus. Not even despair or death.

In life, Mary Magdalene loved Jesus, but also in death she searched for Him. Mary's deep love for Jesus was because He loved her first and healed her of her sufferings and sin. Because of her great love for Jesus, Mary Magdalene was given the first privilege to not only see but also to touch the glorious body of the Risen Christ. Jesus also gave her the gift of being the first to witness the resurrection. She became the apostle to the apostles.

As we celebrate Easter today and in the coming weeks, let us contemplate how much we love Jesus, guided by the example of Mary Magdalene, the greatest disciple of love. Let us ask ourselves: How much do we love Jesus? Is our love contingent only on our fortunes, when hopes are high and things are going well, or do we search for Jesus even in the darkest nights of our lives?

May our faith and love for Jesus be strengthened today as we celebrate His resurrection. Let us remember that just as Christ loved Mary Magdalene while she was still in her sins, God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us (Romans 5:8). And with Mary Magdalene, let us sing, Alleluia! He has risen. Alleluia! He has conquered death. Alleluia!

This Easter, let us also extend our love and support to those in our community who are in need. Whether it be through prayer, service, or a simple act of kindness, let our actions reflect the love and resurrection of Jesus Christ. May our community be a beacon of hope and a testament to the endless love of Christ.



Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Vincent Ferrer

St. Vincent of Ferrer was born in Valencia in 1350, the son of well-to-do parents. He had a quality education and at age 18 joined the Dominican Friars. Overcoming temptations to leave, Ferrer professed vows with the order. For three years the only thing he read were the scriptures and soon committed them to memory. He published a treatise on Dialectic Suppositions after his solemn profession. In 1379 he was ordained a Catholic priest in Barcelona. He eventually received a doctorate in Theology. He spent 21 years traveling to England, Scotland, Ireland, Aragon, Castille, France, Switzerland, and Italy, preaching the Gospel as a missionary. Many biographers note that he only knew how to speak Catalan, and that he was endowed by God with the gift of tongues during this period as he preached. Though an intellectual, his preaching style was innovative in the way it employed a popular tone yet having a directness to the doctrine he was preaching. Ferrer also aided in several disputes including during the Western Schism when the Church was suffering from 3 claimants to the papacy as well as in aiding the selection of the next King of Aragon. St. Vincent Ferrer died in April 5, 1419 in Vannes, Brittany and was buried in the Vannes Cathedral. He was canonized by Pope Calixtus III in 1455.

For Your Reflection:

Saint Paul rejoices in the knowledge that spiritual health has been restored to the human race. Death entered the world through Adam, he explains, but life has been given back to the world through Christ. As we have borne the image of the earthly man, the image of human nature grown old in sin, so let us bear the image of the heavenly man: human nature raised up, redeemed, restored and purified in Christ. We must hold fast to the salvation we have received. Christ was the first fruits, says the Apostle; he is the source of resurrection and life. Those who belong to Christ will follow him. Modeling their lives on his purity, they will be secure in the hope of his resurrection and of enjoying with him the glory promised in heaven. Thus the passion of our Savior is the salvation of mankind. The reason why he desired to die for us was that he wanted us who believe in him to live for ever. In the fullness of time it was his will to become what we are, so that we might inherit the eternity he promised and live with him for ever. Here, then, is the grace conferred by these heavenly mysteries, the gift which Easter brings, the most longed for feast of the year; here are the beginnings of creatures newly formed: children born from the life-giving font of holy Church, born anew with the simplicity of little ones, and crying out with the evidence of a clean conscience. Chaste fathers and inviolate mothers accompany this new family, countless in number, born to new life through faith. As they emerge from the grace-giving womb of the font, a blaze of candles burns brightly beneath the tree of faith. The Easter festival brings the grace of holiness from heaven to men. Through the repeated celebration of the sacred mysteries they receive the spiritual nourishment of the sacraments. Fostered at the very heart of holy Church, the fellowship of one community worships the one God, adoring the triple name of his essential holiness, and together with the prophet sings the psalm which belongs to this yearly festival: This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad. And what is this day? It is the Lord Jesus Christ himself, the author of light, who brings the sunrise and the beginning of life, saying of himself: I am the light of day; whoever walks in daylight does not stumble. That is to say, whoever follows Christ in all things will come by this path to the throne of eternal light. -From an Easter homily by an ancient author


