

In our Gospel today, we read about the event of the Transfiguration of Jesus. I wanted to take this time to explore the event through the icon of the Transfiguration as it was written by Theophanes the Greek in the 15th century. This icon is a well-known

Theophanes uses a kind of "disordered symmetry" to invite us into the drama of the moment. In each icon, we are called not just to reflect on a historical event but to enter a spiritual mystery. Often called "Windows to Heaven", the medium of icons is meant to allow us engage with the subjects as they now exist in Eternity through the use of symbolism, facial expression, shape, and color. An icon is therefore not painted, but written, as one would write a book. The icon portrays Jesus standing above in the top center clothed in radiantly white garments. His hand is raised in blessing as he looks directly toward us. A nimbus opens behind him, representing the presence

of the Trinity overshadowing him in this icon. Jesus stands upon a mountain (abstractly portrayed as is typical in icons). Three rays go downwards to the eyes of the three apostles present-Peter, John and James. Light also flows from him to us (the star-like shape behind Jesus), meant to dazzle us as he did the Apostles. Theophanes' point is that the uncreated light that shines from Jesus is not something merely unique to history, but is something that we should enter into by prayer and fasting through a process called Theosis. To Jesus' right stands Elijah. Elijah stands on his own mountain, which is Mt. Horeb, where he heard the still small voice giving him instruction (1 Kings 19:18). To Jesus' right is Moses, who stands upon Mt. Sinai, where he received the Ten Commandments. Above both men is a scene showing each conversing with angels during these moments. The presence of Moses and Elijah represents the teaching of the Law and the Prophets, which Jesus fulfills (Matt 5:17). Both lean in toward Jesus, clearly conversing with him about his crucifixion and death, which are rapidly approaching. The apostles below are depicted dazzled by this heavenly light. John and James can't look directly at Jesus. John is depicted with his hand on his chin, meditating on what this vision means. James is depicted with hands covering his eyes from the brightness of the light. Only Peter looks up to say, "Lord it is good that we are here..." Below Moses and Elijah are shown the ascent and descent of Mt. Tabor. The left depicts Jesus asking the Apostles to go up with him to pray. Jesus instructs us too to ascend the mountain and pray through our spiritual asceticism. He too wishes us to experience a deep life of prayer and mystical contemplation. And yet, even in its full glory, we cannot yet live in the fullness of that glory. It is for the next life that Jesus will usher in at his Second Coming. The right shows Jesus descending with the Apostles, instructing them not to tell them what they have seen.

As we make our way through this Lent, let us keep our minds and hearts on this image of Jesus in his glory, seeking to make ourselves more worthy of the uncreated light of Tabor by which we glimpse Jesus' Death and Resurrection in a new way. Let us not lose heart. At every Mass, at every moment of prayer, Jesus wishes us to encounter him and grow in our love for him. Lent is a particularly good time to do so because it's a time of great interior and spiritual focus meant to reorient ourselves back to a deeper relationship with God.



# **Ministries & Reflections**



## Saints of the Week—Sts. Perpetua and Felicity

St. Perpetua and St. Felicity are 3rd centuryChristian martyrs who in Carthage, Africa. Perpetua was a recently married and well-educated noblewoman, roughly the age of 22. She was the mother to an infant son, whom she was still nursing. Felicity was a slave woman who lived in Perpetua's house and pregnant at the time of her imprisonment. Both were catechumens preparing for baptism. Perpetua was in conflict with her father, who demanded she recant her belief in Christ. Perpetua refused, which led her father to turn them over to the authorities. They, along with three other Christian men, were sentenced to be mauled by wild beasts and to be stabbed by a gladiator. Both were baptized just shortly before being taken to prison. Perpetua had a vision that she and the others with her would suffer martyrdom. Felicity was afraid that, being pregnant, she would not be able to suffer martyrdom with the others. Two days before the execution, Felicity gave birth to a girl while in the prison. Both children were taken from their mothers, Felicity's to a Christian woman and Perpetua's back to her father. A feast was held the day before to mock the Christians but they in turn mocked the crowds for their unbelief. They entered eternal life in 203.

#### For Your Reflection:

The perfection of brotherly love lies in the love of one's enemies. We can find no greater inspiration for this than grateful remembrance of the wonderful patience of Christ. He who is more fair than all the sons of men offered his fair face to be spat upon by sinful men; he allowed those eyes that rule the universe to be blindfolded by wicked men; he bared his back to the scourges; he submitted that head which strikes terror in principalities and powers to the sharpness of the thorns; he game himself up to be mocked and reviled, and at the end endured the cross, the nails, the lance, the gall, the vinegar, remaining always gentle, meek and full of peace.

Who could listen to that wonderful prayer, so full of warmth, of love, of unshakable serenity—Father, forgive them— and hesitate to embrace his enemies with overflowing love? Father, he says, forgive them. Is any gentleness, any love, lacking in this prayer? Yet he put into it something more. It was not enough to pray for them: he wanted also to make excuses for them. Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing. They are great sinners, yes, but they have little judgment; therefore Father, forgive them. They are nailing me to the cross, but they do not know who it is that they are nailing to the cross: if they had known, they would never have crucified the Lord of glory; therefore, Father forgive them. They think it is a lawbreaker, an imposter claiming to be God, a seducer of the people. I have hidden my face from them, and they do not recognize my glory; therefore, Father, forgive them, for the do not know what they are doing. If someone wishes to love himself he must not allow himself to be corrupted by indulging his sinful nature. If he wishes to resist the promptings of his sinful nature he must enlarge the whole horizon of his love to contemplate the loving gentleness of the humanity of the Lord. Further, if he wishes to savor the joy of brotherly love with greater perfection and delight he must extend even to his enemies the embrace of true love. But if he wishes to prevent this fire of divine love from growing cold because of injuries received, let him keep the eyes of his soul always fixed on the serene patience of his beloved Lord and Savior. -from The Mirror of Love by St. Aelred of Rievaulx
