

From our Pastor:

Into the Desert with Jesus

The Gospel account of Jesus' time in the desert (Luke 4:1-13) is a profound invitation for us as we journey through Lent. Jesus, filled with the Holy Spirit, is led into the wilderness, where He fasts and is tempted by the devil. His responses to temptation reveal key lessons for our spiritual growth: reliance on God, worship of Him alone, and trust without testing. How can we live these lessons in practical ways during Lent?

Relying on God More than Material Needs

The devil tempts Jesus to turn stones into bread, but Jesus responds, "One does not live on bread alone." This reminds us that while physical needs are important, they should never replace our spiritual hunger for God.

Lenten Practices:

- Fasting with Purpose: Give up something meaningful—food, social media, or another comfort—and use that time to pray or read Scripture.
- **Practice Generosity:** Donate food, time, or resources to those in need, recognizing that true sustenance comes from God's grace.
- **Daily Prayer:** Make time each day to seek God's word, allowing Him to nourish your soul. Maybe adding 15 minutes of your daily prayer.

Worship God Alone:

The second temptation offers Jesus power and glory in exchange for worshiping the devil. Jesus firmly responds, "You shall worship the Lord, your God, and Him alone shall you serve." Lent is a time to refocus our worship and recognize what might be competing with God in our lives.

Lenten Practices:

- Identify Your Idols: Reflect on what takes priority over God—career, social approval, entertainment? Seek to reorder your life so that God is first.
- **Devotions:** Spend extra time in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, worshiping God in silence and thanksgiving or pick up a devotion you like to follow this lent.
- **Simplify Your Life:** Reduce distractions that lead you away from God, whether it's excessive spending, overcommitment, or unhealthy habits. (continued on page 3)

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-Bl. Humbert III of Savoy

Humbert, of Avigliana, Italy was born 1136. His life was marked by certain key features, borne of a vocation and tradition of contemplative life. He fostered these along with his role as military leader and politician. He succeeded his father as Count of Savoy, France at an early age, having received his education and spiritual formation from a saint, the bishop Amadeus of Lausanne. While serving as the married sovereign of Savoy, Humbert continued his life of deep piety. Following his wife's death, he withdrew to the Lake Geneva monastery of Aulpes. But his courtiers insisted that for the good of Savoy he should return and re-marry. Humbert acceded to their entreaties, and his second wife gave birth to his first child, Agnes. Tragedy again struck the Savoy household when shortly before Agnes' wedding both she and her mother died. After marrying a fourth time and having a son, Humbert withdrew to the monastery of Hautecombe, France, living there in great humility and self-denial. Acounts of his final years vary, with some asserting he died at Hautecombe, and others claiming he died at Chambery while defending Savoy from an invading army. Humbert's life was full of contradictions: He was a lover of peace but had frequent hostilities and wars. He was penitent, ascetic, and contemplative, but was forced to take the reins of government, during which time he had a life of action, and found himself forced into marriage in order to have an heir. However, he let unmistakable signs of great moral balance, severity with himself and indulgence and love of neighbour. He was a benefactor to churches, monasteries, and charitable causes, the care of the poor. Throughout his life, he supported Hautecombe Abbey. In 1188 he founded the Monastery of Sant'Antonio di Ranverso. St. Alphonsus Ligouri described him as a particularly pious monk. The death of Humbert III, 4 March 1189 in Chambéry, Savoy at the age of fifty -two, was mourned sincerely by all the people. He was the first prince of Savoy to be buried in Hautecombe Abbey, which has since become a burial place for the dynasty. Less than three centuries later, the descendants of Humbert, of the Savoy lineage, became the custodians of the Shroud of Turin.

Trusting God Without Testing Him

Satan tempts Jesus to throw Himself down from the Temple, demanding that God prove His protection. Jesus responds, "You shall not put the Lord, your God, to the test." True faith is trusting in God's care even when we do not see immediate results.

Lenten Practices:

- Surrender Your Worries: Instead of trying to control outcomes, practice trusting in God's providence. Keep a journal of prayers and how God answers them in His timing.
- Accept God's Will: When faced with suffering or difficulty, pray the words of Jesus, "Not my will, but yours be done" (Luke 22:42).
- Strengthen Your Faith: Read about the saints, whose lives exemplify unwavering trust in God even in the midst of trials.

Walking With Christ This Lent

As we journey through Lent, let us embrace the desert experience not as a burden, but as an opportunity to deepen our reliance on God, to purify our hearts in worship, and to trust in His divine plan. By fasting, giving, and praying with sincerity, we can grow in holiness and prepare our hearts for the joy of Easter.

May this season be a time of true renewal, where we, like Christ, emerge from the wilderness stronger in faith and filled with the Holy Spirit.
