From our Pastor

Dear Friends & Parishioners of Our Lady of Sorrows, In this week's gospel reflection, we contemplate the profound encounter between Jesus

and His disciples on the road to Emmaus, a moment that illuminates the ways we can find Christ in our lives today: through the Scriptures, in the Eucharist, and in the stranger.

After Jesus' resurrection, two of His disciples walked together, sharing their confusion and sorrow over the events of the past days. Unbeknownst to them, Jesus Himself joined their journey, though they did not recognize Him. It was only through the breaking of bread that their eyes were opened to His presence. This profound encounter is a vivid reminder of the ways Jesus reveals Himself to us.



Firstly, finding Jesus in the Scriptures is akin to the disciples' journey on the road. As they walked, Jesus explained the Scriptures to them, revealing how the events of His life, death, and resurrection were the fulfillment of God's promises. Similarly, when we immerse ourselves in the Scriptures, we allow Christ to speak to us, opening our minds to the truths of God's word. The Bible is not merely a historical document or a collection of moral teachings; it is the living word of God (Heb 4:12), where Christ meets us in a very personal way instructing, comforting, and challenging us.

Secondly, the Eucharist is the most profound means through which Jesus is made known to us. Just as the disciples recognized Jesus in the breaking of the bread, we encounter Christ in the Eucharist. It is when we are gathered here as a parish community that the risen Lord reveals to us his bountiful love through his Body and Blood. Through the Eucharist, we participate in the Paschal mystery, celebrating and receiving the real presence of Christ. It strengthens our communion with God and with one another, nourishing our souls and empowering us to be the Body of Christ in the world. Lastly, finding Jesus in the stranger. As these disciples walked and discussed the events surrounding Jesus' crucifixion and the swirling rumors of His resurrection, they were joined by a stranger. This stranger, unknown to them, was the Risen Lord Himself. In our daily lives, Jesus comes to us in the guise of the stranger, the needy, the sick, and the marginalized. Encountering Jesus in these faces calls us to practice hospitality, compassion, and love, recognizing the dignity and worth of every person. As we reflect on these three ways of encountering Jesus, let us ask for the grace to recognize Him in every moment of our lives. May our hearts be open to the Scriptures, may we cherish the gift of the Eucharist, and may we welcome Jesus in every stranger we meet.



Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- Bl. Michael J. McGivney

Fr. Michael J. McGivney was born in 1852 to Irish immigrant parents, the oldest of 13 children. He attended his local school but dropped out at 13 to work at a spoon factory. At age 16 he entered the seminary but left in 1873 after his father's death to care for his siblings. He resumed his studies a little while later and was ordained in 1877 for the Archdiocese of Baltimore. His own experience made him recognize the devastating impact that the death of a father can have on a home and this led him, while assistant pastor at St. Mary's in New Haven Connecticut, to found the Knights of Columbus, a mutual aid society designed to provide financial assistance, in the event of the men's death, to their widows and orphans. It soon developed into a fraternal society. Today the Knights of Columbus is the largest fraternal charity in the world, boasting over 2 million members in 2020 and donating \$185 million and 49 million man hours to charity. McGivney spent 7 years at St. Mary's and then became pastor of St. Thomas Church in Thomaston, MD in 1884. He died of pneumonia at the age of 38 in 1890 on the eve of the feast of the Assumption. His cause of canonization was opened up in 1996. In 2008, Pope Benedict declared him "Venerable" in recognition of his heroic virtue. He was beatified in 2020.

Rediscover Your Faith

Our next meeting will be announced soon and will be at St. Monica's, our sister parish. During each meeting we focus in on a special topic to explore. Our next topic will be on the Church's teachings on Mary and her importance in our salvation history. For Your Reflection:

No one may share the eucharist with us unless he believes that what we teach is true, unless he is washed in the regenerating waters of baptism for the remission of his sins, and unless he lives in accordance with the principles given us by Christ. We do not consume the eucharistic bread and wine as if it were ordinary food and drink, for we have been taught that as Jesus Christ our Savior became a man of flesh and blood by the power of the Word of God, so also the food that our flesh and blood assimilates for its nourishment becomes the flesh and blood of the incarnate Jesus by the power of his own words contained in the prayer of thanksgiving. The apostles, in their recollections, which are called gospels, handed down to us what Jesus commanded them to do. They tell us that he took bread, gave thanks and said: Do this in memory of me. This is my body. In the same way he took the cup, he gave thanks and said: This is my blood. The Lord gave this command to them alone. Ever since then we have constantly reminded one another of these things. The rich among us help the poor and we are always united. For all that we receive we praise the Creator of the universe through his Son Jesus Christ and through the Holy Spirit. On Sunday we have a common assembly of all our members, whether they live in the city or the outlying districts. The recollections of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read, as long as there is time. When the reader has finished, the president of the assembly speaks to us; he urges everyone to imitate the examples of virtue we have heard in the readings. Then we all stand up together and pray. On the conclusion of our prayer, bread and wine and water are brought forward. The president offers prayers and gives thanks to the best of his ability, and the people give assent by saying, "Amen." The eucharist is distributed, everyone present communicates, and the deacons take it to those who are absent. We hold our common assembly on Sunday because it is the first day of the week, the day on which God put darkness and chaos to flight and created the world, and because on that same day our savior Jesus Christ rose from the dead. For he was crucified on Friday and on Sunday he appeared to his apostles and disciples and taught them the things that we have passed on for your consideration.
