From the Pastoral Associate:

Today is Divine Mercy Sunday, so named by Pope St. John Paul II during the Jubilee year of 2000 at the Canonization Mass for St. Faustina Kowalska. St. Faustina was a polish nun who lived in the early to mid 20th century. St. Faustina was a mystic and had many visions of Jesus, which are published in her Diary called Divine Mercy in My Soul. Jesus appeared to her wearing white with red and white rays emanating from his heart. He told her to paint an image as she saw Jesus and to have a feast of Divine Mercy established in the Church. He told her: "I want the Image to be solemnly blessed on the first Sunday after Easter, and I want it to be venerated publicly so that every soul may know about it...

My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy."



Jesus described himself as Divine Mercy Incarnate, who longed to give that mercy to the entire world. The rays that emanate from his heart in the image represent the blood and water that poured out from his side on the Cross. When Jesus told St. Faustina about the Feast of Divine Mercy, he said to her,

"My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the divine floodgates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the First Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy."

Let us take the time to turn fervently to Jesus and never despair of his mercy, which is without limit or measure.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- St. Anselm of Canterbury St. Anselm was a renowned Bishop, philosopher, and theolo-

gian who lived in England in the 11th century. He began his career as a Benedictine monk at Bec in Normandy where he lived a quiet life for about 30 years. During that time he wrote many important treatises that have continued to have an impact on philosophy today. He is particularly famous for his ontological argument, which argued that God's existence is demonstrated simply by knowing what God is- that than which nothing greater can be thought. While many later philosophers like St. Thomas Aquinas rejected this argument, others, like Renee Descartes, used it in their own writings. His emphasis on promoting a "faith seeking understanding" has made Anselm the Father of the Scholasticism in philosophy, among whose adherents was St. Peter Lombard, St. Thomas Aquinas, Duns Scotus, and others. In 1093 Anselm was consecrated the Bishop of Canterbury and found himself embroiled in many controversies. He sought to guarantee the Church's right to pick its own bishops rather than being chosen by kings and found himself exiled twice. He worked hard to maintain a Church that was free from political pressures. Anselm died in 1109 and was named a Doctor of the Church by Pope Clement XI in 1720 for his many contributions to the intellectual life of the Church.

For Your Reflection:

The spiritual building up of the body of Christ is achieved through love. As Saint Peter says: Like living stones you are built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. And there can be no more effective way to pray for this spiritual growth than for the Church, itself Christ's body, to make the offering of his body and blood in the sacramental form of bread and wine. For the cup we drink is a participation in the blood of Christ, and the bread we break is a participation in the body of Christ. Because there is one loaf, we who are many are one body, since we all share the same bread. And so we pray that, by the same grace which made the Church Christ's body, all its members may remain firm in the unity of that body through the enduring bond of love.

We are right to pray that this may be brought about in us through the gift of the one Spirit of the Father and the Son. The holy Trinity, the one true God, is of its nature unity, equality and love, and by one divine activity sanctifies its adopted sons. That is why Scripture says that God's love has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit he has given us. The Holy Spirit, who is the one Spirit of the Father and the Son, produces in those to whom he gives the grace of divine adoption the same effect as he produced among those whom the Acts of the Apostles describes as having received the Holy Spirit. We are told that the company of those who believed were of one heart and soul, because the one Spirit of the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is one God, had created a single heart and soul in all those who believed. This is why Saint Paul in his exhortation to the Ephesians says that this spiritual unity in the bond of peace must be carefully preserved.

God makes the Church itself a sacrifice pleasing in his sight by preserving within it the love which his Holy Spirit has poured out. Thus the grace of that spiritual love is always available to us, enabling us continually to offer ourselves to God as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to him for ever.

The Trisagion (or "thrice holy") is a prayer sung during the Eastern Rite Divine Liturgy before the Eucharistic prayer. It is also sung during Good Friday and forms the basis for the concluding prayers of the Divine Mercy Chaplet.
