

From our Pastoral Associate

In this Sunday's reading, we listen to Jesus as he tells us that he is the Good Shepherd. In this discourse, Jesus states that his sheep will hear his voice and follow him. It is a well known fact that sheep come to rely and trust their shepherd as their protection and guide, particularly their voice. A traveler to the Holy Land once was sitting with his friends beside a well and watched as many shepherds brought their flocks for a drink. The flocks interminaled and mixed so much that the travelers were bewildered, expecting this to be a massive headache and nightmare for the shepherds. It was impossible to differentiate which sheep belonged to which shepherd as there were no markings or ear tags. When the sheep had drunk, the shepherds all began going back the way they came and as they did so gave a distinct call of their voice. Immediately, the flocks separated perfectly, each following their shepherd.



The travelers suddenly understood what Jesus had meant by sheep knowing his voice. This is a constant theme throughout the Gospel of John, of Jesus speaking, and the disciples (his sheep) hearing his voice and having faith in him. We see it in the man born blind, who does not recognize Jesus by sight, but knows his voice. We see it in the raising of Lazarus, when Jesus cries out with a loud voice and Lazarus comes forth. We also see it at the empty tomb, when Mary Magdalene, thinking she is pleading with a gardener, hears Jesus say, "Mary!" and she recognizes the voice of her teacher, despite clearly not recognizing him.

How do we recognize the voice of our shepherd? There are many ways of doing so. We can study the scriptures, to fully understand and know the mind and heart of Christ. We should study the Church's teachings, as they are directly extended from him. His teaching should be so familiar to us that we recognize the clear and straight way when we see it, ready to follow when he calls, no matter the situation. We should also spend time with him in prayer and the sacraments, learning to recognize his presence in our lives, open to his work in our souls. We are his flock, he our shepherd. We should come to respect, know, love, and follow him through any trial or tribulation. And this is something that only comes about by sitting at the feet of the Master, in quiet conversation with the one who loves our souls as no one else can.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Fidelis of Sigmaringen

Born in 1577, Mark Rey became a lawyer who constantly upheld the causes of the poor and oppressed people. Nicknamed "the poor man's lawyer," Rey soon grew disgusted with the corruption and injustice he saw among his colleagues. He left his law career to become a priest, joining his brother as a member of the Capuchin Order, taking the name Fidelis. His wealth was divided between needy seminarians and the poor. As a Capuchin, Fidelis continued his devotion to the weak and needy. During a severe epidemic in a city where he was guardian of a friary, Fidelis cared for and cured many sick soldiers. He was appointed head of a group of Capuchins sent to preach against the Calvinists and Zwinglians in Switzerland. This was guaranteed to be a dangerous, even deadly, mission. On this mission, Fidelis would pray throughout the night. He was accused of opposing the peasants' national aspirations for independence from Austria. While he was preaching at Seewis, to which he had gone against the advice of his friends, a gun was fired at him, but he escaped unharmed. A Protestant offered to shelter Fidelis, but he declined, saying his life was in God's hands. On the road back, he was set upon by a group of armed men and killed. St. Fidelis was canonized in 1746. Fifteen years later he was recognized as a martyr.

Rediscover Your Faith

Our next topic will be on the Church's teachings on Mary and her importance in our salvation history. For Your Reflection:

If our flesh is not saved, then the Lord has not redeemed us with his blood, the eucharistic chalice does not make us sharers in his blood, and the bread we break does not make us sharers in his body. There can be no blood without veins, flesh and the rest of the human substance, and this the Word of God actually became: it was with his own blood that he redeemed us. As the Apostle says: In him, through his blood, we have been redeemed, our sins have been forgiven.

We are his members and we are nourished by creation, which is his gift to us, for it is he who causes the sun to rise and the rain to fall. He declared that the chalice, which comes from his creation, was his blood, and he makes it the nourishment of our blood. He affirmed that the bread, which comes from his creation, was his body, and he makes it the nourishment of our body. When the chalice we mix and the bread we bake receive the word of God, the eucharistic elements become the body and blood of Christ, by which our bodies live and grow. How then can it be said that flesh belonging to the Lord's own body and nourished by his body and blood is incapable of receiving God's gift of eternal life? Saint Paul says in his letter to the Ephesians that we are members of his body, of his flesh and bones. He is not speaking of some spiritual and incorporeal kind of man, for spirits do not have flesh and bones. He is speaking of a real human body composed of flesh, sinews and bones, nourished by the chalice of Christ's blood and receiving growth from the bread which is his body.

The slip of a vine planted in the ground bears fruit at the proper time. The grain of wheat falls into the ground and decays only to be raised up again and multiplied by the Spirit of God who sustains all things. The Wisdom of God places these things at the service of man and when they receive God's word they become the eucharist, which is the body and blood of Christ. In the same way our bodies, which have been nourished by the eucharist, will be buried in the earth and will decay, but they will rise again at the appointed time, for the Word of God will raise them up to the glory of God the Father. Then the Father will clothe our mortal nature in immortality and freely endow our corruptible nature with incorruptibility, for God's power is shown most perfectly in weakness.




The Legion of Mary
