From our Pastoral Associate

In the Gospel today, we read of Jesus' appearance to the Apostles and Thomas' doubt, expressing in no uncertain terms that he would not believe Jesus had been raised from the dead until he put his fingers in the holes where the nails were driven through, or place his hand in Jesus' side. Perhaps the most perfect depiction of this comes from Caravaggio's The Incredulity of Saint Thomas, which depicts the moment of Thomas' belief as he probes the wounds of Jesus. His face expresses the dawning of a new faith in Jesus as



his finger is placed in Jesus' side. His eyes are bloodshot from the intense mourning he has been undergoing. His face (particularly his brow) expresses shock and amazement at what he is feeling. Perhaps he can feel Jesus' lungs as he inhales and exhales and the beating of his heart. At any rate, it is clear that Jesus is alive and not a ghost or animated corpse. Jesus, meanwhile, is patient with him, allowing this act, knowing that it will restore his faith. Two other apostles look on, making it clear that, while Thomas was the most vocal in his unbelief and the most bold in wanting verification, he was not the only one that had doubts. Emphasized in this passage, as well as the painting, is the fleshly nature of Jesus' Resurrection. Jesus did not abandon his body. He did not remove the imperfections that had marked his flesh by our sins. Rather, they now transform into a sign of his love for us. A few years ago, I attended Divine Mercy Sunday with Bishop Barron, the creator of the Catholicism TV series. He emphasized that the Gospel could be summed up in a single sentence: God became man and we killed him, but he returned to us in forgiving love. And part of his forgiving love was showing us his wounds. His wounds, inherently an ugly thing, now become a thing of beauty and an expression of love to those with faith. This is particularly emphasized in the devotion to the Divine Mercy (of which this Sunday has been named) that was promoted by St. Faustina Kowalska. Jesus appeared to her and asked her to paint an image of him as she saw. This image showed red and white rays of light coming from the open wound in Jesus' side, representing the blood and water which came from his side when his heart was pierced by a lance. The water and blood represent the sacraments of Baptism and the Eucharist respectively- from which we derive our life as children of God. Clearly underscoring the need for faith in light of Jesus' wounds, the painting bears the title at the bottom "Jesus, I trust in you!" This, message so eloquently represents Thomas' exclamation of "My Lord and my God!" Let us also turn to him and, with amazement and great faith, place our trust in him.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Stanislaus

St. Stanislaus was born near Kraków on July 26, 1030. He was ordained a priest after being educated in the cathedral schools of Gniezno, then capital of Poland, and at Paris. He was appointed preacher and archdeacon to the bishop of Kraków, where his eloquence and example brought about real conversion in many of his penitents, both clergy and laity. He became bishop of Kraków in 1072. During an expedition against the Grand Duchy of Kiev, Stanislaus became involved in the political situation of Poland. Known for his outspokenness, he aimed his attacks at the evils of the peasantry and the king, especially the unjust wars and immoral acts of King Boleslaus II.

The king first excused himself, then made a show of penance, then relapsed into his old ways. Stanislaus continued his open opposition in spite of charges of treason and threats of death, finally excommunicating the king. Enraged, the latter ordered soldiers to kill the bishop. When they refused, the king killed Stanislaus with his own hands. Forced to flee to Hungary, Boleslaus supposedly spent the rest of his life as a penitent in the Benedictine abbey in Osiak. He was canonized in 1253 by Pope Innocent IV. He is the patron saint of Poland and almost every Polish king in history was crowned while they knelt beside is sarcophagus.

For Your Reflection:

You were led down to the font of holy baptism just as Christ was taken down from the cross and placed in the tomb which is before your eyes. Each of you was asked, "Do you believe in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit?" You made the profession of faith that brings salvation, you were plunged into the water, and three times you rose again. This symbolized the three days Christ spent in the tomb. As our Savior spent three days and three nights in the depths of the earth, so your first rising from the water represented the first day and your first immersion represented the first night. At night a man cannot see, but in the day he walks in the light. So when you were immersed in the water it was like night for you and you could not see, but when you rose again it was like coming into broad daylight. In the same instant you died and were born again; the saving water was both your tomb and your mother. Solomon's phrase in another context is very apposite here. He spoke of a time to give birth, and a time to die. For you, however, it was the reverse: a time to die, and a time to be born, although in fact both events took place at the same time and your birth was simultaneous with your death.

This is something amazing and unheard of! It was not we who actually died, were buried and rose again. We only did these things symbolically, but we have been saved in actual fact. It is Christ who was crucified, who was buried and who rose again, and all this has been attributed to us. We share in his sufferings symbolically and gain salvation in reality. What boundless love for men! Christ's undefiled hands were pierced by the nails; he suffered the pain. I experience no pain, no anguish, yet by the share that I have in his sufferings he freely grants me salvation. Let no one imagine that baptism consists only in the forgiveness of sins and in the grace of adoption. Our baptism is not like the baptism of John, which conferred only the forgiveness of sins. We know perfectly well that baptism, besides washing away our sins and bringing us the gift of the Holy Spirit, is a symbol of the sufferings of Christ. This is why Paul exclaims: Do you not know that when we were baptized into Christ Jesus we were, by that very action, sharing in his death? By baptism we went with him into the tomb.
