### From our Pastor:

Dear friends and parishioners of Our Lady of Sorrows,

Alleluia! He has risen. Alleluia! He has conquered death. Alleluia! He has brought salvation to the world. Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

Every now and then, we see on the TV or in the newspapers a notice about a missing person with the person's photograph and some details. Whether the person was eventually found or not, we cannot be certain because very often there are no follow-up reports on the case in the media. What is certain is that when a loved one is missing, the anxiety is painful; hearts are broken and the search is relentless. This may express the pain and grief that Mary Magdalene was experiencing on Easter Sunday morning as she looked for the One she loved in the tomb. And not finding Jesus



in the tomb, Mary Magdalene searched relentlessly and persistently for Him. Mary Magdalene's love for Jesus was enormous. Nothing could come between her and the love of Jesus. Not even despair or even death.

In life, Mary Magdalene loved Jesus but also in death she searched for Him. Mary's deep love for Jesus was because it was He who loved her first and healed her of her sufferings and sin. Because of her great love for Jesus, Mary Magdalene was given the first privilege to see but also to touch the glorious body of the Risen Christ. Jesus also gave her the gift of being the first disciple to the resurrection. She became the apostle to the apostles.

As we celebrate Easter today and even in the coming weeks its good to contemplate on how much we love Jesus guided by the example of Mary Magdalene, the greatest disciple of love. Let us ask ourselves; how much do we love Jesus? Is it only when our hopes are high and when things are going well, or do we search for Jesus even in the darkest night of our lives?

May our faith and love for Jesus be strengthened today as we celebrate his resurrection. Let us remember that just as Christ loved Mary Magdalene while she was still in her sin; God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us (Rom 5:8). And with Mary Magdalene let us sing, Alleluia! He has risen. Alleluia! He has conquered death. Alleluia! Happy Easter!

# **Ministries & Reflections**



### Saint of the Week- St. Helena

St. Helena was the mother of the Roman Emperor St. Constantine the Great. After Constantine became emperor and legalized Christianity in 306 AD, Helena converted. In 326, she made a trip to the Holy Land, seeking to find and memorialize the sites where Jesus was born, lived, died, and rose again. She had two churches built- the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem and the Church of the Eleona on the Mount of Olives, where Christ ascended into heaven. She demolished a temple of Venus built by the Emperor Hadrian on the site of the Empty Tomb where Jesus was buried. It was there that she ordered an excavation to search for the tomb and, upon digging, three crosses were discovered. It was believed that one was the Cross of Jesus but St. Helena wanted sure proof. She had them touch each of the crosses to a woman near death and upon touching the third one, the woman miraculously recovered. Helena knew that she had found the True Cross and also the location of Jesus' tomb. Having learned of this, St. Constanatine ordered the building of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre over the cave where Jesus had been buried. Helena brought many relics of Jesus' passion (including the entire flight of stairs that he ascended to Pilate) back to Rome, where they are still preserved at the Basilica of Santa Croce. She died in 330.

### For Your Reflection:

We should understand, beloved, that the paschal mystery is at once old and new, transitory and eternal, corruptible and incorruptible, mortal and immortal. In terms of the Law it is old, in terms of the Word it is new. In its figure it is passing, in its grace it is eternal. It is corruptible in the sacrifice of the lamb, incorruptible in the eternal life of the Lord. It is mortal in his burial in the earth, immortal in his resurrection from the dead.

The Law indeed is old, but the Word is new. The type is transitory, but grace is eternal. The lamb was corruptible, but the Lord is incorruptible. He was slain as a lamb; he rose again as God. *He was led like a sheep to the slaughter*, yet he was not a sheep. He was silent as a lamb, yet he was not a lamb. The type has passed away; the reality has come. The lamb gives place to God, the sheep gives place to a man, and the man is Christ, who fills the whole of creation. The sacrifice of the lamb, the celebration of the Passover, and the prescriptions of the Law have been fulfilled in Jesus Christ. Under the old Law, and still more under the new dispensation, everything pointed towards him.

The Lord, though he was God, became man. He suffered for the sake of those who suffer, he was bound for those in bonds, condemned for the guilty, buried for those who lie in the grave; but he rose from the dead, and cried aloud: Who will contend with me? Let him confront me. I have freed the condemned, brought the dead back to life, raised men from their graves. Who has anything to say against me? I, he said, am the Christ; I have destroyed death, triumphed over the enemy, trampled hell underfoot, bound the strong one, and taken men up to the heights of heaven: I am the Christ.

Come, then, all you nations of men, receive forgiveness for the sins that defile you. I am your forgiveness. I am the Passover that brings salvation. I am the lamb who was immolated for you. I am your ransom, your life, your resurrection, your light, I am your salvation and your king. I will bring you to the heights of heaven. With my own right hand I will raise you up, and I will show you the eternal Father.
