From our Pastoral Associate:

As we celebrate the Ascension today and look forward to Pentecost next week, let's take a moment to consider the Apostles and where they may have been spiritually as the watched Jesus ascend to heaven. In this brief moment, we see the Church before Pentecost.

The Apostles and other disciples had seen the wonders and miracles that Christ performed. They had listened and tried to understand his teachings. They then watched him be brutally murdered, leaving them with little hope. Then Jesus rises and they encounter Jesus in a curious new mode of being. Finally, they see him ascend to heaven to sit a the right hand of their Father without inaugurating the Messianic Kingdom that they had imagine.. To be bewildered and confused must be an understatement!



But at the back of this is Jesus' promise that he will send them the Holy Spirit, the one who would lead them into all truth. He told the Apostles to wait in Jerusalem for the Promise of the Father– the Holy Spirit. This, the Apostles dutifully did as they waited 9 days, earnestly praying that Jesus' promise would come. When the Holy Spirit does come, their spirits are inflamed and they go out, seeking others to share the good news. Understanding finally comes.

In many of the same ways, we also should pray for the Holy Spirit to be ever more active in our daily lives. We have received him in Confirmation, but how often do we turn to him for comfort and guidance? When we are confused or confounded by something in our own lives, maybe a tragedy or something difficult, do we ask the Holy Spirit to guide us? Do we seek his help?

Let's take the time to sit with the Apostles in the moment, praying earnestly that Christ will send us his Spirit that he will renew the face of the Earth. One way we can do this praying a Novena to the Holy Spirit, praying for 9 days for an intention-modeled after what the Apostles did in Jerusalem at Pentecost. We should also take time to study the scriptures and to reflect upon the words and promises of God to us, particularly as he revealed himself through Our Lord Jesus Christ. Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- St. Bede the Venerable

Venerable Bede lived from 672-735 in England. He was entrusted to the care of the Abbot of St. Paul in Jarrow from an early age and was formed to be a tremendous scholar, having expertise in natural philosophy, the principles of Aristotle, astronomy, arithmetic, grammar, history, and especially Holy Scripture. From the time that he became a priest at the age of 30 until his death, he was ever occupied with learning, writing, and teaching. He composed 45 books, 30 of which were commentaries on various books of the Bible. Perhaps his most famous work, The Ecclesiastical History of the English People, was of decisive importance in the art and science of history and historical research. Bede saw the moment he was living in as decisive for the transition of Western Christianity from the Romans to the non-Roman barbarian North. Bede was also the first to begin using the phrase Anno Domini (The Year of Our Lord) or AD in regards to historical events, dating them from the time of Christ. This work alone has given him the title of "Father of English History." Venerable Bede was very careful to observe his monastic vocation, only leaving the monastery once in his lifetime to teach at the school of the Archbishop of York. This was in spite of the pleas of many kings and popes to be their guest. He was named a Doctor of the church in 1899 by Pope Leo XIII, the only Englishman to achieve the title.

For Your Reflection:

Jesus took his place. After having undergone the humiliation of his passion and death, Jesus took his place at the right-hand of God; he took his place with his eternal Father. But he also entered heaven as our Head. Whereupon, in the expression of Leo the Great, the glory of the Head became the hope of the body. For all eternity Christ takes his place as the firstborn among many brethren: our nature is with God in Christ. And as man, the Lord Jesus lives for ever to intercede for us with the Father. At the same time, from his throne of glory, Jesus sends out to the whole Church a message of hope and a call to holiness.

Because of Christ's merits, because of his intercession with the Father, we are able to attain justice and holiness of life, in him. The Church may indeed experience difficulties, the Gospel may suffer setbacks, but because Jesus is at the right-hand of the Father the Church will never know defeat. Christ's victory is ours. The power of the glorified Christ, the beloved Son of the eternal Father, is superabundant, to sustain each of us and all of us in the fidelity of our dedication to God's Kingdom. The efficacy of Christ's Ascension touches all us in the concrete reality of our daily lives. Because of this mystery it is the vocation of the whole Church to wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Dear children, be imbued with the hope that is so much a part of the mystery of the Ascension of Jesus. Be deeply conscious of Christ's victory and triumph over sin and death. Realize that the strength of Christ is greater than our weakness, greater than the weakness of the whole world. Try to understand and share the joy that Mary experienced in knowing that her Son had taken his place with his Father, whom he loved infinitely. And renew your faith today in the promise of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has gone to prepare a place for us, so that he can come back again and take us to himself.

This is the mystery of the Ascension of our Head. Let us always remember: Jesus gave instructions, and then Jesus took his place. Amen.
