From our Pastor:

Come Holy Spirit! We as Catholics sometimes forget we already possess the greatest gift we can ask for: the gift of the Holy Spirit. Today we celebrating Pentecost Sunday which is the celebration of the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles Virgin Blessed and Mary. And remember today that we have received this same gift of the Holy through Spirit baptism and confirmation. But then



how do we unleash the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives? I would like to suggest one thing today.

If we want to live our lives in the Spirit; then we have to attune our lives to act promptly to the inspirations of the Holy Spirit. After all the word "inspiration" comes from the Latin word *inspirare* which means, to blow into, breathe upon, to bring in new life. And therefore when we attuned our lives to the Holy Spirit he breathes upon our thoughts, our feelings and desires in our interior life.

But how comes we often don't notice his action in our lives?

You bet its because we are too busy! We are too busy caught in the externals of life, while we are choking on the inside. St. Augustine aware if this deficiency, he said "Lord you were within me, but I was outside, and it was there that I searched for you." St. Augustine was caught up in the externals of the world and had no time to slow down to be breathed upon by the Spirit.

If we are going to get in touch with these inspirations we have to pay attention what's happening in the inside – what's happening in your soul. In other words, if we want to experience the flesh air from the Holy Spirit we have to find silence and enter into prayer. You probably know who hates silence and loves noise? The devil! He loves shouting, clamoring, arguing, blaming, complaining. And our culture too dislikes silence. St Faustina in her diary reminds us that, "The shortest road to holiness is faithfulness to the inspirations of the Holy Spirit." To love silence is to love the Holy Spirit. Happy Pentecost.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Justin Martyr

St. Justin Martyr was an early Christian apologist and philosopher. Justin was born into a Greek pagan family in what was Samaria at the start of the 2nd century. He found himself unsatisfied with his initial studies because they could not provide an adequate philosophical framework. He tried various philosophies but ultimately settled on Platonism. Soon after, he encountered an old Syrian Christian on the shores of the sea and was convinced by him that the Prophets of Israel were more trustworthy than the Philosophers. Justin renounced his former religious faith and philosophical convictions and sought to bring others to what he called "true philosophy" of Christianity, arguing that the "seeds of Christianity" could be found in all the earlier philosophers, which found their perfection in Christ. He eventually moved to Rome, where he started his own school. He wrote many works including his Two Apologies (defenses) of the Christian faith, addressing them to the Roman emperor and the Roman Senate. In the reign of Marcus Aurelius, Justin disputed with the Cynic philosopher Crescens who denounced him to the authorities as a Christian. He was arrested and with 6 other of his friends that were Christians (two of whom he had educated) was brought to offer sacrifice to the Roman gods. Justin and his companions refused and they were tortured and beheaded around 165.

For Your Reflection:

The Lord had promised through the prophets that in these last days he would pour out his Spirit on his servants and handmaids, and that they would prophesy. So when the Son of God became the Son of Man, the Spirit also descended upon him, becoming accustomed in this way to dwelling with the human race, to living in men and to inhabiting God's creation. The Spirit accomplished the Father's will in men who had grown old in sin, and gave them new life in Christ. Luke says that the Spirit came down on the disciples at Pentecost, after the Lord's ascension, with power to open the gates of life to all nations and to make known to them the new covenant. So it was that men of every language joined in singing one song of praise to God, and scattered tribes, restored to unity by the Spirit, were offered to the Father as the first-fruits of all the nations.

This was why the Lord had promised to send the Advocate: he was to prepare us as an offering to God. Like dry flour, which cannot become one lump of dough, one loaf of bread, without moisture, we who are many could not become one in Christ Jesus without the water that comes down from heaven. And like parched ground, which yields no harvest unless it receives moisture, we who were once like a waterless tree could never have lived and borne fruit without this abundant rainfall from above. Through the baptism that liberates us from change and decay we have become one in body; through the Spirit we have become one in soul. The Spirit of wisdom and understanding, the Spirit of counsel and strength, the Spirit of knowledge and the fear of God came down upon the Lord, and the Lord in turn gave this Spirit to his Church, sending the Advocate from heaven into all the world into which, according to his own words, the devil too had been cast down like lightning.

If we are not to be scorched and made unfruitful, we need the dew of God. Since we have our accuser, we need an advocate as well. And so the Lord in his pity for man, who had fallen into the hands of brigands, having himself bound up his wounds and left for his care two coins bearing the royal image, entrusted him to the Holy Spirit. Now, through the Spirit, the image and inscription of the Father and the Son have been given to us, and it is our duty to use the coin committed to our charge and make it yield a rich profit for the Lord.
