



CELEBRATING 100 YEARS IN OUR PARISH CHURCH 1923-2023

From our Pastoral Associate:

In our Gospel today, Jesus looks out at the abundant crowds that have come to see him. hear him, and be healed by him. He is moved with pity because "they were troubled and abandoned like sheep without a shepherd. Moved with compassion, Jesus tells the disciples to "Ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for the harvest." Jesus then turns to the Apostles and gives



them his authority to heal and cast out demons, telling them to preach the coming Kingdom of God. The command pray for laborers for the harvest and to preach the coming kingdom of God is one that comes to us even today. We should pray for an increase in all vocations in the Church- priesthood, religious life, and -yes- married life. The Church is in desperate need of those who will shine like a city on a hillradiating the light of Christ to a dark and wounded world. What's more, Jesus is asking you (yes, you) to be one of those people. All of us are called to bring the Gospel (in the vocation we have been given) to those we meet and encounter. This can be done by radiating the hope that Christ gives us in our daily lives by kind acts and in words. All too often we put too high an emphasis on actions only at the exclusion of sharing the Gospel by word. We cannot allow ourselves to do so. But we also cannot simply preach without living it. To do so will demonstrate a hollowness to our words that is almost impossible to mend. We need to do be able to do both- to preach the great love of Christ and his abundant mercy toward us- and walk in the way he has set. The foundation of this witness must be prayer. We should spend a dedicated amount of time daily to being in the presence of Christ and learning from the teachings of the Scriptures and of the Church. Without prayer and study, our witness becomes ill informed, dry, and lifeless.

At the same time, we should similarly seek out and build our parish community. Our community and parish groups help to build up this life and help us to not grow weary. It also makes our community attractive to those coming in from outside. If I can give one challenge here, I would offer this– Don't run out the door too quickly, but take some time after Mass to speak with someone you haven't spoken to before. Over time, get to know your fellow parishioners and learn their stories, struggles, and bright spots. We should help to carry each other's burdens and to seek to bring people into our community. With God's grace, we will continue to receive new laborers for the harvest.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Romuald

St. Romuald was born to a wealthy family in Ravenna around 951. He grew up living a hedonistic life but at the age of 20 he changed his ways after served as a second to his father as he killed a relative in a duel over property. Romuald was devastated and fled to a nearby Basilica to do 40 days of penance. He hesitantly decided to become a monk there. Unsatisfied with the strictness of the community's observance of monastic life, he was allowed to retire to Venice, where he placed himself under the direction of a hermit. Romuald took 10 years of this time to refine his ideas about monastic life. Over time, he became known for reforming monasteries throughout the region and he became known to the Holy Roman Emperor, Otto II, who asked him to reform the monastery of Sant'Apollinare. After one year with fierce resistance from the monks, he resigned. St. Romuald eventually he founded the Camaldolese order, which lives a monastic life that more closely resembles that of hermits. Their spirituality focuses on stillness, particularly by reflecting upon the Psalms. Romuald founded many of these new monasteries before he died in 1027. The order he founded still exists today, with dozens of monasteries throughout the world, two of which are in the United States.

For Your Reflection:

Take thought now, redeemed man, and consider how great and worthy is he who hangs on the cross for you. His death brings the dead to life, but at his passing heaven and earth are plunged into mourning and hard rocks are split asunder. It was a divine decree that permitted one of the soldiers to open his sacred side with a lance. This was done so that the Church might be formed from the side of Christ as he slept the sleep of death on the cross, and so that the Scripture might be fulfilled: They shall look on him whom they pierced. The blood and water which poured out at that moment were the price of our salvation. Flowing from the secret abyss of our Lord's heart as from a fountain, this stream gave the sacraments of the Church the power to confer the life of grace, while for those already living in Christ it became a spring of living water welling up to life everlasting.

Arise, then, beloved of Christ! Imitate the dove that nests in a hole in the cliff, keeping watch at the entrance like the sparrow that finds a home. There like the turtledove hide your little ones, the fruit of your chaste love. Press your lips to the fountain, draw water from the wells of your Savior; for this is the spring flowing out of the middle of paradise, dividing into four rivers, inundating devout hearts, watering the whole earth and making it fertile. Run with eager desire to this source of life and light, all you who are vowed to God's service. Come, whoever you may be, and cry out to him with all the strength of your heart. "O indescribable beauty of the most high God and purest radiance of eternal light! Life that gives all life, light that is the source of every other light, preserving in everlasting splendor the myriad flames that have shone before the throne of your divinity from the dawn of time! Eternal and inaccessible fountain, clear and sweet stream flowing from a hidden spring, unseen by mortal eye! None can fathom your depths nor survey your boundaries, none can measure your breadth, nothing can sully your purity. From you flows the river which gladdens the city of God and makes us cry out with joy and thanksgiving in hymns of praise to you, for we know by our own experience that with you is the source of life, and in your light we see light.
