From our Pastoral Associate:

Today marks the celebration of Corpus Christi, a day that we reflect on the great gift of Jesus in the Eucharist. On this day it is typical to celebrate not only with Mass but also with other expressions of Eucharistic devotion such as adoration and processions that help us to experience Jesus, who is truly present in the most Blessed Sacrament consecrated by the priest at Mass.

I want to share with you a special miracle, perhaps the most famous of the miracles of the Eucharist, as the story is deeply fascinating. In the 8th century, a priest was celebrating Mass in Lanciano, Italy and during the consecration was entertaining grave doubts regarding the teaching of the Church on the change that the bread and wine undergo during the words of consecration ("This is my body, this is my blood"). As he came to this moment in the Mass, his doubts plagued him even more deeply. But as he said the words, to his astonishment the bread and wine were transformed into physical flesh



and blood. His doubt vanishing, he took a moment to thank God for the miracle and his merciful love, turned and joyfully showed the congregation what had taken place. News of the miracle spread throughout the countryside and multitudes of people came to adore. During this time the blood coagulated into 5 globules, which onlookers connected with the five wounds of Christ—those in his hands, feet, and sides. To this day, the miracle continues to exist. The flesh and blood (which you can see in the picture above) have been perfectly preserved without any use of preservatives or other means. In the 1970's the Vatican gave the local bishop permission to have scientific tests performed to



Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Irenaeus of Lyon

St. Irenaeus lived from around 130 to 202. Born in Smyrna, Greece, he played a large role in guiding and expanding Christian communities in the southern region of what is now France. He had seen and heard the preaching of St. Polycarp, who in turn was the disciple of the Apostle John. Unlike many of his day, Irenaeus was raised in a Christian home. Ordained a priest, Irenaeus was sent to Pope Eleutherius to inform him of the heresy of Montanism which was spreading. He soon became the Second bishop of Gaul, succeeding St. Ponthinus, who had been martyred during a persecution. The Church is fortunate that Irenaeus was involved in many of its controversies in the second century. He was a student, well trained, with great patience in investigating, tremendously protective of apostolic teaching, but prompted more by a desire to win over his opponents than to prove them in error. As bishop of Lyons he was especially concerned with the Gnostics, who took their name from the Greek word for "knowledge." Claiming access to secret knowledge imparted by Jesus to only a few disciples, their teaching was attracting and confusing many Christians. After thoroughly investigating the various Gnostic sects and their "secret," Irenaeus showed to what logical conclusions their tenets led. These he contrasted with the teaching of the apostles and the text of Holy Scripture, giving us, in five books, a system of theology of great importance to subsequent times. Moreover, his work, widely used and translated into Latin and Armenian, gradually ended the influence of the Gnostics. It was Irenaeus that provided us with the three pillars of Divine Revelation-Scripture, Tradition, and the teaching of the Apostle's successors (what we now call the Magisterium). The circumstances and details about his death, like those of his birth and early life in Asia Minor, are not at all clear. However in 2022, Pope Francis named Saint Irenaeus a Doctor of the Church.

show its veracity. What they found is that no trace of any preservative is used. The flesh is real human flesh and comes from the heart and is a cross section of the myocardium, the endocardium, the vagus nerve and also the left ventricle of the heart for the large thickness of the myocardium. It is still fresh and shows no signs of decay despite being 1200 years old. The blood is type AB (universal donor) and belongs to the same person as that of the host. The blood has proteins in the same normal proportions that are only present in fresh blood. God gives these kinds of miracles to help to support our faith and to help us to see the truth in them. In this case, God wished us to know that in the Eucharist, we truly receive Jesus Christ-his Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity in his entirety. In this exchange of love, God strengthens our souls and gives us the strength to be faithful to him. I encourage you today and throughout this week to take some time to reflect in front of the tabernacle about the great gift that God has given to us in the Eucharist, and how you can live your own life in a way more focused on Jesus in the Eucharist— whether that be by attending daily Mass, spending time in front of the tabernacle, or even coming to Adoration, which we have on Thursdays from 11am-Noon. It is even a good idea to ask yourself how you can show even greater reverence for him at Mass- are you preparing yourself in silence before Mass? Are you dressing for the occasion? Do you properly fast before Mass? Have you gone to confession on a regular basis so as to be free of mortal sin? All of these are great ways of growing closer to Jesus in the Eucharist.


The Ending of the Divine Praises
