From our Pastor:

Dear friends and parishioners of Our Lady of Sorrows, Today in the gospel Jesus talks about something we deal with daily and sometimes robs peace in our lives. He is talking about fear. He says, "Fear not". Webster dictionary defines fear as "a felling of anxiety and agitation caused by the presence or nearness of danger, evil, pain, etc." Fear is completely natural and helps people to recognize and respond to dangerous situations and threats. However, healthy fear -- or fear which has a protective function -- can evolve into unhealthy or pathological fear, which can lead to exaggerated and violent behavior.

So, what are you afraid of these days? Probably that is what is robbing you joy and destroying your life at the moment. Take time in answering this question, because not all fear is healthy. There is a violent, obvious fear, a fear

that sets our hearts pounding and causes us to sweat. We feel this fear after we have escaped some danger. But there is also a subtle, insinuating fear that can pervade our lives and kill our faith. This fear comes at us not like a roaring lion, but as a coiled snake sitting in the corner of the room. This quiet fear travels with us day by day. It can rob us of freedom and peace. It can choke our life.

But our Lord is assuring us of his care and love for each one of us and we should not give up hope irrespective of the intensity our fears. Three times in our gospel passage, Jesus says, "Do not be afraid." He can say this because he knows that not a sparrow falls to the ground without God knowing about it and caring about it, and that we are worth more than many sparrows. Jesus tells us that to deal with fear we must recognize his love and providence for us. We must recognize the love of God that surrounds us, the love of God that has intimate knowledge of our life, the love of God that knows the number of hairs on our head. If we can claim that love and recognize God's presence in our life, we can overcome the fears that paralyze us.

This past week, June 21st marked the beginning of summer. Summer is a great opportunity for families and friends to get together. It also an opportune time to travels and learn about our beautiful planet. This coming week I will be travelling to Kenya to visit with my folks. It has been over 2 years since I was last in Kenya. I excited to meet my new niece who was born a year ago and haven't had an opportunity to meet her. I am also looking forward to spending more quality time with my mom who lost her husband two and half years ago. I hope you too will have an opportunity to catch up with friends and family in these coming months. I have lined up a couple of priests who will be celebrating mass during my absence.



Ministries & Reflections



Saints of the Week- St. Peter and St. Paul Known as the Princes of the Apostles and the Pillars of the Church, St. Peter and St. Paul were the two most prominent of the Apostles in their missionary work. St. Peter met Jesus when his brother Andrew introduced them (Jn 1:42-42):. Jesus soon chose Peter to be the leader of the Apostles, giving him a particularly noteworthy authority symbolized by keys that had the power to bind and loose in heaven (Mt 16:13-19). After the Resurrection, St. Peter was the first to preach on Pentecost, beginning the first moments of the Church. He played a pivotal role in the fledgling Church and was fearless despite heavy persecution. The Gospel of Mark and the First and Second Letters of Peter are attributed to him. St. Paul was converted on the road to Damascus while traveling to arrest Christians. Jesus spoke to him and temporarily blinded him, which led to St. Paul converting to the Christian faith (Acts 9). His apostolic work was breathtaking as he traveled throughout Greece and Italy establishing churches and persisting despite growing opposition from both pagans and Jews. The majority of the New Testament-14 out of 27 books- are attributed to Paul's preaching or authorship. Both Peter and Paul met their end in Rome, St. Peter by being crucified upside down, St. Paul by being beheaded. Their authority survives in the Bishop of Rome (the Pope), who is their successor.

For Your Reflection:

The glory of God gives life; those who see God receive life. For this reason God, who cannot be grasped, comprehended or seen, allows himself to be seen, comprehended and grasped by men, that he may give life to those who see and receive him. It is impossible to live without life, and the actualization of life comes from participation in God, while participation in God is to see God and enjoy his goodness. Men will therefore see God if they are to live; through the vision of God they will become immortal and attain to God himself. As I have said, this was shown in symbols by the prophets: God will be seen by men who bear his Spirit and are always waiting for his coming. As Moses said in the Book of Deuteronomy: On that day we shall see, for God will speak to man, and man will live.

God is the source of all activity throughout creation. He cannot be seen or described in his own nature and in all his greatness by any of his creatures. Yet he is certainly not unknown. Through his Word the whole creation learns that there is one God the Father, who holds all things together and gives them their being. As it is written in the Gospel: No man has ever seen God, except the only-begotten Son, who is in the bosom of the Father; he has revealed him. From the beginning the Son is the one who teaches us about the Father; he is with the Father from the beginning. He was to reveal to the human race visions of prophecy, the diversity of spiritual gifts, his own ways of ministry, the glorification of the Father, all in due order and harmony, at the appointed time and for our instruction. Where there is order, there is also harmony; where there is harmony, there is also correct timing; where there is correct timing, there is also advantage. The Word became the steward of the Father's grace for the advantage of men, for whose benefit he made such wonderful arrangements. He revealed God to men and presented men to God. He safeguarded the invisibility of the Father to prevent man from treating God with contempt and to set before him a constant goal toward which to make progress. On the other hand, he revealed God to men and made him visible in many ways to prevent man from being totally separated from God and so cease to be. Life in man is the glory of God; the life of man is the vision of God. If the revelation of God through creation gives life to all who live upon the earth, much more does the manifestation of the Father through the Word give life to those who see God. -From Against Heresies by St. Irenaeus of Lyons
