From our Pastoral Associate:

In our Gospel today, Jesus is home in Nazareth, but surrounded by crowds so immense that it was impossible even for him to eat which causes consternation among his family and questions regarding his sanity. Jesus heals many of them, including casting out demons, leaving the scribes attempting an explanation that does not require faith in Jesus. They state that Jesus is himself possessed and that it's "by the prince of demons that he casts out demons."



Jesus, aware that they are saying this, calls them to him and asks why Satan should divide his kingdom against itself, given that it would fall. He warns them that any blasphemies and sins that people utter can be forgiven, but not a blasphemy against the Holy Spirit. What Jesus means here is that what the scribes said about casting out demons by demons is attributing the work of the Holy Spirit, who is God, to the work of Satan. This is the worst and ultimate blasphemy and is unforgiveable, not because God is unwilling to forgive it, but because it is the destruction of faith in the person holding it. If your faith is so dead as to see God's work in the world as being an evil or done itself by an evil person, then you have closed yourself off to God's grace and ability to work in your life- even to forgive you. It is a refusal of mercy itself. It's like slamming a door and refusing to unlock it to allow anyone in to help you. As Christians, we are called to recognize God's work in the world and to see to understand him in it. We are also called to seek out his mercy, his healing, and his forgiveness in our lives. We should ask ourselves these questions: Do I seek God's mercy for sins I commit? Do I regularly attend confession and seek to remedy the situations that cause me to regularly fall into sin? Do I seek to amend my life so as to live in God's grace and love more fully? What prevents me from doing so?

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- St. Anthony of Padua

St. Anthony was a Portuguese priest and Franciscan friar. He was born to wealthy parents in Lisbon in 1195 and at the age of 15 entered the Augustinian order. At the age of 19 he was given the duty of porter (one who watches the doors) and this gave him occasion to meet several Franciscan friars who came to stay. At this time the order was only 11 years old and the remains of 5 Franciscans martyred in Morocco came to be buried nearby. Their story and charism made a deep impression on Anthony and he became a friar. On one occasion, Anthony was asked to preach and he so impressed those present that people began to flock to hear his preaching. He was hailed as a "jewel case for the Bible" in the Papal CourtAnthony met with St. Francis of Assisi and convinced him to give greater thought to the intellectual formation of the order. He died in 1231 at the age of 35. He was the fastest saint to ever be canonized, being raised to the altar less than a year after his death. He has since been named a Doctor of the Church by Pope Pius XII in 1946, giving him the title Doctor Evangelicus or Doctor of the Gospel because he revealed its rich beauty.

For Your Reflection:

The Church celebrates June as the month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

Take thought now, redeemed man, and consider how great and worthy is he who hangs on the cross for you. His death brings the dead to life, but at his passing heaven and earth are plunged into mourning and hard rocks are split asunder. It was a divine decree that permitted one of the soldiers to open his sacred side with a lance. This was done so that the Church might be formed from the side of Christ as he slept the sleep of death on the cross, and so that the Scripture might be fulfilled: They shall look on him whom they pierced. The blood and water which poured out at that moment were the price of our salvation. Flowing from the secret abyss of our Lord's heart as from a fountain, this stream gave the sacraments of the Church the power to confer the life of grace, while for those already living in Christ it became a spring of living water welling up to life everlasting.

Arise, then, beloved of Christ! Imitate the dove that nests in a hole in the cliff, keeping watch at the entrance like the sparrow that finds a home. There like the turtledove hide your little ones, the fruit of your chaste love. Press your lips to the fountain, draw water from the wells of your Savior; for this is the spring flowing out of the middle of paradise, dividing into four rivers, inundating devout hearts, watering the whole earth and making it fertile. Run with eager desire to this source of life and light, all you who are vowed to God's service. Come, whoever you may be, and cry out to him with all the strength of your heart. "O indescribable beauty of the most high God and purest radiance of eternal light! Life that gives all life, light that is the source of every other light, preserving in everlasting splendor the myriad flames that have shone before the throne of your divinity from the dawn of time! Eternal and inaccessible fountain, clear and sweet stream flowing from a hidden spring, unseen by mortal eye! None can fathom your depths nor survey your boundaries, none can measure your breadth, nothing can sully your purity. From you flows the river which gladdens the city of God and makes us cry out with joy and thanksgiving in hymns of praise to you, for we know by our own experience that with you is the source of life, and in your light we see light.
