From our Pastor:

Dear Friends and Parishioners, In today's Gospel, Jesus sends out the twelve disciples on a challenging mission, instructing them to take no bag. While this might make sense in modern air travel to avoid extra costs, Jesus is concerned with a different kind of luggage: spiritual burdens that can weigh us down. These spiritual burdens come in various forms, and Jesus specifically wants us to leave behind the baggage of our hurts, fears, and false dreams.

- Every person experiences hurt in life through disrespect, dishonesty, betrayal, or abandonment. Even when we move past these situations, the scars remain, burdening us with feelings of brokenness and worthlessness. Jesus asks us to let go of this baggage of hurts.
- Fear, though beneficial for identifying and preparing for danger, loses its value once preparation is complete. Persistent fear turns

into worry that paralyzes us, making us believe the worst will happen. Jesus wants us to discard this heavy burden of fear.

• While dreams can inspire and motivate, some dreams are unrealistic and can hurt us. These impossible dreams weigh us down, robbing us of joy and rest as we chase what cannot be achieved. Jesus asks us to abandon the trunk of false dreams.

Jesus also commissions the twelve to be his representatives, sending them out with only a walking stick and sandals. This minimalism emphasizes that their mission is not about offering material possessions but sharing the word Jesus placed in their hearts. Jesus wants his disciples to offer themselves and the message of love, forgiveness, and truth. Today, Jesus sends us into the world to share the word within our hearts. Each of us has a message entrusted by Jesus that needs to be spoken. This could be a message of encouragement, forgiveness, or objection to injustice. Jesus calls us to identify and share this word in our families, schools, workplaces, and political arenas.

Speaking this word can be challenging, but it is our calling. Martin Luther King Jr., in his last sermon, stated, "Cowardice asks, 'ls it safe?' Expediency asks, 'ls it politically correct?' Vanity asks, 'ls it popular?' But conscience asks, 'ls it right?'" There will be times when our choices are not safe, politically correct, or popular. We must choose what conscience says is right.

Jesus has placed a word in each of us. While none of us have all the truth, and we may sometimes miss the mark, today's gospel urges us to find the word Jesus has given us and speak it, making the voice of Jesus heard in our world today.

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Bonaventure

Born in Bagnoregio in 1221, Saint Bonaventure was baptized John, but received the name Bonaventure when he became a Franciscan at the age of 22. Little is known about his childhood, but we do know that his parents were Giovanni di Fidanza and Maria Ritell. It seems that his father was a physician and a man of means. While Saint Francis died about five years after the saint's birth, he is credited with healing Bonaventure as a boy of a serious illness. Saint Bonaventure's teaching career came to a halt when the Frigrs elected him to serve as their General Minister. His 17 years of service were not easy as the Order was embroiled in conflicts over the interpretation of poverty. Some friars even ended up in heresy saying that Saint Francis and his community were inaugurating the era of the Holy Spirit which was to replace Jesus, the Church, and Scripture. But because he was a man of prayer and a good administrator, Saint Bonaventure managed to structure the Order through effective legislation. But more importantly, he offered the Friars an organized spirituality based on the vision and insights of Saint Francis. Always a Franciscan at heart and a mystical writer, Bonaventure managed to unite the pastoral, practical aspects of life with the doctrines of the Church. Thus, there is a noticeable warmth to his teachings and writings that make him very appealing. Shortly before he ended his service as General Minister, Pope Gregory X created him a Cardinal and appointed him bishop of Albano. But a little over a year later, while participating in the Second Council of Lyon, Saint Bonaventure died suddenly on July 15, 1274. Saint Bonaventure left behind a structured and renewed Franciscan Order and a body of work all of which glorifies his major love—Jesus.

For Your Reflection:

Christ is both the way and the door. Christ is the staircase and the vehicle, like the throne of mercy over the Ark of the Covenant, and the mystery hidden from the ages. A man should turn his full attention to this throne of mercy, and should gaze at him hanging on the cross, full of faith, hope and charity, devoted, full of wonder and joy, marked by gratitude, and open to praise and jubilation. Then such a man will make with Christ a pasch, that is, a passing-over. Through the branches of the cross he will pass over the Red Sea, leaving Egypt and entering the desert. There he will taste the hidden manna, and rest with Christ in the sepulcher, as if he were dead to things outside. He will experience, as much as is possible for one who is still living, what was promised to the thief who hung beside Christ: Today you will be with me in paradise. For this passover to be perfect, we must suspend all the operations of the mind and we must transform the peak of our affections, directing them to God alone. This is a sacred mystical experience. It cannot be comprehended by anyone unless he surrenders himself to it; nor can he surrender himself to it unless he longs for it; nor can he long for it unless the Holy Spirit, whom Christ sent into the world, should come and inflame his innermost soul. If you ask how such things can occur, seek the answer in God's grace, not in doctrine; in the longing of the will, not in the understanding; in the sighs of prayer, not in research; seek the bridegroom not the teacher; God and not man; darkness not daylight; and look not to the light but rather to the raging fire that carries the soul to God with intense fervor and glowing love. The fire is God, and the furnace is in Jerusalem, fired by Christ in the ardor of his loving passion. Only he understood this who said: My soul chose hanging and my bones death. Anyone who cherishes this kind of death can see God, for it is certainly true that: No man can look upon me and live. Let us die, then, and enter into the darkness, silencing our anxieties, our passions and all the fantasies of our imagination. Let us pass over with the crucified Christ from this world to the Father, so that, when the Father has shown himself to us, we can say with Philip: It is enough. We may hear with Paul: My grace is sufficient for you; and we can rejoice with David, saying: My flesh and my heart fail me, but God is the strength of my heart and my heritage for ever. -From the Journey of the Mind to God by St. Bonaventure
