

In Today's Gospel, Jesus delivers his Parable of the Sower, who sows across all sorts of different kind of ground. Depending on where the seed falls, it either thrives or dies. The parable is an illustration of how the Gospel (represented by the seed) is received into our hearts (represented by the soil). It's an important parable to reflect upon.


How do we receive the words of God? What kind of soil are we preparing for his work in our lives? Are our hearts open and ready to receive it?

Do we let Jesus' teaching fall on the path, that is on hearts that are hardened by ignorance of God's teachings, who refuse to take any time to study the scriptures or the Church's teachings? If so, we will be easy prey for the devil's temptations.

Do we let Jesus' teaching fall on rocky ground, in other words on hearts that get excited for the short term but don't have the perseverance to keep it growing in our hearts, particularly when it becomes unpopular and difficult to be a Christian in our culture and time, resulting in the hatred of those around us? Will we have the strength and fortitude to cling to the Gospel if it gets truly hard, if our friends have deserted us or we face the danger of death? Will we have the perseverance to push on, or will we let the seed of our faith die out of fear?

Do we let Jesus' teaching fall among thorns, that is in hearts full of attachments to worldly things? Do we value too highly our houses, cars, jewelry, flashy possessions, and other items and worldly concerns? Will we let them become more important than the message of the Gospel or distract us from following and loving Our Lord? Or do we let Jesus' teaching fall among good soil—hearts that are open to hearing his word, free of attachments to sin and worldly things, free of fear and anxiety, and willing to face everything for the love of Jesus Christ? Will our hearts bear fruit in radiating the love that Christ has shown us to others and of bringing other souls to him?

It's clear which soil Jesus prefers. We should do our utmost to provide that soil at all times and places to give his teachings the proper environment to work and grow in us. To do so will result in holiness and a deeper relationship with Jesus and our neighbor that we meet.



Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Camillus de Lellis

St. Camillus was born in 1550 at Bucchianico in what was the Kingdom of Naples. His mother died early and his father neglected him, leading to him grow up with an excessive love of gambling. At 17 he developed a disease in his leg, which he bore for the rest of his life. In Rome he entered a hospital for incurables but was quickly ejected for being quarrelsome and violent. At the age of 24, Camillus gambled away everything he had, savings, weapons, even his own shirt. He accepted work at the Capuchin friary of Manfredonia and was so moved by a sermon that he heard there that he sought to amend his life. He sought to enter the Capuchins but was quickly denied because of the sore on his leg. At the hospital where he was first expelled, his love for the sick and poor led to him being made superintendent. He devoted the rest of his life to serving and caring for the sick. At the advice of his friend St. Phillip Neri, he was ordained a priest at the age of 34. He left the hospital and founded his own religious order called the Camillians, that focused on the care of the sick, particularly prisoners and those with the plague. Some of his men traveled with warring troops, forming the first recorded military field ambulance. He died in 1614 and was canonized in 1742. He is known as the patron saint of the sick, nurses, hospitals, and healthcare workers.

Reflecting on Our History:

By 1890, Sts. Peter and Paul Church at 9th and McGee Streets had become inadequate to serve the spiritual needs of the Germanspeaking Catholics of Kansas City, MO. The Franciscan Fathers who had recently founded St. Anthony's in Kansas City, KS, were invited and the first services of Our Lady of Sorrows Parish were held that fall in what was known as "Doherty's Hall" at 829 Southwest Blvd. Fathers John Wellinghoff, Aloysius Kurtz and Stephen Hoffman alternated during the first year, and on January 2, 1892, a school was opened with the help of the Benedictine Sisters of Mount St. Scholastica in Atchison, KS. By March 8 of the same year a new property was purchased for \$11,449.11 (a very large sum at the time) at the southwest corner of 23rd and Baltimore, and

the cornerstone laid. The work was completed and dedication held on November 15 with Bishop Hogan presiding. The new building would function as both a

parish and school. The first resident pastor was Fr.
Daniel Heile, O.F.M. Bells were blessed April 16, 1893. These are the same bells that are in use in our belltower today. By 1899, Our Lady of Sorrows was emerging from its first decade showing considerable promise in our community.
