From our Pastoral Associate:

St. Paul tells us today that we, having been baptized in Christ, should see ourselves as dead to sin and alive to Christ. When we were baptized into Christ, we were baptized into his death. And just as Jesus rose from the dead, we too will rise to eternal life. Our baptism is a tremendous gift, granted to us by the great mercy and love of God. We should always strive to live up to our baptismal promises that were made on our behalf and that we have repeated on numerous occasions through the years during the liturgy, particularly during the season of Easter and during baptisms.

One way to do so is to think of ourselves as dead to sin. What does that mean? In Christ, we are made a new creation (2 Cor 5:17), something that bucks the trend of the old creation. In the old



creation, Adam and Eve introduced sin into the world. Christ has freed us from that original sin. But we still have to deal with the lingering effects of the fall, namely a weakened human nature, a darkened intellect, a weakened will, and an inclination toward sin and our baser appetites. We are called to raise ourselves with (and only with) the grace that Christ gives us. We should seek to open ourselves to his will and die to our own desires daily, trusting that God knows what we need better than we ever will and will not withhold it from us. We should strive to come to know God better in prayer and through study. We should exercise penances, fasting, and mortifications to bring our bodies more strongly under the power of our own will, which is submitted to Christ. We should seek to exercise virtue, which only comes about through careful repetition.

This will not always be easy. We will not always, or regularly succeed. Nevertheless we are called to do so. We should not be disheartened with our failures. They remind us just how much in need of a Savior we really are and teach us to constantly trust and rely upon Jesus, and not upon ourselves. We should avail ourselves of the sacraments regularly, particularly the Eucharist as often as we can, and Confession to free us of our sin, give us a better sense of guidance on how to move forward, and once again, to receive the graces more fully that Christ wishes to give. Through his grace, we can say with St. Paul, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." (Phil 4:13).

Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week- St. Elizabeth of Portugal

St. Elizabeth lived from 1271 to 1336 and was the queen consort of Portugal. Born in the royal house of Aragon, Elizabeth was the sister of 3 other kings. As a girl she quickly learned self discipline and the practice of her faith. This was good preparation because at the age of 12 she was given in marriage to King Denis of Portugal. She established for herself a life of growth in holiness by attending daily Mass and devoting herself to the care of the poor and sick. Her life of sanctity was odious to some but her example of prayer and patience eventually converted her husband from his life of spousal abuse and infidelity. She was known as a conciliator and often helped broker peace agreements between warring kingdoms around her including a conflict between her son and her husband, where she placed herself squarely in the breech between the warring armies. When her husband died she joined the Third Order of the Franciscans under the Poor Clare nuns and devoted the rest of her life to caring for the poor and sick in obscurity. She became known for providing lodging to pilgrims, giving small gifts, providing dowries for young girls, and teaching the children of poor nobles. At the end of her life, she helped establish a peace between her son and his son-in -law. The effort involved caused her to fall into a fever and she died on July 4. She was canonized in 1626.

For Your Reflection:

The life of the Christian has three distinguishing aspects: deeds, words and thought. Thought comes first, then words, since our words express openly the interior conclusions of the mind. Finally, after thoughts and words, comes action, for our deeds carry out what the mind has conceived. So when one of these results in our acting or speaking or thinking, we must make sure that all our thoughts, words and deeds are controlled by the divine ideal, the revelation of Christ. For then our thoughts, words and deeds will not fall short of the nobility of their implications.

What then must we do, we who have been found worthy of the name of Christ? Each of us must examine his thoughts, words and deeds, to see whether they are directed toward Christ or are turned away from him. This examination is carried out in various ways. Our deeds or our thoughts or our words are not in harmony with Christ if they issue from passion. They then bear the mark of the enemy who smears the pearl of the heart with the slime of passion, dimming and even destroying the luster of the precious stone.

On the other hand, if they are free from and untainted by every passionate inclination, they are directed toward Christ, the author and source of peace. He is like a pure, untainted stream. If you draw from him the thoughts in your mind and the inclinations of your heart, you will show a likeness to Christ, your source and origin, as the gleaming water in a jar resembles the flowing water from which it was obtained.

For the purity of Christ and the purity that is manifest in our hearts are identical. Christ's purity, however, is the fountainhead; ours has its source in him and flows out of him. Our life is stamped with the beauty of his thought. The inner and the outer man are harmonized in a kind of music. The mind of Christ is the controlling influence that inspires us to moderation and goodness in our behavior. As I see it, Christian perfection consists in this: sharing the titles which express the meaning of Christ's name, we bring out this meaning in our minds, our prayers and our way of life.
