

From Our Pastoral Associate: **Suffering with Christ**

In our second reading today, St. Paul tells the Colossians that he has suffered for their sake and is filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ. What does this mean? Is St. Paul trying to say that what Jesus accomplished through his

on the Cross was

not enough?



What's important to remember with St. Paul is the centrality of the teaching that the Church is the Body of Christ in his theology. St. Paul's conversion came about when he was persecuting the Church, but when Jesus blinds him and asks him what he is doing, he doesn't say "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting my church?" Rather, he says "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" Jesus is the head of the Church, not like a CEO to an organization, but like that round ball that sits on your shoulders is to the rest of your body. In a mysterious way, we have been incorporated (literally "to form into a body") into Christ's body as a means of obtaining the salvation and resurrection that he achieved. We are made a new creation in Christ and so similarly we share his Father and his mission of bringing those we meet into relationship with the Father. The phrase "Christ has no other hands than yours..." is almost too inadequate to explain the reality of ourselves to Christ. We are Christ's hands, feet, mouth, etc., working in the world to accomplish his mission.

And so, when St. Paul says that he is making up what is lacking in Christ's afflictions, it is not to say that Jesus' suffering was inadequate for our salvation. Rather, it is to say that we ourselves are participating in Jesus' suffering for souls. Christ accomplishes this through us, not because he needs to, but because (continued on page 3)

Saint of the Week-St. Bridget of Sweden

From age 7 on, Bridget had visions of Christ crucified. Her visions formed the basis for her activity—always with the emphasis on charity rather than spiritual favors.

She lived her married life in the court of the Swedish king Magnus II. Mother of eight children—the second eldest was Saint Catherine of Sweden—Bridget lived the strict life of a penitent after her husband's death. Bridget constantly strove to exert her good influence over Magnus; while never fully reforming, he did give her land and buildings to found a monastery for men and women. This group eventually expanded into an Order known as the Bridgetines.

In 1350, a year of jubilee, Bridget braved a plaguestricken Europe to make a pilgrimage to Rome. Although she never returned to Sweden, her years in Rome were far from happy, being hounded by debts and by opposition to her work against Church abuses. A final pilgrimage to the Holy Land, marred by shipwreck and the death of her son, Charles, eventually led to her death in 1373. In 1999, Bridget, Saint Catherine of Siena and Saint Teresa Benedicta of the Cross, were named co-patronesses of Europe.

he willed it to be done in this way.

Perhaps the most irritating and exasperating thing we hear when we're going through inconvenience or real suffering is to "offer it up." But it's actually profoundly helpful. What we're being told to do is to bring meaning into our suffering by uniting it with that of Jesus. In a mysterious way, we help others in the Church and throughout the world by doing this. The consequences of offering our sufferings to God are incalculable—because Jesus' suffering and death were incalculable.

How do we get in the habit of doing this? It's helpful to work to practice it everyday, especially by offering everything from your day at the first moments that you wake up and the last moments before you go to sleep (known as a morning and evening offering).

It is also a good way of getting yourself in training by creating inconveniences for yourself through fasting and offering up your fasting. Fasting trains us to see these moments as great moments of grace by which we can offer what we are experience to God for the benefit of souls. It also helps to focus our minds and hearts on God and what is important while helping us to break away from things that may be sinful or leading us slowly away from God.

I encourage you during this next week to spend time praying the prayer below, as well as offering up your sufferings and difficulties. You may well be helping someone in a way you can't begin to imagine.
