

From Our Pastor:

In our Gospel today, Jesus chooses and sends out 72 disciples to send ahead of him in pairs to all the places they were to visit. They were to tell those they visited that the Kingdom of God was at hand, to heal the sick, and to cast out demons. They were to be reliant upon what God would provide themparticularly through



the hospitality of others. They were to take very little with them.

This story resonates with me because I spent a couple of summers during college doing something very similar for a youth catechesis program called Totus Tuus. We were sent out in groups of 4 and could only bring what would fit in the trunk of a car, which, between all four of us was not much- just a week's worth of clothes and a backpack. Like the 72 we relied on the hospitality of the parishioners of the parishes we visited. We slept where they offered it to us, we were required to eat what was put in front of us (even if it included things we didn't like) and we were paid very little. It was often grueling, with us spending roughly 9 hours or so teaching or doing other activities with the youth, and in our spare time praying together. But even so, it was an immensely fruitful and blessed time, teaching kids and watching them grow closer to Jesus. During this time, we were to encourage discernment of vocations to the priesthood and religious life- echoing Jesus' words that "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest." It was amazing to watch the seeds of a vocation take root. When talking about vocations, one of our leaders asked if any of the kids thought God might be calling them to be a priest, monk, or nun. One boy, about 10 years old, raised his hand and said he wanted to be a priest. Later, she asked him when he started thinking of being a priest and he told her, "This week, at Totus Tuus."



Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Benedict

Benedict was born into a distinguished family in central Italy, studied at Rome, and early in life was drawn to monasticism. At first he became a hermit, leaving a depressing world—pagan armies on the march, the Church torn by schism, the people suffering from war, and morality at a low ebb. He soon realized that he could not live a hidden life in a small town any better than in a large city, so he withdrew to a cave high in the mountains for three years. Some monks chose Benedict as their leader for a while, but found his strictness not to their taste. Still the shift from hermit to community life had begun for him. He had an idea of gathering various families of monks into one "Grand Monastery" to give them the benefit of unity, fraternity, and permanent worship in one house. Finally he began to build what was to become one of the most famous monasteries in the world-Monte Cassino, commanding three narrow valleys running toward the mountains north of Naples. The Rule that gradually developed prescribed a life of liturgical prayer, study, manual labor, and living together in community under a common abbot. Benedictine asceticism is known for its moderation, and Benedictine charity has always shown concern for the people in the surrounding countryside. In the course of the Middle Ages, all monasticism in the West was gradually brought under the Rule of St. Benedict. Today the Benedictine family is represented by two branches: the Benedictine Federation encompassing the men and women of the Order of St. Benedict; and the Cistercians, men and women of the Order of Cistercians of the Strict Observance.

Even though most are prevented by their job or family obligations from doing what Jesus asked the 72 to do, we can still take it to heart, particularly reaching those that do not normally darken the doors of a church. Jesus calls us to carry his message to them—those that seem lost, forgotten, or undesirable, as well as those that may seem to be doing just fine but in reality Jesus knows they are far from him. All people need to hear Jesus's message. So I encourage you to reflect on these questions.

Who in my life or neighborhood needs to hear of Jesus' saving love?

What causes me fear of approaching these people?

Do I pray regularly for vocations for the Church, among both religious or laity?

What is lacking in me that keeps Jesus' message from resonating with those that I share the Gospel?

Have I asked God to assist me with these problems?

Jesus' has willed that his outreach to those around us depends on our willingness to help. Let us take it to heart and not be afraid. He will be with us.
