

From our Pastoral Associate:

In our reading today, Jesus continues his bread of life discourse. In this passage, the Apostle John is clearly making a comparison of the current Jews with those Israelites that traveled with Moses in the desert, particularly when he makes mention of the people "murmuring" or in other translations "grumbling." Grumbling was a constant refrain of the people to Moses. God would command Moses to do something and almost like clockwork the people would grumble. Grumbling was a sign of ingratitude and a lack of faith on the part of the people. It was almost always followed up with a punishment. In the monastic tradition, St. Benedict taught his monks that under no sense should they grumble at an order from the abbot. In turn, he ordered the abbot to not do



anything that would cause justifiable grumbling. He saw it as one of the chief evils to obtaining sanctity.

When we read that the people started to grumble, it is not surprising that Jesus tells them to effectively "knock it off."

Jesus does not want the people to miss what he is saying here. The teaching of the Eucharist is the central point of the gift of salvation that Jesus is offering from the Father. Receiving the Eucharist is firmly tied with this gift of eternal life "whoever eats this bread will live forever, and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." By grumbling about where Jesus comes from and whether it is from heaven or not, they clearly overlook the fact that he fed over 5,000 people with five loaves and two fish. They also will miss what he says next. They're allowing themselves to be deliberately led astray from the point he is making.

How often we do this as well. We focus in on a certain more trivial point of what is happening and blow it out of proportion, unwilling to see what God is doing or willing to listen and move in the direction he is leading us. We may even grumble about how hard it is to understand or do what he is asking of us— all the while wasting valuable time, delaying and endangering what should be inevitable. Unfortunately in this sermon, the people refuse to accept Jesus' teaching. And it begins here— with their grumbling. They close the door to the wonderful salvation Jesus is offering— refusing to see the miracle and what it points to. It is an imitation of the Israelites in the desert who say amazing signs, even heard the voice of God himself thundering from the mountain, but refused to lift their minds above the mundane trivialities around them. Let it not happen to us!



Ministries & Reflections



Saint of the Week-St. Maximilian Kolbe

Maximilian was born in 1894 in Poland and entered the minor seminary of the Conventual Franciscans. At 16 he became a novice. Maximilian later achieved doctorates in philosophy and theology. He founded the Militia of the Immaculata, whose aim was to fight evil with the witness of the good life, prayer, work, and suffering. He dreamed of and then founded Knight of the Immaculata, a religious magazine to preach the Good News to all nations. In 1939, the Nazis invaded Poland. In 1941, Fr. Kolbe was arrested and sent to Auschwitz, a concentration camp. 3 months later, a prisoner escaped. The camp's commandant announced that 10 men would die. He began to pick people at random. When one man was chosen, he expressed fear for his wife and children. As they were being marched away to the starvation bunkers, Kolbe dared to step from the line. "I would like to take that man's place. He has a wife and children." "Who are you?" "A priest." The commandant accepted the proposal. In the "block of death" they were ordered to strip naked, and their slow starvation began. To the surprise of the Nazis there was no screaming—the prisoners instead sang due to Fr. Kolbe's encouragement. By the eve of the Assumption, four were left alive. The jailer came to finish Kolbe off as he sat in a corner praying. He lifted his fleshless arm to receive the bite of the hypodermic needle. It was filled with carbolic acid. They burned his body with all the others. Fr. Kolbe was canonized in 1982 by St. John Paul II.

For Your Reflection

God, who is all-knowing and all-wise, knows best what we should do to increase his glory. Through his representatives on earth he continually reveals his will to us; thus it is obedience and obedience alone that is the sure sign to us of the divine will. A superior may, it is true, make a mistake; but it is impossible for us to be mistaken in obeying a superior's command. The only exception to this rule is the case of a superior commanding something that in even the slightest way would contravene God's law. Such a superior would not be conveying God's will. God alone is infinitely wise, holy, merciful, our Lord, Creator, and Father; he is beginning and end, wisdom and power and love; he is all. Everything other than God has value to the degree that it is referred to him, the maker of all and our own redeemer, the final end of all things. It is he who, declaring his adorable will to us through his representatives on earth, draws us to himself and whose plan is to draw others to himself through us and to join us all to himself in an ever deepening love. Look, then, at the high dignity that by God's mercy belongs to our state in life. Obedience raises us beyond the limits of our littleness and puts us in harmony with God's will. In boundless wisdom and care, his will guides us to act rightly. Holding fast to that will, which no creature can thwart, we are filled with unsurpassable strength. Obedience is the one and the only way of wisdom and prudence for us to offer glory to God. If there were another, Christ would certainly have shown it to us by word and example. Scripture, however, summed up his entire life at Nazareth in the words: He was subject to them; Scripture set obedience as the theme of the rest of his life, repeatedly declaring that he came into the world to do his Father's will. Let us love our loving Father with all our hearts. Let our obedience increase that love, above all when it requires us to surrender our own will. Jesus Christ crucified is our sublime guide toward growth in God's love. We will learn this lesson more quickly through the Immaculate Virgin, whom God has made the dispenser of his mercy. It is beyond all doubt that Mary's will represents to us the will of God himself. By dedicating ourselves to her we become in her hands instruments of God's mercy even as she was such an instrument in God's hands. We should let ourselves be guided and led by Mary and rest quiet and secure in her hands. She will watch out for us, provide for us, answer our needs of body and spirit; she will dissolve all our difficulties and
