### From our Pastoral Associate:

In our first reading today, Moses instructs the people to observe the entire law given to them by God, so that it may serve as a witness to other nations. By following the law, Israel was meant to display its wisdom, leading others to recognize and come to the one true God—the God of Israel. The Law of Moses was intended to be a tool for converting the



nations. However, Israel ultimately failed in this mission, which eventually led to their exile under the Assyrians and Babylonians. When they returned, they found themselves subjugated by foreign powers.

In response, there was an effort to remove idolatry and other errant practices from their faith, but the focus shifted more toward ritual observances than moral teachings. This shift was motivated by the hope that God would once again bless them with a kingdom, autonomy, and greatness among the nations. As a result, the emphasis often fell on interpretations of the law rather than the law itself, particularly on ritual cleanliness, which was seen as essential for worship in the Temple.

This context helps us understand why the Pharisees were upset with Jesus when some of his disciples ate with unwashed hands. Jesus rebuked them for clinging to human traditions rather than adhering to God's law. For Jesus, what defiles a person is not external—such as food, drink, or a bit of dirt—but what arises from within: hatred, lust, covetousness, murderous thoughts, deceit, arrogance, blasphemy, and more. These, Jesus teaches, are far more significant than the dirt on our hands. This was the core of the contention between Jesus and the Pharisees. They accused Him of violating minor laws of the Torah, while Jesus criticized them for focusing on trivial matters while neglecting the more important laws of justice. This is not to say that the laws given by God were unimportant, but that they should be understood and applied in their proper context.

Jesus is teaching us a crucial lesson here. When we integrate the weightier teachings of justice toward our neighbor with our faith and prayer, we become, as Jesus described, a shining light on a hill, inspiring others to give praise to God. Today, we often see Christians who attend Mass, receive Christ in the Eucharist, and then contradict this by their lifestyle. This signals that our preaching and faith are merely words, not backed by deeds, and suggests that we do not truly believe what we proclaim. It is essential to radiate Jesus' radical, self-giving love to our world and to guard against the attitude Jesus warned against. May God grant us the grace to do so.

### **Ministries & Reflections**



### Saint of the Week- St. Gregory the Great

Gregory was the prefect of Rome before he was 30. After five years in office he resigned, founded six monasteries on his Sicilian estate, and became a Benedictine monk in his own home at Rome. Ordained a priest, Gregory became one of the pope's seven deacons, and also served six years in the East as papal representative in Constantinople. He was recalled to become abbot, but at the age of 50 was elected pope by the clergy and people of Rome. Gregory was direct and firm. He removed unworthy priests from office, forbade taking money for many services, emptied the papal treasury to ransom prisoners of the Lombards and to care for persecuted Jews and the victims of plague and famine. He was very concerned about the conversion of England, sending 40 monks from his own monastery. He is known for his reform of the liturgy, and for strengthening respect for doctrine. Gregory lived in a time of perpetual strife with invading Lombards and difficult relations with the East. When Rome itself was under attack, he interviewed the Lombard king. His book, Pastoral Care continues to be a classic. He described bishops mainly as physicians whose main duties were preaching and the enforcement of discipline. In his own down-to-earth preaching, Gregory was skilled at applying the daily Gospel to the needs of his listeners. Called "the Great," Gregory has been given a place with Augustine, Ambrose, and Jerome, as one of the four key doctors of the Western Church.

### For Your Reflection

Happy are we if we do the deeds of which we have heard and sung. Our hearing of them means having them planted in us, while our doing them shows that the seed has borne fruit. By saying this, I wish to caution you, dearly beloved, not to enter the Church fruitlessly, satisfied with mere hearing of such mighty blessings and failing to do good works. For we have been saved by his grace, says the Apostle, and not by our works, lest anyone may boast; for it is by his grace that we have been saved. It is not as if a good life of some sort came first, and that thereupon God showed his love and esteem for it from on high, saying: "Let us come to the aid of these men and assist them quickly because they are living a good life." No, our life was displeasing to him; whatever we did by ourselves was displeasing to him; but what he did in us was not displeasing to him. He will, therefore, condemn what we have done but he will save what he himself has done in us. We were not good, but God had pity on us and sent his Son to die, not for good men but for bad ones, not for the just but for the wicked. Yes, Christ died for the ungodly. Notice what is written next: One will hardly die for a righteous man, though perhaps for a good man one will dare even to die. Perhaps someone can be found who will dare to die for a good man; but for the unjust man, for the wicked one, the sinner, who would be willing to die except Christ alone who is so just that he justifies even the unjust? Yet although men's actions were evil, God in his mercy did not abandon men. He sent his Son to redeem us, not with gold or silver but at the price of his blood poured out for us. Christ, the spotless lamb, became the sacrificial victim, led to the slaughter for the sheep that were blemished—if indeed one can say that they were blemished and not entirely corrupt. Such is the grace we have received! Let us live so as to be worthy of that great grace, and not do injury to it. So mighty is the physician who has come to us that he has healed all our sins! If we choose to be sick once again, we will not only harm ourselves, but show ingratitude to the physician as well. Let us then follow Christ's paths which he has revealed to us, above all the path of humility, which he himself became for us. He showed us that path by his precepts, and he himself followed it by his suffering on our behalf. In order to die for us-because as God he could not die- the Word became flesh and dwelt among us. The immortal One took on mortality that he might die for us, and by dying put to death our death. This is what the Lord did, this the gift he granted to us. -From a Sermon by St. Augustine
